20. define the actual design and construction, it's page 2 on line 6 through  
21. 8. It deletes the reference to the statute and puts in...in the language,  
22. itself, which is - further the General Assembly declares that a guide  
23. for minimal control of plumbing materials and fixtures, design of plumb-  
24. ing systems and construction and insulation methods of plumbing systems  
25. is essential for the protection of public health in order to insure  
26. plumbing skill and authoratively establish what shall be good plumbing  
27. practice. This Act provides for the licensing of plumbers and for the  
28. promulgation of a minimum Plumbing Code of Standards by the Department.  
29. This amendment was worked out with the Plumbers' Union and the Department  
30. of Public Health, and both are in full agreement with this provision. I  
31. would move for adoption of Amendment No. 1.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

33. Senator Savickas has moved the adoption of Committee Amendment No.

1 1 to House Bill 1401. Any discussion? Senator Glass.

2 SENATOR GLASS:

3 Yes, Mr. President, by way of discussion. We're not...I'm not

12 Well, Mr. President and members of the Senate. I would oppose the  
13 adoption of this amendment, which pertains...this Act pertains to the  
14 Illinois School Student Records Act and the amendment upon which we  
15 are about to vote would delete all private schools, as I recall we're  
16 talking about private elementary and secondary, but also higher educa-  
17 tion, and this is in contradiction to the Federal Act and a number of us  
18 on both sides of the aisle in the Education Committee felt that this was  
19 not a reasonable step to take. It is an Act which is to benefit the  
20 rights of students and parents in regard to proper recordation which  
21 can follow a student all of his life and I...I, frankly, don't under-  
22 stand why it should be that a large segment of our educational entities  
23 should not have this responsibility. Especially, since the Federal Act,  
24 of course, does apply to all. At the very least, I think, we conclud-  
25 ed that any of the private schools that were under the Federal Act,  
26 as really most of them are, because almost all of our private schools  
27 are receiving Federal aid, of one type or another, ought to be under  
28 this. So, I...I would ask, Mr. President, I think it's a important  
29 amendment, that we have a roll call vote on it. I...I would hope that  
30 we could resist the amendment. I think the bill is a good bill and it  
31 ought to pass. As you know, the League of Women Voters have strenuously  
32 worked toward this and I think that the amendment would weaken the  
33 bill greatly. So, I would oppose the amendment.

1 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

2 Mr. Sergeant-at-Arms, would you ring the bell, please? Senator  
3 Netsch.

4 SENATOR NETSCH:

5 Mr. President, I join Senator Fawell in opposing the amendment. I  
6 spent a great deal of time meeting with and listening to the discussions  
7 of the task force which produced this bill on privacy of school records.  
8 They did consider the issue very carefully and it seems to me that the  
9 conclusion that private schools should be included within this privacy  
10 bill is a proper conclusion. I think the argument suggested by some of  
11 the private schools that this constitutes an interference with them as  
12 private institutions is not valid, because the rights that are being  
13 protected by this Act are those of the students and it has nothing to  
14 do, really, with the institution. It is not their privacy which is at  
15 stake. It is that of those who are students in the school, and the  
16 privacy of those students is just as important, whether they are in a  
17 private school or in a public school. So, for that reason, I would urge,  
18 also, that the private schools be included within the scope of the Act  
19 and that the amendment be rejected.

20 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

21 Senator Wooten.

22 SENATOR WOOTEN:

23 Mr. President, as is unfortunately the case, once opposition  
24 surfaces we begin to capture attention. I would like before we go  
25 to a vote to have a restatement of the position for adopting the  
26 amendment.

27 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

28 It will, in fact, be done. Thank you, Senator. Any further  
29 discussion? May we have some attention? If we'd break up some of  
30 the meetings. This is a pretty significant amendment, I'm told. If

12. this...this amendment, of course, would eliminate private, or nonpublic  
13. schools if there are any of them that receive any kind of State or Fed-  
14. eral money, it seems to me they ought to, also, be covered by this dis-  
15. closure or this procedural requirement for disclosing to the parents of  
16. children in school their school records and that is the Federal law and  
17. I think what we're doing with this very excellent bill of Senator Brady's  
18. is implementing the State law. Well, I...

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

20. Senator..... Excuse me, Senator. Senator Graham, for what pur-  
21. pose do you arise?

22. SENATOR GRAHAM:

23. Mr. President, it's absolutely, absolutely, utterly impossible.  
24. If this is an important amendment let's get some order so we know what  
25. the devil we're talking about. I know you're trying, and I feel sorry  
26. for you in your position.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

28. Thank you. I appreciate the sympathy. May we have a little order,  
29. please. Senator Glass, pardon me. You may continue.

30. SENATOR GLASS:

31. Thank you, Mr. President. Yes, it is an important amendment. The  
32. bill which I think is an excellent bill, sets up procedural requirements  
33. for disclosing school records to parents of students and if I understand

1. the Federal law, parents are entitled to these records. The bill es-  
2. tablishes procedures for, providing them with those records. The amend-  
3. ment would eliminate the nonpublic schools. The point I'm making is I  
4. think we should defeat the amendment and keep...keep the bill applicable  
5. to all schools. Thank you, Mr. President.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

7. Senator Brady has moved the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 1.  
8. If there is no further discussion, Senator Brady will please close the  
9. debate.

10. SENATOR BRADY:

11. Yes, in answer to Senator Wooten, who wanted a further description  
12. of why the amendment was put on. There was some opposition because  
13. of the fact that the private schools who would be covered under this...

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

15. Senator Carroll, Senator Brady is attempting to explain Amendment  
16. No. 1. Senator Brady.

17. SENATOR BRADY:

18. ...amendment would incur an extra cost of hiring personnel to keep  
19. track of this record. They further...opposition had to do with areas  
20. of education in the private sectors such as seminaries and things like  
21. that where the school records may be a different subject and a different  
22. matter than is in the public school sector. I...the Committee on Educa-  
23. tion, a majority of them adopted this amendment and I urge your support.

17 Thank you, Mr. President, I rise to oppose the amendment as I did  
18 in committee with several others. This is exactly the opposite of what  
19 this Chamber has already done by ample discussion, and it concerns the  
20 area of interest on the deposits for rental properties. What we have  
21 done in the past was to say that that interest is payable yearly. This  
22 amendment says that if they stay there more than a year they don't have  
23 to pay any interest till the end of the term, which after extensions  
24 could be 2, 3, 5, 10 years. I think the purpose of the Legislation  
25 originally and as the Senate, this Session, has passed this legislation  
26 with the intent that those interest payments be made yearly back to the  
27 tenant, and not be held forever and ever at a very low rate of interest  
28 for the operators of the structure to use for financing their business.  
29 I would oppose this amendment.

