8. Yes, Mr. ...Mr. President and fellow Senators, this amendment  
9. just further defines a State employee and it gives the definitions  
10. of what categories that falls in, and it was a certain expansion of  
11. the definition of that, and I would ask for the adoption of this  
12. amendment.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

14. Any further discussion? Senator Nimrod moves the adoption of  
15. Committee Amendment No. 1. All those in favor signify by saying  
16. Aye. All those Opposed. The Ayes have it. The amendment is

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

1. Gentlemen, will...may we have some order. Senator Hickey.

2. SENATOR HICKEY:

3. The amendment that I offer, I'm doing for the dental assistants.  
4. 749 supposedly spells out the limitations on the practice of their  
5. profession or art, but it fails to define appropriately trained. And  
6. the amendment which I offer, the dental assistants have asked me to  
7. offer, in spelling out what appropriately trained means. The reason  
8. for this is that in the last few years, the State of Illinois has  
9. spent thousands and thousands and thousands of dollars in instituting  
10. programs in our community colleges for dental assistants. These  
11. people now take a...a national examination and are certified at the  
12. end of that year, but in the State of Illinois, there is no recogni-  
13. tion of the education which they...which they take in our community  
14. colleges. So, the community colleges feel let down. They feel as  
15. if they've spent all this money, they've done all this work, they've  
16. given these people all of these skills to no avail. If it isn't  
17. recognized in something which spells out what they can and what they  
18. cannot do. So, so that their training assets and...are not legally  
19. negated, I ask you to approve this amendment to 749 which was passed  
20. out and given to you the other day. Thank you.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

22. Senator Partee.

23. SENATOR PARTEE:

24. Well, Mr. President and members of the Senate, I rise to  
25. oppose this amendment. This is not the first time we've heard of  
26. it. It was offered in the committee and was not acceptable to the  
27. committee who heard this bill in detail. Now, what this amendment  
28. would do would be to turn this bill into a licensing bill by providing  
29. actually backdoor licensing. The amendment grandfathers in all the  
30. existing dental...assistants, but then it seeks to limit the number  
31. of new assistants who had come on the market. This is really a  
32. matter that would be best left to the Dental Examining Committee.  
33. They purport to show what is appropriately trained. Now, it doesn't



1. have anything to do with what the schools have done. They've  
2. done a very fine job. But what they seek to do by the amendment  
3. is to determine what is appropriately trained and that ought to  
4. be left to the Dental Examining Committee who could make the  
5. determination as to appropriate training for this bill. It's an  
6. excellent bill, and I certainly feel that this amendment should  
7. fail, and I...I move to Table this amendment.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

9. Can you withhold that motion, a motion...please.

10. SENATOR PARTEE:

11. I'll withhold it if someone else wants to speak.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

13. Thank...thank you. Senator Glass.

14. SENATOR GLASS:

15. Well, at...at the risk of delaying the activities of the  
16. Senate, I have received as I know all of us have a good deal of  
17. correspondence on this, and I must admit if the amendment was  
18. handed out yesterday, I...I don't have it today. Would it be  
19. possible to get a...get a copy of this before we vote on it?

20. SENATOR HICKEY:

21. It was passed out last week when the amendment was offered but  
22. then there was...then Senator Harris asked for a delay, but we can  
23. ...we can do that if...if you'd like.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

25. Senator Partee.

26. SENATOR PARTEE:

27. I'm...I'm sending a copy of my copy over to Senator Glass.  
28. It's a very simple amendment. I'd like to proceed with this. We  
29. held it yesterday so that everybody could have a chance to see it.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

31. Senator Glass indicates that is acceptable. Is there any  
32. further discussion? Senator Shapiro.

33. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

1. Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, in its  
2. present form, I'm going to have to oppose this amendment. What  
3. this amendment would do as...as explained by Senator Partee in  
4. addition, it would also knock out a program that the Dental Society  
5. has now, and that is where a component society such as I belong to,  
6. the Whiteside Lee Dental Society, sets up a program for certifying  
7. dental assistants. In other words, we can...conduct our own program.  
8. The...our employees who are dental assistants can...are taking this  
9. program and then taking the exam and become certified. This amend-  
10. ment makes...would automatically eliminate that program. Further-  
11. more, it would restrict in the future the number of certified dental  
12. assistants practically to those who would be only able to attend a...  
13. an accredited program at a junior college or at an institution in the  
14. area. Now, in my particular area of the State, there are no dental  
15. assistant programs closer than fifty miles away. I think the problem  
16. can best be taken care of by the department issuing rules and regula-  
17. tions for the certification and for the recognition of dental assis-  
18. tants along with the State Board of Examiners. And for those reasons  
19. at this present time, I am going to vote No on the amendment.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

21. Is there any further discussion? Senator Partee, you wish to  
22. renew your motion to Table?

23. SENATOR PARTEE:

24. Yes, I move the...renew the motion to Table this amendment.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

26. Senator Hickey has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1.  
27. Senator Partee has moved to Table that motion. Those in favor of  
28. the adoption of the amendment will vote No. Those in...those  
29. opposed to the amendment will vote Aye. All those...all those in  
30. favor of Senator Partee's motion to...it's backwards but it comes  
31. out right. All those in favor of the motion to Table indicate by  
32. saying Aye. All those Opposed. The Ayes have it. Sure. Roll call  
33. has been requested. Those in favor of Senator Partee's motion to

1. Table will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote No. The voting is  
2. open. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question,  
3. the Ayes are 34, the Nays are 9. The motion to Table prevails. Any  
4. further...further amendments from the Floor? Okay.

