9 which is a National Day of Prayer, 1976, issued over the
10 hand and seal of Gerald R. Ford the President of the United
11 States, and it reads as follows:

12 In this Bicentennial year we will often reflect on the 13 events of two hundred years ago. As we recall the crises 14 of those early days, let us also reflect on the profound faith in God which inspired the founding fathers. As the 15 events of 1776 unfolded, our forebearers knew they were on 16 17 an uncertain course. On March 16th of that year the Continen-18 tal Congress recognizing the impending calamity and distress ... would you hold it just a minute, Senator. This is National 19 20 Prayer Day. Whatever you're talking about can wait...impend-21[.]. ing calamity and distress asked each colony publicly to acknowledge the overruling providence of God and urged the colonies 22 to observe a designated prayer in May as a day of humiliation, 23 fasting and prayer. When later that year the signers of the 24 25 Declaration of Independence pledged to each other their lives, their fortunes and their sacred honor, the pledge was made 26 with a firm alliance on the protection of divine providence. 27 In conformity with the congressional request it is especially 28 29 appropriate this year that a day be set aside to reaffirm the commitment of our first citizens and draw on the solemn sense 30 of God's superintending providence that sustained them during 31 those troubled times. Now, therefore, I, Gerald R. Ford, 32 President of the United States of America, do hereby proclaim 33

1 Friday, May 14th, 1976 as National Day of Prayer, 1976. I 2 call upon all Americans to pray that day, each in his own 3 ... his or her own way for the strength to meet the challenges 4 of the future with the same courage and dedication Americans 5 showed the world two centuries ago. In witness whereof I 6 have here and to set my hand this 16th day of March in the 7 year of our Lord, 1976 and of the independence of the United 8 States of America, the two hundredth, Gerald R. Ford.

9 I wanted to read that into our record as a part of
10 our Journal for this day. There is a time when we must re11 consider what has happened in the past and use it to buttress
12 us in the present and to make resonable assessments for the