30 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

31 I wonder if we might hold this, Senator. Okay. Take it out of the

19 can be pierced. And they are permanent significant loss of an im-  
20 portant body function, serious permanent disfigurement, and while I  
21 personally request...preferred serious permanent injury, I acceded to  
22 the request of the group I have earlier tried to identify, by limiting  
23 reason five to pierce the threshold to the simple delineation of per-  
24 manent injury. And then, of course, we leave the existing language in  
25 the bill as it now is as a result of Senator Fawell's Amendment which  
26 the Senate did adopt earlier. So, I would be glad to respond to any  
27 question. This does relax the limitations of the threshold signifi-  
28 cantly, and if there are no further questions I would move for the  
29 adoption of Amendment No. 5.

30 PRESIDENT:

31 Any discussion? Senator Harris moves the adoption of Amendment  
32 No. 5 to Senate Bill 1500. Those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed Nay.  
33 The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted

1. who wish? Take the record. On this question the Ayes are 34, the

17. The next two amendments proffered by Senators Rock and Lemke are

20. Amendment No. 6 by Senator Mitchler.  
21. PRESIDENT:  
22. Senator Mitchler. Are you joining this happy group? Senator Mitchler.  
23. SENATOR MITCHLER:  
24. Mr. President and members of the Senate. Senate Amendment No.  
25. 6 to Senate Bill 1500 provides that no insurer providing coverage un-  
26. der the provisions of this Article shall make any payment or give any-  
27. thing of value, either directly or indirectly, to an uninsured motorist.  
28. And any violation of this paragraph is a business offense and punisha-  
29. ble by a five hundred dollar fine. Now, I'd like to explain the reason  
30. for the amendment. When you're talking about automobile insurance,  
31. hardly a month goes by, and I'm stretching it out, because sometimes I  
32. get several calls a week from people who are involved in automobile  
33. accidents where the person that they're involved in the accident with has

1. no insurance, and there is little way that they can collect for damages  
2. inflicted upon them. But an occasion occurred where two people were  
3. involved in an automobile accident and both, at the time, indicated  
4. that they did have insurance. Person number A reported this to the  
5. insurance company, his insurance company, the next day and several  
6. days later in...in trying to contact and find out about the insurance  
7. of person B, he found out that person B did not have insurance. And  
8. upon contacting person B, was informed by person B that the insurance  
9. company of company A had written a check on the spot without even  
10. getting estimates of damage to the car in the amount of four hundred  
11. and eighty-eight dollars. Whereas the person with car A was unable  
12. to collect because of no liability on the part of the...or insurance  
13. on the part of car A...car B. I cannot understand why an insurance  
14. company would provide and make payment of a claim without even consult-  
15. ing the person that does have insurance. Now, that's what this does,  
16. and I think this will eliminate insurance companies from being quick  
17. to make payments of claim just to settle something and get it out of  
18. the way when somebody doesn't even have insurance. It's beyond my  
19. comprehension how they would even enter into that, and everybody I've  
20. told this story to shakes their head in the same manner. And that's  
21. what this amendment would do in this Act.

22. PRESIDENT:

23.       Senator Bell.

24. SENATOR BELL:

25.       Yes...

26. PRESIDENT:

27.       Just one moment, Senator Bell. Is there a leave for the Chicago  
28. Tribune to take some additional pictures. I think they have enough

2. SENATOR BELL:

3. I wanted to address several questions to Senator Mitchler in  
4. reference to the amendment, Mr. President.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. He indicates he'll yield.

7. SENATOR BELL:

8. Senator Mitchler, uninsured motorist coverage refers, specifically,  
9. to a portion of automobile insurance that deals with bodily injury.  
10. Now, does your...does your amendment address itself to the bodily in-  
11. jury aspect or to the...or to the liability aspect pertaining to...to  
12. collision or what. I'm not too sure just what you're referring to in  
13. the amendment.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Senator Mitchler.

16. SENATOR MITCHLER:

17. Well, the amendment is...is very clear that no settlement of any  
18. claim will be made by an insurance company to someone who doesn't have  
19. insurance. That's what the amendment does. And that will...why should  
20. ...why, Senator, should someone that doesn't have insurance be paid by  
21. an insurance company. Now, you probably shake your head and say such  
22. a thing wouldn't happen, but I can give you factual proof that an in-  
23. surance company did, and it's a very reputable insurance company. And  
24. if they're making that type of payment, I am paying for it because I'm  
25. the one that's insured and making premium payments to that insurance  
26. company. If that's the way they're spending the money, no wonder my  
27. insurance rates are going up, up, up.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Senator Bell.

30. SENATOR BELL:

31. Well, I...I'm really not too sure just what you you're...the type  
32. of situation that you're addressing yourself to, Senator Mitchler,  
33. there...I suppose could be any number of reasons why the insurance

1. company may have felt that they had to do that. I don't believe that  
2. insurance companies, by nature, in...in the business of throwing money  
3. away. But, I...I don't understand the...I guess I'm just not under-  
4. standing the thrust of the amendment, but...okay, thank you, Mr.  
5. President.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Senator Harris.

8. SENATOR HARRIS:

9. Well, Mr. President, I rise in opposition to this amendment. It  
10. states very clearly that any insurer, either directly or and the key  
11. word, I believe, is indirectly, pays for the recovery of any claim as  
12. a result of the bill that is before us that provides for first party  
13. benefits for everybody involved would be subject to a fine of five  
14. hundred dollars. Now, the concept of No-Fault if it is to be effective  
15. its got to provide first party benefits. The bill mandates coverage  
16. for the...for all operators, and to have this very difficult language  
17. inserted into the bill would render the bill very difficult to interpret  
18. if it becomes law, and further the language indirectly paying a claim  
19. is construction that is just almost impossible to administer, particularly,  
20. in the light of the imposition of a five hundred dollar fine. So, I  
21. would urge that the Senate reject this amendment. At the conclusion  
22. of debate I would be prepared to Table Amendment No. 6.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Senator Glass. Senator Fawell.

25. SENATOR FAWELL:

26. Well, Mr. President and members of the Senate, I would join with  
27. Senator Harris. I think the intent here is...is fine, but as I under-  
28. stand the amendment even if the uninsured motorist, let's say he's from  
29. out of State, but as I understand it you don't necessarily have to be  
30. insured, you certainly should be, but if he's in the right and this seems  
31. to say the insurance company or my insurance company can't pay him, well,  
32. that means I'm going to have to pay him then, I guess, if he sues me  
33. and I'm in the wrong. So, I...I just don't think...where...whereas the

1. intent, I think, is great and in all practicality the amendment, I  
2. think, is just completely unworkable.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Any further discussion? Senator Rock.

5. SENATOR ROCK:

6. The question of the sponsor is, I...if he will yield.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. He indicates he will.

9. SENATOR ROCK:

10. As I understand this amendment, and perhaps I don't, it would  
11. seem to say that...that I lose my standing as a plaintiff unless I  
12. have insurance. Is that correct?

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Senator Mitchler.

15. SENATOR MITCHLER:

16. I would assume that because I think by being uninsured and being  
17. that burden on society, I think that you would lose that right.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Senator Rock.