5. SECRETARY:

6. Amendment No. 2 offered by Senator Partee.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

8. Amendment No. 2 to Senate Bill 749. Senator Partee.

9. SENATOR PARTEE:

10. Amendment No. 2 is an amendment which has been drafted since  
11. the last hearing of this matter to serve the interest of the dental  
12. hygienist. They wanted to know...they raised some questions in  
13. committee, and this amendment now makes it very clear that dental  
14. hygienists who have actually two years of sophisticated education  
15. can, in fact, perform the expanded duties which are allowed under  
16. this bill. And it also makes it clear that the duties that they  
17. had previously been granted are still within the purview of their  
18. operation. Now, the dental...Illinois Dental Hygienist Association  
19. appeared against the bill in its original form. They now support  
20. the bill with this amendment, and I move the adoption of this amend-  
21. ment.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

23. Senator Partee has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to  
24. Senate Bill 749. Senator Hickey.

25. SENATOR HICKEY:

26. The amendment please.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

28. Senator is requesting a copy of the amendment, Senator. Is  
29. there any further discussion? Senator Partee has moved the adoption of  
30. Amendment No. 2 to Senate Bill 749. Those in favor of the adoption  
31. of the amendment indicate by saying Aye. All those opposed say Nay.  
32. The Ayes have it. The amendment is adopted. Any further amendments  
33. from the Floor? 3rd reading. 786, Senator Ozinga. Wish to move that?

1. Okay. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary. 786.

2. SECRETARY:

3. Senate Bill 786.

4. (Secretary reads title of bill)

5. 2nd reading of the bill. No committee amendments.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

7. Any...any amendments from the Floor? 3rd reading. 799,

8. Senator Joyce. 834. 855. 857. 880. Do you wish to move 880?

9. Senate Bill 880, Mr. Secretary.

10. SECRETARY:

11. Senate Bill 880.

12. (Secretary reads title of bill)

13. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on...Revenue offers three

14. amendments.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

16. Gentlemen, might we have your attention. Senate Bill 880.

17. The Committee on Revenue has offered three amendments. Senator

18. Fawell.

19. SENATOR FAWELL:

20. Frankly, Mr. President, I am not sure which amendment pertains

21. to which of these concepts, but the only substantive change was and

22. an important one was the inclusion of the Chicago Park District

23. within the purview of this bill. That's...excuse me, Amendment No.

24. ...No. 2. Amendment No. 1 and Amendment No. 3 are nonsubstantive

25. technical amendments as I recall. Amendment No. 2, however, is the

26. substantive amendment. So, I move adoption of Amendment No. 1.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

28. Senator Fawell has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1. All

29. those in favor signify by saying Aye. All those Opposed. The Ayes

30. have it. The amendment is adopted. Amendment No. 2. Senator Fawell.

31. SENATOR FAWELL:

32. Yes, this...this is...this is the...an...important substantive

33. amendment bringing in the Chicago Park District. I would move...

1. adoption of Amendment No. 2.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

3. Senator Fawell...any further discussion? Senator Fawell has  
4. moved the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to Senate Bill 880. All those  
5. in favor signify by saying Aye. Those Opposed. The Ayes have it.  
6. The amendment is adopted. Amendment No. 3. Senator Fawell.

7. SENATOR FAWELL:

8. This amendment also, Mr. President, is a nonsubstantive amend-  
9. ment as I recall. It straightening out the wording, and I move the  
10. adoption of Amendment No. 3.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

12. Any further discussion? Senator Fawell has moved the adoption  
13. of Amendment No. 3 to Senate Bill 880. All those in favor signify  
14. by saying Aye. All those Opposed. The Ayes have it. The amendment  
15. is adopted. Any further amendements? For what purpose does Senator  
16. Glass arise?

17. SENATOR GLASS:

18. Mr. President and Senator Fawell, I wonder...I don't have the  
19. amendment prepared but I would like to offer an amendment to this  
20. bill, and I would just ask...I'll talk to you about it and I'd wonder  
21. if you would agree to pull it back from 3rd for that purpose. Thank  
22. you.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

24. Senator...Senator indicates he will do so. Senator Dougherty,  
25. for what purpose do you arise?

26. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

27. May I before we go to the order of 3rd reading call Senate  
28. Bill 138 back for...it's now on 2nd reading for the purpose of  
29. offering an amendment?

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

31. Yes, we are on the order of 2nd reading. We will get back  
32. to that, Senator Dougherty.

33. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

1. Fine. Thank you.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

3. You're sure welcome. Any further amendments? 3rd reading.

4. 894, Senator Berning. Do you wish to move 894? 865, Senator

5. Wooten. Mr. Secretary, 865.

6. SECRETARY:

7. Senate Bill 865.

8. (Secretary reads title of bill)

9. 2nd reading of the bill. No committee amendments.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

11. Any amendments from the Floor? 3rd reading. 910, Senator

12. Johns. 910, Mr. Secretary.

13. SECRETARY:

14. Senate Bill 910.

14. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

17. Senator Dougherty.  
18. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:  
19. ...I'm offering an amendment to Senate Bill 138. This is...  
20. Industrial Pollution Control Facilities Board. This bill provides  
21. ...this amendment provides that at the time the original legislation  
22. was passed, we installed some very safeguards in there we thought  
23. would protect the investors of...of the bonds and also it protects

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):  
26. Senator, are you addressing...pardon me, Senator. This is a  
27. committee amendment.  
28. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:  
29. This is...no, this is not a committee amendment.  
30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):  
31. Well, there is one committee amendment on it.  
32. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:  
33. There is one already. That's correct.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

2.        Okay. Could we move the adoption of this one...

3. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

4.        Move the adoption of the committee amendment.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

6.        Senator Dougherty moves the adoption of Committee Amendment  
7. No. 1 to Senate Bill 138. All those in favor signify by saying  
8. Aye. All those Opposed. The Ayes have it. The amendment is  
9. adopted. Further amendments? Amendment No. 2...we'll get to you  
10. Charlie. Amendment No. 2 offered by Senator Dougherty. Senator  
11. Dougherty.

12. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

13.        Amendment No. 2 provides that we will reinstall the safeguards  
14. that we put in at the time this original legislation was passed.  
15. At this...bill in its present form is liberalized to a degree that  
16. I do not think feasible. We want to safeguard the investors who  
17. want to safeguard the...the control board to the end as they will  
18. have a mortgage on the facilities, if you will, and until such time,  
19. the...the bonds are retired. I've studied the amendment with the  
20. staff on the other side of the aisle and my staff have studied it,  
21. and we do believe that this restores it in the proper form as was  
22. enacted in 1972, and I move the adoption of Amendment No. 2.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

24.        Any discussion? Senator Dougherty moves the adoption of  
25. Amendment No. 2 to Senate Bill 138. All those in favor signify by  
26. saying Aye. All those Opposed. The Ayes have it. The amendment is  
27. adopted. Any further amendments? Further amendments, okay.  
28. Amendment No. 3 to Senate Bill 138 offered by Senator Dougherty.

30. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

5. Any...any discussion? Senator Dougherty moves the adoption of  
6. Amendment No. 3 to Senate Bill 138. All those in favor signify by  
7. saying Aye. All those Opposed. The Ayes have it. The amendment is  
8. adopted. Any further amendments? Further amendments from the Floor?  
9. 3rd reading. Senate Bill 241, Mr. Secretary.

10. SECRETARY:

11. Senate Bill 241.

12. (Secretary reads title of bill)

13. 2nd reading of the bill. No committee amendments. One Floor Amend-  
14. ment offered by Senator Chew.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

16. Senator Chew.

17. SENATOR CHEW:

18. Now, Mr. President, this is an amendment to restrict the bill  
19. in itself as to what it's supposed to do. That relieves all of the  
20. opposition to the bill, the amendment does, and I would move its  
21. adoption.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

23. Is there any discussion? Senator Howard Mohr.

24. SENATOR MOHR:

25. Mr. President, I wonder if the sponsor...we've been told that  
26. there have been an amendment coming from another source. We'd like  
27. to make sure that this is the proper amendment and with the under-  
28. standing of the sponsor of the bill could be called back to 2nd  
29. reading for the purpose of a...another one. Okay.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

31. Sponsor indicates no problem at all. All right. Senator Chew  
32. moves the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 241. All those  
33. in favor signify by saying Aye. All those Opposed. The Ayes have it.

1. The amendment is adopted. Any further amendments? 3rd reading.

2. Senate Bill...you're welcome. Senate Bill 1004, Mr. Secretary.

3. SECRETARY:

4. Senate Bill 1004.

5. (Secretary reads title of bill)

6. 2nd reading of the bill and no committee amendments.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

8. Any amendments from the Floor? 3rd reading. Any...any other  
9. member have a bill on 2nd reading he desires to move or amend or  
10. Table? Okay. Senator Graham.

11. SENATOR GRAHAM:

12. I would like to rise for two purposes, Mr. President. One, I  
13. would like to have the Committee...

14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

15. Senator Graham deserves some attention. Mr. Sergeant-at-Arms,  
16. please clear the Floor of those who are not authorized to be on it.

17. SENATOR GRAHAM:

18. I'd like to have the Committee on Revenue discharged from further  
19. consideration of Senate Bill 1481 for the purpose of Tabling. This  
20. is a duplicate bill of one that's now on 2nd reading.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

22. Senator Graham has moved to discharge the Committee on...  
23. Committee on Revenue from further consideration of Senate Bill 1481.  
24. All those in favor signify by saying Aye. The committee is dis-  
25. charged. Senator Graham now moves to take...

26. SENATOR GRAHAM:

27. Now, Mr. ...now, I move to Table Senate Bill 1481.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

29. Senator Graham moves to Table Senate Bill 1481. All those in  
30. favor signify by saying Aye. All those Opposed. The Ayes have it.  
31. The bill is Tabled. Senator Graham.

32. SENATOR GRAHAM:

33. Now, Mr. President, I would like to have the indulgence of the

1. Chamber for a couple of minutes on a point of personal privilege.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

3. Will the Senators please be in their seats.

4. SENATOR GRAHAM:

5. This is for the purpose of making an announcement and a  
6. statement, Mr. President and fellow Senators. At eleven o'clock  
7. today, about an hour from now, a most important meeting will be  
8. getting under way across the street in the Armory. A group of  
9. interested businessmen, small and large, ...and citizens are in  
10. Springfield with a message. A message that has both a title and  
11. a purpose. You have probably heard about May Day Minus One - the  
12. coalition for it. It's purpose is to inform us as Legislators and  
13. the people of Illinois about the possible affects of some of the  
14. legislation being advanced in this Session of the General Assembly.  
15. Their concern is direct and simple. These people are worried about  
16. jobs, yes, and they're worried about taxes. And they are also  
17. worried about something very important to each and every citizen  
18. in Illinois - the economy of our State. As May Day Minus One  
19. Coalition represents one of the most malign and misunderstood  
20. constituencies in Illinois and indeed the most endangered species  
21. ...the most endangered species in Illinois - those are the taxpayers.  
22. The businessmen who are participating in today's rally provide jobs  
23. for over four and a half million persons in this State. The jobs  
24. created by these people provide the majority of Illinoisans with  
25. their livelihood and the tax revenues generated by these jobs, indeed,  
26. keep this ship of State afloat. The employers and many of their  
27. employees have accompanied them today to Springfield, and they are  
28. disturbed and worried. They see legislation in this General Assembly  
29. that will endanger or destroy the economy of this State. They are  
30. saying to us that we want them to provide the jobs, pay the taxes,  
31. and the government will continue to harrass them and tell them we  
32. don't need you if you can't afford this tag, you can go ahead and  
33. move out of the State. Fellow members of the Senate, I respectfully

1. suggest to you that you allot a little bit of your time between  
2. eleven o'clock and two and go across the street to the Armory.  
3. Talk to these people. Some of them will be your constituents.  
4. Their meeting is...is scheduled to continue until 2 o'clock. They'll  
5. be interested in seeing you. It's not a partisan thing. It's not  
6. an industry thing. It, for one time, I have to use that much, much  
7. abused word - it's the people's day in Springfield that pay the  
8. taxes. Gentlemen, go over and see your friends in industry and  
9. employees in the State of Illinois. Thank you very much.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

11. Senator Mitchler. Senator Mitchler.

12. SENATOR MITCHLER:

13. Mr. President and members of the Senate, I would confirm the  
14. remarks by Senator Graham as reported to us yesterday by the  
15. President of this Senate on his recent visit to the Nation's Capitol  
16. and during the briefing when he was told that the United States  
17. Government spends in one day in 1975 what the...

18. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

19. For...for what purpose did you arise, Senator Mitchler?

20. SENATOR MITCHLER:

21. ...entire Congress spent...