20. SENATOR ROCK:

21. Well, I...I rise in support of the forthcoming motion to Table.  
22. I...I just don't think we can cavalierly deny people, you know, the  
23. question of No-Fault and who's...who's defining it. It's bad enough  
24. to restrict one's right to sue, but to take it away altogether on the  
25. basis that he doesn't have insurance, is just...is just not right and  
26. I would support Senator Harris' motion.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Senator Harris moves that Amendment No....Senator Mitchler.

29. SENATOR MITCHLER:

30. If I may just sum up the debate. Well, Senate, in answer to  
31. Senator Rock's final question about taking away the...entirely the  
32. right of the plaintiff to bring suit. You are doing that partially  
33. under the No-Fault Insurance Plan and the limitations and restrictions

1. being placed on, and so that is, in itself, an impingement upon the  
2. right...on the right of the plaintiff. But the whole thing goes  
3. down to just basic facts. The people that call me on the telephone,  
4. and come to me and just complain because they got their car totally  
5. demolished, and they have to go out and replace it with their hard  
6. earned money, because they're working and they have insurance, and  
7. there is no recourse against these people. And, then, surprisingly  
8. enough, legitimate insurance companies will go out and write a check  
9. and settle a claim and pay the uninsured motorist. Now, that is a  
10. fact and I can substantiate it with documented evidence. So, when  
11. you have a case like that with...with insurance companies doing that,  
12. why I question the integrity and the validity of...of their sincerity  
13. in this No-Fault Insurance Program, and that's why I put this amend-  
14. ment in there that would do exactly that, prohibiting them from go-  
15. ing out and paying an uninsured motorist settlement on a claim when  
16. an insured motorist can't get a dime out of the other person.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Senator Mitchler moves the adoption of Amendment No. 6. Senator  
19. Harris moves that that amendment lay upon the Table. All in favor of  
20. Tabling the amendment will vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. The voting  
21. is open. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question  
22. the Ayes are 36, the Nays are 4, with 1 Voting Present. Amendment No.  
23. 6 is Tabled. Any further amendments?

24. SECRETARY:

25. Amendment No. 7 offered by Senator Carroll.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Senator Carroll. Amendment No. 7.

28. SENATOR CARROLL:

29. Thank you, Mr. President. And, Mr. Secretary, is that the one  
30. on section 661? By deleting provisions except that...

31. PRESIDENT:

32. It is, Sir.

33. SENATOR CARROLL:

1. Okay. Thank you, Mr. President, this deals with the severability  
2. question and takes out the exemption...

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Moment, just a moment. The first thing we'll ask is that the  
5. aisle be cleared, that the members be in their seats, that persons  
6. not entitled to the Floor please leave the Floor and that the members  
7. hold down their voices. Senator Carroll.

8. SENATOR CARROLL:

9. Thank you, Mr. President. This deals with the severability  
10. section. The general section had been a severability one except in  
11. one instance, and that said that if one particular section was held  
12. unconstitutional be conclusively presumed that the...the whole Act  
13. would not have passed. This amendment takes out that prohibition  
14. from severability and says if any portion thereof, the rest of these  
15. great benefits will go to the people. And I would move the adoption  
16. of the amendment.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Any further discussion? Any further discussion? The question is  
19. shall the...Senator Glass.

20. SENATOR GLASS:

21. Thank you, Mr. President. I would like to ask a question of the  
22. sponsor of the amendment.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. He indicates he'll yield.

25. SENATOR GLASS:

26. Senator Carroll, as I understood your explanation, if any section  
27. of the Act as the bill now stands, if any section of the Act is held  
28. unconstitutional the entire Act is unconstitutional. Is that...is that  
29. correct, and...and this is what you'd be changing?

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Exactly what he did not say.

32. SENATOR CARROLL:

33. No. Exactly the opposite, Senator Glass. The way the law is

1. now, without my amendment that says - if any section other than 652E,  
2. is held unconstitutional, the rest of the Act is still in force in  
3. effect is constitutional. The bill said that if that particular section  
4. fell the whole thing fell. I'm taking out that prohibition, so that  
5. if any section falls the rest of it stands.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Senator Glass.

8. SENATOR GLASS:

9. And what...what is it that that section does, Senator Carroll?

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Senator Carroll.

12. SENATOR CARROLL:

13. I shall be more than happy to read it to you. Pardon me, Senator  
14. Harris.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. He is suggesting that your answer could be one word.

17. SENATOR CARROLL:

18. I've never seen Senator Harris meet that restriction. And this  
19. would be the partial abolition of tort. In other words it's the  
20. limitation section.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. Senator Glass.

23. SENATOR GLASS:

24. Well, I...that's what I suspected. In other words, this is the  
25. threshold section, and you're saying that even if that were declared un-  
26. constitutional, the bill would nevertheless be valid, so that  
27. would mean that there might be a No-Fault Bill without a threshold,  
28. and I certainly think that would be unfortunate, and would urge all  
29. the members to oppose this amendment.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Any further discussion? Senator Fawell.

32. SENATOR FAWELL:

33. Well, I...I would rise in support of the amendment, and point out

1. to the Body that all the other provisions can be knocked off, all the  
2. benefits which the consumer is being granted by means of this bill -  
3. prompt payment; the required negotiation out of court, all of these  
4. things can be knocked off and the bill still stands, and the consumer  
5. can suffer one by one by one. But, insofar as the threshold provision  
6. is concerned, which is to say that provision which takes away the...

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Just a minute, Senator. Now, we're delighted to have our friends  
9. from the House visit with us. We will ask them to hold down their  
10. voices and keep your conferences at a minimum. Now...now, just a minute,  
11. just a minute. We must have order. It's essential for doing business  
12. in an orderly fashion. Senator Fawell.

13. SENATOR FAWELL:

14. Yeah. Well, let me put it this way. I...I think the bill as it  
15. now stands simply states that this threshold is so very, very important  
16. that if it's knocked out the whole bill goes down. But, on the other  
17. hand all the other beneficial portions which are certainly beneficial  
18. to the consumer, can be knocked off and the bill is still going to stand.  
19. Now, it has to be one way or the other, I think. You just can't have  
20. it all one way for the benefit of the insurance industry, with all due  
21. respect to that industry. And, thus, I think, the amendment that has  
22. been suggested by Senator Carroll is eminently fair. Or else we'll  
23. turn it around and simply say we don't have the severability clause.  
24. What is a severability clause, but that, if you have one or more  
25. portions of the whole declared unconstitutional, the remainder will  
26. stand. We just can't...I don't think it's fair to...to give protection  
27. basically only to the one integral clause that the insurance industry  
28. is so concerned about. It has to be one way or the other, and I think  
29. the amendment is eminently fair.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Senator Harris.