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

23. For what purpose...

24. SENATOR MITCHLER:

25. Personal privilege.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

27. Okay.

28. SENATOR MITCHLER:

29. ...but the entire...United States spend in one year of 1960.  
30. I think we should become alarmed, and I think we should become  
31. alarmed at what we in Illinois are doing. In 1969 before the  
32. Illinois State Income Tax, you had a budget of about four point  
33. four billion. Fiscal '75, you're operating on an eight point five

1. billion, and you're going to go up to about a ten point eight  
2. billion. This means more taxes, and that's what these people are  
3. trying to tell us today - watch our spending or we'll be bankrupt.  
4. And governments can go bankrupt - take a look at New York City.  
5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

6. All right. Senator...where is Senator Vadalabene who indicated  
7. he had a motion? Senator Hall.

8. SENATOR HALL:

9. Thank you, Mr. President, fellow Senators. I rise to ask  
10. leave that...for the purpose of Tabling the bills, Mr. President.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

12. That...that, Senator, is always in order. Where...where is...  
13. where is the bill?

14. SENATOR HALL:

15. I...I ask leave that the Committee on Executive be discharged  
16. from further consideration of Senate Bill 212 for the purpose of  
17. Tabling Senate Bill 212. There's a identical bill...

18. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

19. ...Senator Hall.

20. SENATOR HALL:

21. ...pardon me, Mr. President. Senate...Senate Bill 137 that's  
22. in the Appropriations that will be heard Friday is the identical  
23. bill to Senate Bill 212. So, therefore, I wish to Table Senate  
24. Bill 212.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

26. Senator Hall has moved to discharge the Committee on Executive  
27. from further consideration of Senate Bill 212. All those in favor  
28. signify by saying Aye. All those Opposed. Committee is discharged.  
29. Senator Hall now moves to Table Senate Bill 212. All those in  
30. favor signify by saying Aye. Opposed. The Ayes have it. The bill  
31. is Tabled. Senator Vadalabene.

32. SENATOR VADALABENE:

33. Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. I



1. would like to at this time move to discharge from further considera-  
2. tion the Committee on Local Governments of the following bills:  
3. Senate Bill 1284, Senate Bill 1446, and Senate Bill 1452.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

5. Senator Vadalabene has moved to discharge the Committee on  
6. Local Government from further consideration of Senate Bills 1284,  
7. 1446 and 1452. All those in favor signify by saying Aye. All those  
8. Opposed. The Ayes have it. The bills are discharged. Senator  
9. Vadalabene.

10. SENATOR VADALABENE:

11. Yes, now, thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate.  
12. I move now to Table the...the following bills that I've just  
13. mentioned.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

15. Thank you. Senator Vadalabene moves to Table Senate Bills 1284,  
16. 1446 and 1452. All those in favor signify by saying Aye. All  
17. Opposed. The Ayes have it. The bills are Tabled. Senator

19. SENATOR VADALABENE:

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

29. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

30. Senator...Senator Hall has asked leave of the Senate to be  
31. shown as cosponsor. What was the number, Senator?

32. SENATOR HALL:

33. 1396.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

2. 1396. Is leave granted? So ordered. Senator Johns.

3. SENATOR JOHNS:

4. Mr. President, while we're on that order of business, I'd like  
5. to be known as cosponsor of Senate...House Bill 114 with Senator  
6. Knuppel. He and I have talked about and he agreed to it.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

1. Mitchler, is this a personal privilege or do you have a motion

3. SENATOR MITCHLER:

7. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

8. Senator Mitchler seeks leave to discharge the Committee on

10. All those in favor signify by saying Aye. All those Opposed. The  
11. Ayes have it. The bill is discharged. Senator Michler now moves  
12. to Table Senate Bill 1164. All those in favor signify by saying  
13. Aye. All those Opposed. The Ayes have it. The bill is Tabled.  
14. Senator Mitchler.

15. SENATOR MITCHLER:

16. I'd also like to ask the Committee on Agriculture, Conservation  
17. and Energy to be...discharged from hearing Senate Bill 1044 for the  
18. purpose of discharging the bill...rather Tabling the bill.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

20. Senator Mitchler has moved to discharge the Committee on  
21. Agriculture from further consideration of Senate Bill 1044. All  
22. those in favor signify by saying Aye. All those Opposed. The  
23. committee is discharged. Senator Mitchler now moves to Table  
24. Senate Bill 1044. All those in favor signify by saying Aye. All  
25. those Opposed. The Ayes have it. The bill is Tabled.

26. SENATOR MITCHLER:

27. One more.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

29. Senator Mitchler.

30. SENATOR MITCHLER:

31. Also ask the Senate Committee on Appropriations to discharge  
32. Senate Bill 1045 for the purpose of Tabling the bill.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

1. Senator Mitchler has moved to discharge the Committee on

3. All those in favor signify by saying Aye. All those Opposed. The  
4. Ayes have it. The bill is discharged. Senator Mitchler now moves  
5. to Table Senate Bill 1045. All those in favor signify by saying  
6. Aye. All those Opposed. The Ayes have it. The bill is Tabled.  
7. Senator Hickey.

8. SENATOR HICKEY:

9. ... (Machine cut-off) ... Chairman, I'd like to discharge the  
10. Committee on Education to Table Senate Bill 1183 from any further  
11. consideration.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

13. Senator Hickey has moved to discharge the Committee on Education  
14. from further consideration of Senate Bill 1183. All those in favor  
15. signify by saying Aye. All those Opposed. The Ayes have it.  
16. Committee is discharged. Senator Hickey now moves to Table Senate  
17. Bill 1183. All those in favor signify by saying Aye. Those Opposed.  
18. The bill is Tabled. Senator Sommer, where did he go? Senator  
19. Egan.

20. SENATOR EGAN:

21. Mr. President and members of the Senate, I move that further  
22. consideration be discharged on Senate Bill 1475 from the Committee  
23. on Judiciary so that it may be transferred to the Committee on  
24. Insurance and...

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

26. Senator Egan has moved to discharge the Committee on Judiciary  
27. from further consideration of Senate Bill 1475 to be re-referred to  
28. the Committee on Insurance.

29. SENATOR EGAN:

30. I have... I have the agreement of both Chairmen.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

32. All those in favor of the motion to discharge indicate by saying  
33. Aye. All those Opposed. The Ayes have it. The bill is discharged.