32. SENATOR HARRIS:

33. Well, Senator Fawell has touched on the principles that's involved

1. here, and...and there is no question about it. This section is, as a  
2. matter of fact, the guts of No-Fault. If in fact, we are going to,  
3. significantly, adjust the reparations system for the operation of a  
4. motor vehicle, and wring the water out of the litigation process, we've  
5. got to have the principle of a significant and meaningful threshold  
6. below which we have full operation of No-Fault, and above which you  
7. have the existing opportunity for tort recovery. Now, the bill's in  
8. that kind of shape now and the whole key to No-Fault concept is this  
9. threshold, and if...if you don't have that in...at an effective level,  
10. you might just as well continue the existing system of responsibility  
11. in the operation of a motor vehicle. If this amendment is adopted you  
12. will have, in effect then, mandatory insurance, mandatory requirement  
13. to pay, but the whole present system of litigation added on. And this  
14. is a critical amendment, and if you are in favor of a meaningful No-  
15. Fault system then you will reject this amendment, because it really  
16. does strike at the heart of the whole concept of No-Fault. I would  
17. urge the membership to reject Senator Carroll's amendment.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Senator Carroll may close the debate.

20. SENATOR CARROLL:

21. Thank you, Mr. President. And I noticed that Senator Harris was  
22. a little bit at loss to use just one word to say reject, as he had  
23. hoped that I could...I will yield to his point of personal privilege  
24. I would assume.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Senator Harris.

27. SENATOR HARRIS:

28. Well, Senator Glass' question - which section does this apply  
29. to, and I think everyone would recognize the single word threshold  
30. would focus attention.

31. SENATOR CARROLL:

32. So would they recognize reject. But, anyway, I think the point  
33. of the Act is very simple. Threshold is but one element, one element.



1. Our neighbors in the other Chamber have said that there is a different  
2. concept of what's known loosely as the Oregon Plan, which would not  
3. have a threshold, but would still provide substantial benefits to the  
4. people of Illinois, and I think they have expressed themselves by way  
5. of amendment, although, that's not determinative of what we must do.  
6. It does show us one thing, however. It shows us that under a No-  
7. Fault Plan, however you define it, there are a lot of things in  
8. there besides a threshold. There is mandatory insurance, which many  
9. of us think is very good, very good. There are protected benefits,  
10. which many of us think is also very good. The point of it all as  
11. Senator Fawell said is - it's a should be an all or nothing game.  
12. If there are a lot of benefits to the people, then if any one section  
13. falls, the rest should stand. They are saying, the industry is saying,  
14. if we can't have our threshold, we don't want to give the people  
15. the rest of the benefits that they could get under No-Fault. I think  
16. that's wrong. If one section falls either it all falls, or if one  
17. section falls, like we do in most other good legislation, the rest of  
18. it stands for the benefit of the people. I would urge those who are  
19. truly interested in benefiting the people under all circumstances...  
20. and we know the court, at times has stricken down the thresholds as being  
21. unconstitutional. There are enough other benefits in this program  
22. that should inure to the benefit of the people, and I would urge adoption  
23. of the amendment. Thank you, Mr. President.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Senator Carroll moves the adoption of Amendment No. 7. Those in  
26. favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open.  
27. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question the Ayes  
28. are 26, the Nays are 27. The amendment fails. For what purpose does  
29. Senator Carroll arise?

30. SENATOR CARROLL:

31. I would appreciate the verification of the negative vote, Mr.  
32. President.

33. PRESIDENT

1. Senator Carroll requests a verification of the negative vote.  
2. Will the members be in their seats, and will the Secretary call the  
3. negative votes.  
4. SECRETARY:  
5. The following voted in the negative: Bell, Berning, Chew,  
6. Davidson, Demuzio, Glass, Harber Hall, Harris, Hickey, Johns, Joyce,  
7. Lane, Merritt, Mitchler, Howard Mohr, Don Moore, Morris, Netsch,  
8. Nimrod, Ozinga, Philip, Regner, Roe, Schaffer, Sommer, Weaver and  
9. Mr. President.  
10. PRESIDENT:  
11. The roll call has been verified. Amendment No. 8.  
12. SECRETARY:  
13. Amendment No. 8 offered by Senator McCarthy.  
14. PRESIDENT:  
15. Senator McCarthy.  
16. SENATOR MCCARTHY:  
17. Yeah. Mr. President, I'd like to have leave to withdraw this one.  
18. This one is not at such moment, so I'd like to have leave to withdraw it.  
19. PRESIDENT:  
20. Amendment No. 8 is withdrawn. Are there further amendments?  
21. SECRETARY:  
22. Amendment No. 8 by Senator Hickey.  
23. PRESIDENT:  
24. Senator Hickey is recognized for Amendment No. 8.  
25. SENATOR HICKEY:  
26. Mr. President, I passed out Amendment No. 8 yesterday, only it had  
27. the number twelve on it. What it does is to delete the section under  
28. collateral sources and it makes no substitutions, and that's that sec-  
29. tion that we would delete reads - where benefits as required by this  
30. Article are provided by more than one policy or company, such benefits  
31. may not be recovered by any person on a duplicative basis. My contention  
32. is, that if someone holds two policies, has paid the premiums for two  
33. policies, that he would be able to collect on two policies. Number one,

1. that's the main...main reason for this. Secondly, if this were left  
2. in, experience has shown that the insurance companies fight each other  
3. about which one is going to pay and the consumer, the policyholder is  
4. left in a position of almost having had no coverage at all. Now, if  
5. insurance companies want to write this into policies and the insured  
6. wants to sign a policy which has this in it, which I understand is  
7. the case very often, that's between the insurance company and the  
8. policyholder, and this doesn't pertain to that. But, I certainly see  
9. no reason why the State of Illinois should give insurance companies the  
10. windfall of...of not paying for policies which the policyholder has  
11. paid premiums for, and I enlist your support of this as a good  
12. piece of consumer legislation. And I...I move its adoption.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Senator Harris.

15. SENATOR HARRIS:

16. Well, Mr. President, the fact is that I will state it this way.  
17. Every policy that I'm familiar with has a provision in it against  
18. excess benefits or excess coverage, and in those cases where an in-  
19. sured has sought to over insure, there is a provision for prorating.  
20. It is certainly inconsistent with the public policy of any constituency  
21. to invite over insurance. The principle behind that being, to prevent  
22. people from deliberately acquiring for the benefits of such insurance  
23. coverage. I honestly believe that Senator Hickey's amendment is a  
24. nullity, but I would not want to obscure the very important question  
25. of providing an effective No-Fault law for Illinois than to get into  
26. this question of over insurance and duplicate coverage. It's incon-  
27. sistent with the principle of insurance, and I would urge the Senate  
28. to reject this amendment. Now, one further point that Senator Hickey  
29. made and that was that, companies spend so much time arguing with each  
30. other, the very fact is that No-Fault as relates to motor vehicle cover-  
31. age, will eliminate that arguing except in those cases where the limita-  
32. tions have been pierced. This amendment will do nothing, in my judge-  
33. ment to serve consumers, because they just can't be over insured, and

1. the fact is that it will only obscure and confuse and, therefore, should  
2. be rejected.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Any further discussion? Senator Hickey moves the adoption of  
5. Amendment...Senator Bell.