1. Senator Egan now moves to re-refer or to refer the...Senate Bill  
2. 1475 to the Committee on Insurance. All those in favor signify by  
3. saying Aye. All those Opposed. The Ayes have it. So ordered.  
4. Senator Sommer.

5. SENATOR SOMMER:

6. Mr. President, I move to discharge the Committee on Local  
7. Government of Senate Bill 1466 for the purpose of Tabling.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

9. I'm sorry. I was distracted. Senate Bill...what...

10. SENATOR SOMMER:

11. 1466.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

13. Senator Sommer has moved to discharge the Committee on Local  
14. Government from further consideration of Senate Bill 1466. All  
15. those in favor signify by saying Aye. All those Opposed. The Ayes  
16. have it. The bill is discharged. Senator Sommer now moves to  
17. Table Senate Bill 1466. All those in favor signify by saying Aye.  
18. All those Opposed. The Ayes have it. The bill is Tabled. For  
19. what purpose does Senator...Senator Romano arise?

20. SENATOR ROMANO:

21. I...I would like unanimous consent to hear 1475 today in the  
22. Committee on Insurance and Licensed Activity.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

24. Senator Romano has asked leave to hear or to...to hear  
25. Senate Bill 1475 today in the Committee on Insurance. Is leave  
26. granted? Leave. So ordered. Senator Hickey, for what purpose  
27. do you arise?

28. SENATOR HICKEY:

29. I'd like to move to remove Senate Bill 217 from the Table.  
30. I...you have the motion from last week.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

32. Yes.

33. SENATOR HICKEY:

1. 217.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

3. All right. Mr. Secretary, there is on the Secretary's Desk  
4. a motion in writing with respect to Senate Bill 217. It was, in  
5. fact, postponed or set for a date certain which is today. You may  
6. ...certainly may speak, we're just trying to get...we're on the  
7. order of motions. Senator Romano, for what purpose do you arise?  
8. Oh, okay. Okay. Senate Bill 217, Senator Hickey.

9. SENATOR HICKEY:

10. You have had distributed to you just now an amendment which  
11. was put on Senate Bill 217 in committee, and I'd like to speak to  
12. this. This is the amendment that I would offer in 2nd reading if  
13. we move...or if we do vote to take this from the Table. I'd like  
14. to give you a little history of the problem of haircutting in the  
15. State of Illinois.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

17. For what purpose does Senator Harber Hall arise?

18. SENATOR HALL:

19. A point of order, Mr. President.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

21. State your point.

22. SENATOR HALL:

23. I believe discussing an amendment to a bill that may or may  
24. not come before this Body is out of order, and the...any other  
25. question should be put to the Body.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

27. Well, the...the motion is to take Senate Bill 217 from the  
28. Table, and I would fully expect that part of the rationale for that  
29. motion and its favorable consideration is the proffering of this  
30. amendment. So, I think it is quite in order. Senator Ozinga, for  
31. what purpose do you arise?

32. SENATOR OZINGA:

33. Question.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):  
2. Yes, sir.  
3. SENATOR OZINGA:  
4. Is this, again, one of those motions to take from the Secretary's Desk a bill that has been voted out by a committee with a  
5. Do Not Pass recommendation?  
6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):  
7. That is my understanding. Yes, Sir.  
8. SENATOR OZINGA:  
9. This is...in other words, this one is laying on the Secretary's  
10. Desk with a recommendation from a committee with a Do Not Pass  
11. recommendation?  
12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):  
13. My understanding...  
14. SENATOR OZINGA:  
15. So that now we're really voting to override the committee  
16. recommendation?  
17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):  
18. My understanding, Senator, is that this bill was reported out  
19. Do Not Pass, and within one legislative day pursuant to our rules,  
20. the motion in writing was filed to take it from the Table.  
21. SENATOR OZINGA:  
22. Thank you.  
23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):  
24. We are acting on that motion. Senator Harber Hall, for what  
25. purpose do you arise?  
26. SENATOR HALL:  
27. The motion to take from the Table is not debatable as I understand it, Mr. President.  
28. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):  
29. Well, I think...  
30. SENATOR HALL:  
31. We seem to be entering into a debate...debate...  
32.  
33.



1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

2. No. No. No, I...I think...I think, frankly, and the Chair is  
3. going to rule off the top of his head at this point, but I think  
4. a motion to Table is not debatable, but to take from the Table is  
5. most certainly debatable. I remember I had one a couple of weeks  
6. ago myself. Senator Hickey.

7. SENATOR HICKEY:

8. I want to give you a little...little history on this problem.  
9. In 1909, the first Illinois Barbers Act was passed which was added  
10. to in 1923 and at that time they included the cutting of women's  
11. hair in the Department of Registration. In 1925, ...the Illinois  
12. Beauty Culture Act was enacted, and in 1929, an addition was made  
13. to that Act which denied authorization to cut hair except with a  
14. Barber's Certificate. In 1930, a...a court case was instituted,  
15. Banghart versus Walsh, which stated that beauticians may cut hair  
16. if incidental to other services performed...

17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

18. For what...

19. SENATOR HICKEY:

20. There have been two other...

21. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

22. Excuse me, Senator. For what purpose does Senator Harber Hall  
23. arise?

24. SENATOR HALL:

25. A point of parliamentary inquiry.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

27. State your point.

28. SENATOR HALL:

29. ...Mr. President. Robert's Rules of Order No. 33, taking from  
30. the Table, the motion to take from the Table is not debatable. Now,  
31. if we have Senate rules that are to the contrary to this, I'd like  
32. to have that clarified.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

1. Well, the Chair is going to rule that since our Rules are, in  
2. fact, silent on this...this question that this motion has tradi-  
3. tionally the motion to take from the Table pursuant to a Do...Do Not  
4. Pass recommendation by a committee under the Rule concerning  
5. committee reports that...Rule No. 11. The Chair is going to rule  
6. that debate is in order. Senator Harber Hall.

7. SENATOR HALL:

8. I respect tradition, Mr. President, but don't our rules provide  
9. that when the rules of the Senate are silent that we follow Robert's  
10. Rules of Order?

11. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

12. When...when, in fact, the rules and the custom and usage and  
13. tradition of the Senate is...is silent, Robert come into play.

14. SENATOR HALL:

15. I didn't understand that explanation, Sir.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

17. Didn't understand that explanation?

18. SENATOR HALL:

19. I...I didn't understand what you said.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

21. Well, what...what I said was that under our rules, it does,  
22. in fact, say...now, wait a minute. Okay. Rule 68, the rules of  
23. parliamentary practice comprising Roberts shall govern the Senate  
24. in all cases to which they're applicable providing that they are  
25. not inconsistent with the standing rules and orders of the Senate.  
26. My ruling is that this has been a standing order or tradition of the  
27. Senate that this particular motion in writing to take from the Table  
28. is, in fact, subject to debate, and if you take a look at Rule 39,  
29. when a motion is made it shall be stated by the President, and being  
30. in writing, shall be handed to the Secretary and read aloud before  
31. debate. My ruling is that this type of motion is, in fact, subject  
32. to discussion and debate. Senator Hickey.

33. SENATOR HICKEY:

1. I...I'll mention again the law suit that took place in 1930,  
2. Banghart versus Walsh, which...

3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

4. Senator Ozinga, for what purpose do you arise?

5. SENATOR OZINGA:

6. Point of order.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

8. All right. State your point.

9. SENATOR OZINGA:

10. She is not talking on the motion, she is talking on the amend-  
11. ment that's going to come forth after the motion.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

13. Well, what I'm suggesting, Sir, is that a motion...there is...  
14. there is a motion pending to take from the Table. The Senator is  
15. explaining why we should, in our wisdom or lack thereof, take it  
16. from the Table. So, your point is not well taken. Senator Hickey.

17. SENATOR HICKEY:

18. So, that this...the case law established in that suit is what  
19. we have been guided by in the State of Illinois. There have been a  
20. couple of other law suits in the meantime, one of them in Chicago  
21. which did ask for remedial legislation, and Senate Bill 217 offers  
22. that remedial legislation. There is some opposition to this from  
23. some of the six or seven thousand barbers in the State of Illinois.  
24. I'd like to tell you, too, that there are eighty or ninety thousand  
25. beauticians in the State of Illinois which are divided up among all  
26. of your constituencies. In deference to the barbers and in trying  
27. to come to an agreement with them over what they conceive to be some  
28. difficulty with this, Senate Bill 216 was instituted to...to make  
29. concessions to them, however, they didn't want this bill and so I  
30. intend to Table that at the end of this procedure. Now, I have  
31. real sympathy for anyone who is in a business that is suffering, and  
32. apparently, the barbers are...are now in...in that position. They're  
33. feeling the pinch of the longer haircuts and I...I think we all hope

1. that...that somehow they...they do survive this. In Rockford, I'd  
2. like to tell you, that there is no quarrel between barbers and  
3. beauticians at all because the beauticians have taught the barbers  
4. how to style hair and everybody is very happy and the barbers business  
5. is good. I want to point out another thing that registration was  
6. never intended to protect businesses, and I'm afraid that that's one  
7. of the interpretations that's being given in the...in the barbers  
8. objections. Illinois is the only state in the whole United States  
9. which does not now permit beauticians to cut hair. This amendment  
10. which I offered in committee and which I will offer on 2nd reading  
11. simply puts the language of the case law of Banghart versus Walsh  
12. into the statutes. And I think we can do this for the eighty or  
13. ninety thousand beauticians in the State of Illinois who want to  
14. have statutory laws supercede case law, and I ask for a favorable  
15. vote to take this from the Table. Thank you.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

17. Will those not entitled to the Floor, please get off. Senator  
18. Romano.

19. SENATOR ROMANO:

20. Mr. President and members of the Senate, what this amendment  
21. purports to do, they can now do under an appellate court ruling.  
22. We had an extensive hearing in our committee, and I think it was a  
23. fair one, and I think Vivian will agree with me. And I want to  
24. move at this time that her motion lie on the Table.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

26. Senator, that motion is not debatable. Would you mind with-  
27. holding that? Three or four people have indicated they wish to  
28. speak. I will honor your motion...

29. SENATOR ROMANO:

30. I'll...I'll withhold the motion.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

32. Thank you, Sir. Senator Merritt.

33. SENATOR MERRITT:

1. Yes, Mr. President, members of the Senate, I think we're getting  
2. far afield here in trying to debate a bill. We have a motion before  
3. us. We may have many. We've had them in the past. To discharge  
4. a committee is one thing, I think that's bad enough, to take from  
5. the Table when a bill has been defeated in committee, I think is  
6. pretty rude to the judgement of that committee, its chairman, its  
7. minority spokesman who have debated the issue both pro and con. I  
8. think if...once again, this type of a motion is a test whether our  
9. committee system is going to prevail or not. It makes little  
10. difference which side of the issue I may be on. That's not what's  
11. being debated here. It's a question of whether the committee system  
12. is going to survive, otherwise, we're going to have chaos here if  
13. everything is going to be brought out onto this Floor. And I would  
14. hope that this motion would be defeated.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

16. Senator Egan.

17. SENATOR EGAN:

18. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. I'll be  
19. very brief, but I did want to point out just a few facts. Senator  
20. Hickey states that there is some opposition by the barbers in  
21. Illinois, and let me just say this, Senator, that you're...that's a  
22. very mild designation of opposition. I would say that the opposition  
23. as you well know is overwhelmingly opposed to this bill because it  
24. does not do what you say it does. It allows beauticians to be  
25. barbers, and the fact is that they're not barbers because they don't  
26. train as long and as hard as barbers. And let me say this, that  
27. beauticians today can cut hair and you know that too because they  
28. do it every day, and they do it as prescribed in the rules and  
29. regulations of the Department of Registration and Education. This  
30. bill is simply nothing more than an attempt by the beauticians to  
31. become barbers, and let me suggest if they want to become barbers,  
32. they should go to barber school and get a license. Thank you.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