6. SENATOR BELL:

7. Yes. There's a...I'd like to address myself just slightly more  
8. to the point that...or Senator Harris is making in reference to this.  
9. And that is, the very vital principle in any type of insurance of in-  
10. demnity. That's what we're talking about here. Indemnity, and that  
11. is that the insured not be placed in a position that he was not in  
12. before the loss occurred. In other words, he's not going to gain finan-  
13. cially by having insurance other than to the point of indemnification.  
14. That is, to reach where he was before the accident occurred. As I see  
15. Senator Hickey's amendment, that principle that is vital to the principle  
16. of insurance of indemnification is violated.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Senator Wooten.

19. SENATOR WOOTEN:

20. I don't know, between these contending giants, it seems to me  
21. that Senator Hickey has thrown a statement that is clear and simple  
22. and I think desirable. I very much urge the adoption of her amendment.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Senator Buzbee.

25. SENATOR BUZBEE:

26. Mr. President, I don't know much about automobile insurance, I  
27. don't know much about No-Fault insurance, I'm sitting here feeling like  
28. the pawn between two huge industries, that of the trial lawyers and  
29. ...and the insurance industry and I'm to be the referee in their fight.  
30. Unfortunately, I don't know the rules of the game sufficiently to be  
31. able to render a fair decision, but I...I am trying to the best I can.  
32. But, I do know something a little bit about what Senator Bell just talk-  
33. ed about - the indemnity theory. And, let me just ask you, why would

1. anybody, and I've been on the other side of the fence for the most part  
2. all along on this debate, but why would anybody buy two automobile poli-  
3. cies, unless they planned to rip-off the insurance company. It's the  
4. only reason in the world they would buy two automobile policies, and so  
5. I've...I've known of many cases in the hospital indemnification area  
6. where people buy five, ten, fifteen, or twenty different hospital pay-  
7. ment policies which would pay them so much per day for every day they're  
8. in the hospital, and those people spend a lot of time in the hospital.  
9. And they collect a thousand, two thousand dollars a day while they're  
10. there, and I see no reason at all for Senator Hickey's amendment. I...  
11. I think that the only reason that people would buy two policies would be  
12. to try to rip-off the companies.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Any further discussion? Senator Carroll.

15. SENATOR CARROLL:

16. Thank you, Mr. President. I think Senator Puzbee may have raised  
17. a very good point, and I would ask this question of whomever wishes  
18. to answer. I don't think that necessarily they'd be buying two auto-  
19. mobile insurance policies. I think they may have some type of health  
20. plan and some type of auto insurance plan, and there might be a differ-  
21. ence in benefits between the two types of plans, but would they be...would  
22. the sponsors of the bill be willing to amend the bill to provide for  
23. a total repayment of all premiums with interest for all of those poli-  
24. cies that may have had duplicate coverage upon which he received no  
25. benefits. We're saying we don't want him to get unjustly rich by having  
26. had a medical insurance policy and an automobile policy, and I think  
27. that's true. At the same time, I don't think we want the insurance com-  
28. panies to get overly rich by having taken premium dollars, earned in-  
29. terest on them and then not have to pay out any benefits. So, in possi-  
30. bly in lieu of, or as an emendament to Senator Hickey's amendment, may-  
31. be we should have a total return of premium dollar going back for as  
32. long as the policy had been in force, with interest. Would the sponsors  
33. of the bill be agreeable to that?

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Senator Harris.

3. SENATOR HARRIS:

4. Well, you...very frankly, I think that suggestion reaches the  
5. point of impairing contract. We're dealing, here, with the question  
6. of establishing a No-Fault system for the citizens of Illinois. Now,  
7. if Senator Carroll wishes to come with such an amendment sometime  
8. down the road, providing for that, that's just fine. That's his option.  
9. Let's get this matter decided. I think it's perfectly obvious that  
10. Senator Hickey's amendment is, in fact, unacceptable because it does  
11. impair the concept of indemnification, and for that very simple reason  
12. ought to be rejected. And if there is no further debate, I would move  
13. to Table Senator Hickey's amendment.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Senator Hickey.

16. SENATOR HICKEY:

17. I resist that motion to Table.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Senator Hickey has offered Amendment No. 8 for adoption. Senator  
20. Harris has moved to Table that amendment. Those in favor of Tabling  
21. Amendment No. 8 will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting  
22. is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the  
23. record. On this question the Ayes are 30, the...the Nays are 27. The  
24. motion fails. Senator Hickey has requested a verification of the  
25. affirmative vote. Will the...will the members be in their seats, and  
26. will the Secretary call those voting in the affirmative.

27. SECRETARY:

28. The following voted in the affirmative: Bell, Berning, Bloom,  
29. Brady, Buzbee, Chew, Clarke, Davidson, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall,  
30. Harris, Lane, Latherow, Merritt, Mitchler, Howard Mohr, Don Moore,  
31. Nimrod, Ozinga, Philip, Regner, Roe, Romano, Savickas, Schaffer, Shapiro,  
32. Sommer, Weaver, Mr. President.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. The roll call is verified. Are there further amendments? Amend-  
2. ment No. 9 offered by Senator Netsch. Senator Netsch. Amendment No.  
3. 9.

4. SENATOR NETSCH:

5. Mr. President, I believe Amendment No. 9 is a Threshold Amend-  
6. ment, also. Is that correct, Mr. Secretary? It is not necessary,  
7. now, in light of the earlier amendment that was adopted. I will  
8. withdraw it.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Amendment No. 9 is...is withdrawn. Are there any further amend-  
11. ments? Any further amendments? 3rd reading. For what purpose does  
12. Senator Davidson arise?

13. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

14. A point of personal privilege.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. State your point.

17. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

18. Mr. President, I'd like to present to the members of this Senate,  
19. the American Society of Travel Riders...

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Just one moment, one moment. Will the members be advised that  
22. there are guests in this Gallery who are being introduced. Will the  
23. members be in their seats. Senator Davidson.

24. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

25. Mr. President and members of the Senate, I would like to present  
26. to you a group of American Society Travel Riders, who are here spend-  
27. ing time in Springfield and touring the United States while as Travel  
28. Riders on trips and tours for people who are interested in travel which  
29. pertains to your district. I'd like to present the American Society  
30. of Travel Riders. Would you please rise so we can recognize you, please.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. You may rise and be recognized by the Senate. The Chair would  
33. say to you - if you could get me out of here to Montego Bay right

1. now, I'd be delighted. (Machine cut-off)...Senator Carroll, for what  
2. purpose do you arise?

3. SENATOR CARROLL:

4. Well, I believe, Mr. President, there was another amendment on the  
5. Secretary's Desk.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. There was not another amendment on the Secretary's Desk. Have  
8. you sent one since the bill went to 3rd reading?

9. SENATOR CARROLL:

10. We have sent one while you were discussing it. It had been there  
11. in the past, there has been great confusion, it may have been with-  
12. drawn when there was a typo. I know the President of the Senate and  
13. the Minority Leader were aware...

14. PRESIDENT:

15. I would like the record clear that when I asked - are there further  
16. amendments, I asked not once - but twice...

17. SENATOR CARROLL:

18. And I...

19. PRESIDENT:

20. There was no reply from any member of the Senate, nor was there  
21. one from the Secretary. Hence, the bill went to 3rd reading on that  
22. basis.

23. SENATOR CARROLL:

24. Mr. President, with all due respect, the Secretary was writing on  
25. another amendment at the time. I was then advised that mine was not  
26. sitting at his Desk, at least where he could find it. We sent up  
27. other copies. I was trying to get your attention and ask where this  
28. other amendment was. It had been there, as like thirteen or fourteen  
29. before Amendment 4 had been adopted. We withdrew it in order to re-  
30. draft it, and I know that Senator Harris is aware of its contents.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Senator, I'm not trying to foreclose you. I'm only trying to  
33. keep...



1. SENATOR CARROLL:

2. I understand that.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. ...the record straight.

5. SENATOR CARROLL:

6. I would respectfully request, therefore, that the bill then be re-  
7. turned so that I can offer this amendment.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Senator Lane, what is your pleasure?

10. SENATOR LANE:

11. I'm not familiar with the amendment, so I couldn't respond to it. I  
12. would...my first impression would be and leave it at 3rd.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Senator, would you...let's do this if you don't mind. No, we  
15. won't leave it on 3rd. There...I would suggest that we...you ask  
16. leave to take it back to 2nd, so that when this matter is finalized it  
17. will be representative of what this Body feels and no one will walk  
18. away from here saying that he did not have a chance to offer an amend-  
19. ment. Is there leave. Leave is granted. Read the amendment.

20. SECRETARY:

21. Amendment No. 9 offered by Senator Carroll.

22. SENATOR CARROLL:

23. Thank you, Mr. President. Very simply this amendment...

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Senator Carroll will explain the amendment.

26. SENATOR CARROLL:

27. Thank you. This amendment just adds to the concept. The bill as  
28. drafted would require prospective information with the Director as to  
29. the benefits, potential benefits of No-Fault as it relates to the rates  
30. that they are charging. What this amendment does is give the Director  
31. the clear authority to get the data available from the insurance companies  
32. of prior to No-Fault coverage, so that the Director may compare whatever  
33. the data indicates to have been the situation on premium dollars be-

1. fore No-Fault and after. I think it was a technical defect in the  
2. original drafting. I have discussed this with Senator Harris, I...he  
3. may have further comments, but the whole idea of this is to open the...  
4. doors and let the Director see what the experienced factor has been  
5. both before and after any passage of No-Fault. I would urge the adop-  
6. tion of the amendment.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Senator Harris.

9. SENATOR HARRIS:

10. Well, Mr. President, the fact that this language is not in the  
11. bill as presently before us was not any technical error, but very  
12. deliberate. You talk about apples and oranges, that's exactly what's  
13. involved. The Director and I have consulted with him about the lan-  
14. guage of this amendment - not directly, but through his representative.  
15. The Director wants no part of this amendment. He, presently, has no  
16. authority to establish rates, but only to review them. I don't think  
17. we want to go back to that situation. We now have a competitive rate  
18. system existing in Illinois, and we should see what the prospective re-  
19. sults are if we, in fact, enact a No-Fault system. And that's why that  
20. language is in the bill, so that we can evaluate our results, but  
21. prospectively. Now, the Director rejects out of hand this amendment,  
22. and, I would urge the Senate to do likewise. It...this amendment im-  
23. poses a complete new concept into the regulatory requirement of the  
24. Director. He doesn't want any part of it, and I would hope that the  
25. Senate does not want any part of it. If at the end of discussion, I  
26. would move to Table.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Any further discussion? Senator Fawell.

29. SENATOR FAWELL:

30. Just...just briefly. I think if the Director doesn't want any  
31. part of this, that he certainly should change his mind, because the  
32. insurance...

33. PRESIDENT

1. Just a minute, just a minute.

2. SENATOR FAWELL:

3. Yes, Sir, Mr. President. I believe the Director is supposed to  
4. make a recommendation to keep the rates at a low premium, and once an  
5. experience has been received, we'll work with that data. For those  
6. reasons I'll resist this amendment.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Senator Harris has moved to Table Amendment No. 9 to Senate Bill  
9. 1500. Those in favor of Tabling...for what purpose does Senator Carroll  
10. arise?

11. SENATOR CARROLL:

12. I think custom and courtesy is allowed the sponsor, even when  
13. there is a motion to Table, the opportunity to at least close the de-  
14. bate.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Of course, Senator.

17. SENATOR CARROLL:

18. And I would appreciate that opportunity.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Senator Carroll is recognized to close the debate.

21. SENATOR CARROLL:

22. Thank you, Mr. President. And to use some of Senator Harris'  
23. language - I am absolutely amazed that...and appalled that he would  
24. oppose this amendment. What we are talking about here very simply,  
25. and if the Director is opposed to it I am truly amazed, because this  
26. is what the people would want. The insurance companies have placed  
27. ads in newspapers throughout this State for years, that have said -  
28. if we pass No-Fault your rates will go down, if we pass No-Fault we'll  
29. be able to help you a little bit better. Well, how is anybody going  
30. to know, and all we are saying is very simple - what were your experien-  
31. ces prior to No-Fault and what are they since passing No-Fault. Let  
32. the Director have the data and let the people have the data, and see  
33. if this is the cure-all. Once we know what they were before No-Fault

1. we can compare them with the experience factor after and see whether  
2. we've done something for the good of the people. Hopefully, we will  
3. have. I think everybody in the interest of what the people want and  
4. in the interest of lower rates and in the interest of understanding  
5. what this is all about, would have to support this amendment. I would  
6. urge opposition to Senator Harris' motion and am appalled.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Has Senator concluded his remarks?

9. SENATOR CARROLL:

10. Yes, I have. Thank you.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. The motion is shall Amendment No. 9 be Tabled. Those in favor  
13. of Tabling Amendment No. 9 will vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. The  
14. voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. The motion  
15. to Table fails. We revert to the main motion. Shall Amendment...clear  
16. the board, please. Oh, I'm sorry. On the question the Ayes are 23,  
17. the Nays are 28. Amendment No....the amendment to Table fails. A  
18. verification ...a verification has been requested. The...the board  
19. has been cleared, but the Secretary has in writing the record of those  
20. voting in the negative. Read the negative votes.

21. SECRETARY:

22. The following voted in the negative: Bloom, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,  
23. Course, Demuzio, Donnewald, Dougherty, Egan, Fawell, Kenneth Hall, Hynes,  
24. Joyce, Knuppel, Kosinski, Lemke, McCarthy, Mitchler, Morris, Newhouse,  
25. Nudelman, Palmer, Rock, Romano, Sommer, Vadalabene, Welsh and Wooten.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Is Senator Hynes on the Floor? Is Senator Hynes on the Floor?  
28. Take him off the roll call. Is Senator Vadalabene in...in the Chamber?  
29. Yes, he is. Is Senator Shapiro in the Chamber? Is he recorded? He's  
30. not recorded. Is Senator Romano on the Floor? Take him off. The  
31. vote is 23 Aye and 26 Nay. The amendment is adopted. No, the motion  
32. to Table fails. The question, now, is...the question, now, is on the  
33. adoption of Amendment No. 9. Senator Harris.