1. Senator Netsch.

2. SENATOR NETSCH:

3. Mr. President, my comments are brief and on the merits but I  
4. am...compelled first to make one comment on Senator Merritt's  
5. suggestion that this is somehow a slap in the face at the committee  
6. system. If the committee system had been working properly the last  
7. few weeks, that might be a different story, but the committee system  
8. has not been working that well to begin with. Now, with respect  
9. to the merits of this bill, it seems to me that the argument is  
10. really...excuse me, a much stronger one even than Senator Hickey  
11. has made, and she has made a strong argument. It seems to me what  
12. we are talking about is the licensing power and the exercise of the  
13. police power by the State. There is no justification whatever for  
14. regulatory, exclusionary licensing except where there is a need for  
15. it to protect the public health, safety or welfare. There is no  
16. public health, safety or welfare consideration involved in prohibiting  
17. beauticians from cutting the hair of either men or women. It is  
18. simply not a factor. This is the very kind of overzealous use of  
19. the licensing power which is bringing the whole system under great  
20. disrepute right now in this country and causing a lot of people to  
21. stop and think about what really should we be doing when we are  
22. licensing people and excluding others from practicing in those areas.  
23. I feel very strongly that this is the kind of thing that has got  
24. to be changed or else the whole structure of licensing itself is  
25. going to be challenged and itself topple. It seems to me this  
26. is an extremely important bill, and that it should be brought out  
27. on the Floor.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

29. Senator Wooten.

30. SENATOR WOOTEN:

31. Mr. President and colleagues, just a brief statement about the  
32. nature of this motion and what it means to us as a Body. We talk  
33. about the importance even the sanctity of the committee system. I

1. merely want to remind you that this remedy is open to all of us.  
2. I would like to point out the obvious, we have been under great  
3. pressure, great strain, we have been trying to deal with an  
4. impossible number of bills, and sometimes in our zeal, clear signals  
5. are not clearly given. It seems to me that while this remedy is  
6. subject to abuse, I grant that, but in this situation, I merely ask  
7. you to look at one practical aspect that this is a sponsors indica-  
8. tion that this bill is important if to nobody else in the world,  
9. than to that sponsor. And I ask that that be borne in mind when  
10. we consider this motion. To say that we never take this remedy is  
11. to make a mockery of our rules since the remedy is there. I think  
12. it's wholly proper, and I think it's something we ought to give  
13. rather careful consideration when it appears before us.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

15. Senator Hickey, do you wish to close briefly before I recognize  
16. Senator Romano's motion?

17. SENATOR HICKEY:

18. Yes, Mr. Chairman. I'd simply like to say that I hope each  
19. one of you will vote on the merits of the issue with fairness and  
20. objectivity and not in protection of small, special interests.  
21. Thank you.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

23. Senator Romano has moved to Table Senator Hickey's motion to  
24. take from the Table. I assume we wish a roll call. Those in  
25. favor of Senator Romano's motion to Table will vote Aye. Those in  
26. favor of Senator Hickey will vote No. The voting is open. ...

27. (Machine cut-off)...Harber Hall, for what purpose do you arise?

28. SENATOR HALL:

29. Parliamentary inquiry, Mr. President.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

31. State...state your inquiry.

32. SENATOR HALL:

33. Could I be informed of how many votes it takes on a motion to

1. Table a motion to Table...to take from the Table?

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

3. A majority of those voting. It takes thirty votes to take  
4. from the Table. To Table a motion, I think, is a majority of those  
5. voting. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. ...(Machine  
6. cut-off)...that question, the Ayes are 32, the Nays are 11, 3  
7. Voting Present. Senator Romano's motion to Table prevails. Senator  
8. ...while we are still on the order of motions, we have a motion in  
9. writing filed. Mr. Secretary, will you read the motion

10. SECRETARY:

11. Pursuant to Senate rules, I move to take Senate Bill 206 from  
12. the Table and place it on the order of 2nd reading. Submitted by  
13. Senator Bill Morris, dated four, thirty, in seventy-five.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

15. Senator Morris.

16. SENATOR MORRIS:

17. Pursuant to Rule No. 11, I would request that we have the  
18. debate and the vote on this issue tomorrows Session.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

20. Is there any further discussion? Senator Morris has asked that  
21. his motion in writing be heard tomorrow. Leave is granted. So  
22. ordered. Yes, Senator, we are now going to move with leave of the  
23. Body, we will move to the order of resolutions. The Chair will  
24. recognize Senator Partee.

25. SENATOR PARTEE:

26. We will yield to Senator Palmer. The resolution, Benny.

27. SENATOR PALMER:

28. The...Mr. President and members of the Senate, the Secretary  
29. has a Resolution there honoring Doctor Preston Bradley who has been  
30. and is an eminent and distinctive citizen of the City of Chicago. The  
31. Resolution addresses himself to his distinction as a fifty year member  
32. of the Chicago Public Library Board and besides serving on that Board  
33. he also has a great distinction of many, many contributions to the



1. community of Chicago, and I ask the adoption of this Resolution.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Senator Howard Mohr.

4. SENATOR MOHR:

5. Yes, Mr. President, I'd like to be shown on there as a cosponsor  
6. of this Resolution to talk about Doctor Bradley's many fine contri-  
7. butions and works would take the day of this Senate. But I would  
8. just briefly mention that Doctor Bradley has been the chief mover  
9. or participant in a Grand Army of the Republic Ceremony in the  
10. Village of Forest Park for nearly fifty years. And he's been out  
11. there one...one Sunday, the...the Sunday before Memorial Day for  
12. the past fifty years. Missed one day out of that entire period.  
13. And I'd be happy to be shown as a cosponsor.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Is there leave for all Senate members to be shown as cosponsors?  
16. Leave. This fine gentleman is with us today. He is eighty-seven  
17. years of age and has made a significant contribution to the American  
18. scene. He founded the People's Church over fifty years ago and has  
19. continuously been its minister and has been a beacon light for all  
20. things progressive and worthwhile during the many years he has  
21. lived in Chicago. Let's have a word from Doctor Preston Bradley.