1. SENATOR HARRIS:

2. Now, Mr. President, as I understand it, the motion before us is  
3. on the adoption of Amendment No. 9. And on that matter before us, I  
4. want to call to the attention of the membership; the opening paragraph  
5. in the existing section C, and that language states that is proposed  
6. to be amended by this amendment. And this language is in the bill, now.  
7. The Director may order premium reductions, prospective premium reductions  
8. if justified by data submitted to the Director pursuant to this article.  
9. And that data is mandated in this bill. Now, the fact is that the  
10. language contained in Amendment No. 9, I think is truly unconstitutional  
11. in that it would result in the ordering of a change in an existing con-  
12. tract. It is operative in retrospect, and for those reasons I could  
13. bring myself to question the sincerity of the amendment. But I won't.  
14. But I call it to your attention. Now, in fact, this Amendment will  
15. create very serious problems for the whole principle of No-Fault. If,  
16. in fact, you believe that we should get this experiment on its way  
17. to serve the people of Illinois, you will join me in rejecting Amend-  
18. ment No. 9. I urge those of you who believe that we should have an  
19. affective No-Fault, in rejecting Amendment No. 9.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Senator Wooten.

22. SENATOR WOOTEN:

23. Mr. President and Colleagues. Briefly, if we are, in fact, going  
24. to embark on this experiment, I think it wholly prudent of us to have  
25. recourse to every possible safeguard. We don't, as it happens. But,  
26. this safeguard, I think, is a prudent one, and I urge the adoption of  
27. the amendment.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Any further discussion? Senator Carroll may again close the  
30. debate. Senator Glass.

31. SENATOR GLASS:

32. Thank you, Mr. President. I would like to emphasize my under-  
33. standing of this amendment, and I think Senator Harris has also

1. emphasized this. It would call for a retroactive affecting of rates  
2. which could very well mean that premiums that have already been paid  
3. would be affected, and I really question whether that is constitutional  
4. or it's something that we want to do. So, I would urge this Amendment's  
5. defeat.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Senator Lemke.

8. SENATOR LEMKE:

9. Basically, I don't think this is in interference with anybody,  
10. contract or right, because this contract that's being made is made  
11. pursuant to Government mandate on both the insurance company and the  
12. individual. And since there...since this contract is subject to Govern-  
13. mental laws, it's subject to being changed and lowered. And I think  
14. that opinion was expressed out East when they mandated the insurance  
15. companies to give a twenty-five per cent premium rebate and also look  
16. into another possible twenty-five per cent. And this is what we're  
17. getting at since this is an experiment and the Department of Insurance  
18. will need this information to set rates and to protect the consumer  
19. from the big bad insurance companies. I urge you to vote for this  
20. amendment.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. Any further discussion? Senator Carroll.

23. SENATOR CARROLL:

24. I would like the opportunity to close the debate if you're at  
25. that point in time, Mr. President.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Senator Lane.

28. SENATOR LANE:

29. Yes, Sir, Mr. President. What this amendment does, it opens up  
30. the door for the Director to make recommendations and change the rates  
31. on the whole Insurance Code, not just this one facet of insurance. So,  
32. for those reasons we resist this amendment.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Senator Rock.

2. SENATOR ROCK:

3. Well, I...I rise in support of Amendment No. 9 and to refute the  
4. statement that Senator Lane has just made. It does no such thing. The  
5. statutory authority for prior approval of rates was some years ago,  
6. taken away, unfortunately, and I add, unfortunately, and I think, frankly,  
7. the Director should have that authority. All this amendment calls for  
8. is that if we are embarking on this noble experiment, to allow some  
9. statistical data against which the success or failure of this noble  
10. experiment can, in fact, be measured. The amendment is a good one,  
11. and I would urge its adoption.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Any further discussion? Senator Carroll.

14. SENATOR CARROLL:

15. Thank you. And I take umbrage with Senator Harris' remarks.  
16. The sincerity of this amendment, which was offered last Session as  
17. well, is very real. The point of it is, and I think there has been  
18. an abuse by the opponents of this amendment of what the amendment  
19. does and what the bill does. The amendment does not deal with section  
20. C, which is the rate section, and it says in section B, that we will  
21. give retrospective information as well as prospective. Let's find  
22. out what they were doing before No-Fault and compare it. The rate  
23. reduction in C stays the same. It's prospective only. But it gives  
24. the Director the data, the openness to say - this was what was charged  
25. and this is what the loss factor showed before No-Fault, and this is  
26. what No-Fault has done for the people. That's the type of data he  
27. needs to make a sensible recommendation, and the recommendation is  
28. prospective, only. I truly cannot understand why anyone would oppose  
29. the concept of letting the Director have useful data on what has happen-  
30. ed because of No-Fault. I just don't understand it, and I would urge  
31. the adoption of the amendment.

32. PRESIDENT:

33. The question is on the adoption of Amendment No. 9. Senator

1. Carroll moves the adoption of Amendment No. 9 to Senate Bill 1500.  
2. Those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. The voting is  
3. open. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question  
4. the Ayes are 31, the Nays are 24, with none Voting Present. Amendment  
5. No. 9 is adopted. Are there further amendments? Are there further  
6. amendments? Senator Shapiro.

7. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

8. A point of personal privilege, Mr. President.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. May I finish this? Senator Carroll, 3rd reading. (Machine cut-  
11. off)...Senator Shapiro.

12. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

13. Mr. President, in the President's box is Representative Harry  
14. Leinenweber. I want to issue an invitation to him to come down on  
15. to the Floor as he does have access, he doesn't have to sit up there  
16. with the trial lawyers.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Senator Rock.

19. SENATOR ROCK:

20. I think...I think Representative Leinenweber was visiting members  
21. of the Insurance Industry who are also in the President's Gallery.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. It's a popular place today. The Chair has an announcement. The  
24. Senate has revised its schedule. There will be no meeting of the Senate  
25. tonight, nor tomorrow, nor Sunday. Commencing on Monday morning the  
26. Appropriations Committee will meet from nine until noon, the Senate  
27. will be in session at noon with a session scheduled to finalize at  
28. five p.m. with the evening session to be determined on the basis of the  
29. work load at that time. The Senate will be in continuous session from  
30. Monday, June 16th through, at least, Friday, June 27th. We will be in  
31. session both Saturday and Sunday of next week. Mr...would you pass  
32. out the announcements...the schedules? Questions. Senator Morris.

33. SENATOR MORRIS:



1. Since we're going to be in Session next Sunday, I wondered if that  
2. Chapel will be ready in time for services.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. If not, there will be a provisional chapel provided.