22. DOCTOR BRADLEY:

23. I can't begin to express the feelings of my heart at this moment.  
24. I have been coming to Springfield and to this Capitol since I was a  
25. high school student. I have watched its deliberations and been the  
26. beneficiary of its activities as a citizen in our community. I am  
27. almost speechless and that's a new, a new situation for me. I am  
28. almost speechless in an effort to express my appreciation for the  
29. honor which you have conferred upon me. I have lived a long time.  
30. I will be eighty-eight years old at my next birthday, which isn't  
31. far away. But one of the things that I'm the most proud of as I  
32. come to the sunset of my own life is the fact that never once, and  
33. I've been more than fifty years in radio, the whole length of the

1. time on television, and never once, publicly or privately, have I  
2. ever attacked any persons race or any persons religion. That is  
3. the record that I want to leave to posterity. I honor every persons  
4. loyalties. I think loyalty is a basic virtue. Loyal people, that's  
5. basic in human relations. And I have tried to honor every persons  
6. race and every persons religion. That is the only epitaph that I  
7. personally endorse about myself. This hour in which we are living  
8. is probably the most pregnant hour of human history. We are on the  
9. threshold of the greatest change in national and international  
10. activities this country has ever seen. I think this is probably the  
11. most serious moment in certainly our history, and in many areas,  
12. the history of the world. Decisions are going to be made in the  
13. next five years that will change the course of history for a thousand  
14. years. And Gentlemen, to be a part of an hour like this is not only  
15. a great privilege, but it is an ever increasing responsibility.  
16. Never in the whole history of the democratic process has there ever  
17. been a time when we were going to face within the short time of five  
18. years decisions that's going to change the course of human history.  
19. To be a part of that hour, to have a voice in it, is one of the great  
20. opportunities that the citizenry of this country has ever had in our  
21. whole history. We are in for an era of such basic transition that  
22. if we make the highest contribution we can, we have no time to lose.  
23. We have no energy to dissipate. We must utilize every principle of  
24. freedom that the mind and heart of man have ever developed. I shall  
25. not live to see it, but there are young men in this room and in this  
26. Body who will. The greatest opportunity of human history is unfold-  
27. ing, and the mark of great character is not how we live life from  
28. day to day. It's not how we administer the commonalities of life,  
29. the great test of life is what we do in an emergency. It is the  
30. emergency that tests the character and the ability. I welcome the  
31. emergencies of the next five years. They will be many and unpre-  
32. cedented. I probably will not be able to share them, but I welcome  
33. them, for I believe there is a destiny involved of this country.

1. We are the one last hope of mankind for basic freedom, and if we  
2. permit anything to mutilate that, any self-interest, any nationalism,  
3. anything to eliminate that truth, we're in trouble, deep, deep  
4. trouble. I am greatly honored, Ladies and Gentlemen, for the honor  
5. which you have conferred upon me this day. I shall never forget it.  
6. And now, let us greet the future as the poet Browning greeted it  
7. with a "C H E E R".

8. PRESIDENT:

9. The Resolution is adopted. Senator Donnewald.

10. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

11. Yes, Mr. President, I think that all the members should be  
12. attentive. I...I...could I have the attention of the Body, Mr.  
13. President.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. One moment. Just before you do that, Senator Donnewald, Mrs.  
16. Bradley is here. We'd like for her to stand, take a bow and be  
17. recognized by the Senate. Senator Donnewald.

18. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

19. Yes...

20. PRESIDENT:

21. One moment, Senator Soper had asked.

22. SENATOR SOPER:

23. Mr. President and members of the Senate, rise on a point of  
24. personal privilege. And in the balcony immediately behind the  
25. President, we have a class of students from Morton Junior College  
26. with Professor Langert, their teacher, students in the class of  
27. State and Local Government have come down here to get some pearls  
28. of wisdom, and I think they were very privileged in listening to  
29. Doctor Preston Bradley. Very few students have the opportunity to  
30. be here at the right time, and I think if you've listened to Doctor  
31. Preston Bradley, you'll...you've learned something if you take  
32. that to your heart. Would you please rise and be recognized by the  
33. Senate. Please. Thank you very much.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Senator...Senator Donnewald.

3. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

4. Yes...yes, Mr. President, I think this is rather important to  
5. all members now...

6. PRESIDENT:

7. One minute, Senator Donnewald. Will the members be in their  
8. seats and those not entitled to the Floor, please leave the Floor.  
9. Senator Donnewald.

10. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

11. We all know that the deadline for Senate Bills in committee is  
12. Friday, and we know the crunch that we've had now because of that,  
13. why, no House Bills have been scheduled. We're back on the six  
14. day rule, the notice, you know, for House Bills. Now, I've been  
15. advised that there are very few, if any, House Bills set for next  
16. week. Now, I still can't...I think...

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Just one moment. Senator Merritt, Senate...would you gentle-  
19. men just hold it down. He can't hear. Go right ahead, Sir.

20. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

21. We're going to be in a position next week of having no  
22. committees active, and I think to alleviate the crunch in June on  
23. House Bills, we should set bills now because I've been advised that  
24. we're going to have a hundred and eighty House Bills come over  
25. here Friday. So, if you have House Bills ready to go, I would  
26. recommend that if you want them heard and get a good hearing, set  
27. them now for next week. Thank you.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Any further...Senator Course.

30. SENATOR COURSE:

31. Yes, Mr. President and members of the Senate, Revenue will meet  
32. at 2:30 this afternoon in Room 400. I would advise all sponsors  
33. of bills that are in Revenue to be there this afternoon. We will

1. try to take care of all these bills this afternoon so we will not  
2. have to have a meeting this evening. Thank you.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Any further announcements? Some of you were not...will the  
5. members be in their seats. Some of you were not here this morning  
6. at the beginning of the Session, and something rather significant  
7. happened this morning. Senator Michael Brady from the 11th District  
8. was sworn in, the district who replaced Senator Saperstein. I don't  
9. know if all of you met him. I would like for him to stand and have  
10. a word if you like. Senator Michael Brady, 11th District.

11. SENATOR BRADY:

12. Thank you, Mr. President. I'm...I never expected that I'd  
13. have the honor to serve in such dignified Body. I pledged when I  
14. sought the appointment of the district to work as hard as I could  
15. to fulfill the goals of the people of the 11th District, and I'm  
16. looking forward to the support of all the...you distinguished  
17. gentlemen in helping me to do that. Thank you very much.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Any further business to come before the Senate? The Senate  
20. stands adjourned until 11...until 9 o'clock tomorrow morning. The  
21. Senate is adjourned.