5. SENATOR MORRIS:

6. Okay.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Senator Egan.

9. SENATOR EGAN:

10. Mr. President, we have a meeting of the Democratic members of the  
11. Appropriations Committee in the Senate on this Sunday, which is Father's  
12. Day and the question of per diem has arisen and I just thought maybe  
13. that could be of record so that we can have it straight.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. It is on the record. It is of record that the question has arisen.  
16. Senator Carroll.

17. SENATOR CARROLL:

18. I wish to offer an amendment to Senator Morris's suggestion that  
19. services be available on Saturday as well.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Let the record show that the Chapel will also will be interdenom-  
22. inational. Senator Rock.

23. SENATOR ROCK:

24. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.  
25. Some, I know, are interested in the proposed agreed bill list. It is  
26. a lengthy list compiled by some of us on both sides of the aisle. My  
27. suggestion if it's...if the Chair is amenable and Senator Harris is  
28. amenable, and rather than try to...rush it through today and pass it  
29. out, my suggestion is that we would hold it until the first of next  
30. week at which time all the members will be here and we'll have at least  
31. a day and a half, or two days to look it over. Is that acceptable?

32. PRESIDENT:

33. That is certainly acceptable to the Chair. Senator Harris? And we'll

1 employ the same methodology that we used with Senate bills, giving the  
2 members adequate time to see it and giving the members the opportunity  
3 to be recorded negatively on those that are on the list that they do  
4 not approve, with the same overall rule as to the number of negative  
5 votes which would take it off. Senator Vadalabene.

6 SENATOR VADALABENE:

7 Yes, thank you, Mr. President, would it be in order for me to sort  
8 out make a pre-announcement that in lieu of our conversation that there  
9 will be a meeting of the Executive on Appointments and Administration  
10 at Wednesday at one o'clock at 212 and notices will be sent out. Would  
11 I be in order?

12 PRESIDENT:

13 That would be in order. Nunc pro tunc. That's in order, Senator.  
14 Introduction of Bills.

15 SECRETARY:

16 Senate Bill 1503 introduced by the Revenue Committee. Chief  
17 sponsor, Senator Nimrod.

18 (Secretary reads title of bill)

19 1st reading of the bill.

20 Senate Bill 1504...

21 PRESIDENT:

22 Senator, Senator Nimrod.

23 SENATOR NIMROD:

24 Mr. President, I would ask leave to ask that 1503 move to 2nd  
25 reading without reference to committee.

26 PRESIDENT:

27 Is there leave? Leave is granted.

28 SECRETARY:

29 Senate Bill 1504 introduced by the Revenue Committee. Senator  
30 Carroll is the chief sponsor.

31 (Secretary reads title of bill)

32 1st reading of the bill.

33 PRESIDENT:

1. Senator Carroll.

2. SENATOR CARROLL:

3. Thank you, Mr. President and I would ask leave to advance the bill  
4. to the order of 2nd reading without reference to committee, because it  
5. is a committee bill.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Is leave granted? Leave. Senator Newhouse is recognized.

8. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

9. Thank you, Mr. President. Mr. President, in the Education Committee  
10. there was a bill, Senate Bill...House Bill, rather, 1914, which was  
11. agreed by the Committee should come out with an amendment provided which  
12. has been drawn up by its opponents. I've checked with the committee  
13. chairman and the opponents to the bill and I, now, move to discharge  
14. committee from House Bill 1914 to advance to 2nd reading at which point  
15. it would be amended.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. Senator Demuzio.

18. SENATOR DEMUZIO:

19. Yes, Mr. President, I would like to Table a bill, 11...House Bill  
20. 1161 that is in the Judiciary Committee.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. Senator Demuzio moves to discharge House Bill, what?

23. SENATOR DEMUZIO:

24. 1161.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. 1161 from the Committee on Judiciary for the purpose of Tabling.  
27. Is leave granted to discharge the bill? Leave is granted. Senator  
28. Demuzio now moves to Table House Bill 1161. Those in favor will say  
29. Aye. Opposed Nay. 1161 House Bill is Tabled. Committee Reports.

30. SECRETARY:

31. Senator Donnewald, Chairman of the Assignment of Bills assigns the  
32. following to committee. Agriculture, Conservation and Energy - House  
33. Bill 2200; Judiciary - House Bill 1729; Local Government - House Bill

1. 1767.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. For what purpose does Senator Mitchler arise? For what purpose  
4. does Senator Mitchler arise?

5. SENATOR MITCHLER:

6. Mr. President and members of the Senate. House Bill 2200 which has  
7. been assigned to the Senate Agriculture, Conservation and Energy  
8. Committee has spoke to the Chairman of that Committee and that bill will  
9. be heard along with the other bill, immediately after adjournment.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Senator Glass. Senator Knuppel.

12. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

13. In view of the fact that there's no other meeting scheduled here  
14. and I think there is different meeting scheduled at 400, the Agriculture  
15. Committee will meet right here on the Floor. There are only two bills  
16. to consider. Now, I have a qucction of parliamentary procedure or  
17. inquiry.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. State your inquiry, Senator.

20. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

21. I have approximately seventy some bills which have been placed  
22. in subcommittees. They're what I call Ma and Pa bills. As I under-  
23. stand it if a bill is in a working subcommittee it's exempted...it's  
24. exempted from the kill order of this evening. Now, is that correct?

25. PRESIDENT:

26. The Rules Committee will meet on Monday and formalize an answer  
27. to that question relating to all bills left in committee.

28. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

29. Well, what...well, what about...suppose it's unfavorable, because  
30. here we are confronted with a deadline. I...I don't want to put the  
31. burden on these committees to hear these bills at this time, but there  
32. are about seventy-five of them in subcommittee and it's been my under-  
33. standing that bills were actually placed in a subcommittee with a

1 date to report, that...that this would keep the bill alive, and...and...

2 PRESIDENT:

3 Senator, Senator Rock.

4 SENATOR ROCK:

5 Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.

6 I think the point Senator Knuppel makes is a good one. Unfortunately,  
7 due to the press of business around here the Rules Committee has not yet  
8 had an opportunity to meet to formalize a rule in this respect, as  
9 I indicated to Senator Knuppel and others. In fact, some of the House  
10 Bills, because of the large volume, we just frankly were unable to deal  
11 with. Now, he has a series of about forty-five bills that are of some  
12 moment. But, to attempt to run forty-five bills in this afternoon's  
13 committee I think is perfectly inane, and so to that extent I think  
14 that these bills and others of the same caliber will certainly be con-  
15 sidered favorably by the Rules Committee, and will, in fact, be exempt  
16 from any general Tabling motion that is, in fact, made. The rule will  
17 be formalized, it will be presented to the membership and if adopted by  
18 a constitutional majority will be enswathed. But, I would assure him  
19 and I will assure other members of the Rules Committee that I, for one,  
20 will press for an exemption for these and other bills of like caliber.

21 SENATOR KNUPPEL:

22 Thank you.

23 PRESIDENT:

24 Senator Glass.

25 SENATOR GLASS:

26 Mr. President, I would move that House Bill 1669 be discharged from  
27 the Committee on Education for purposes of Tabling.

28 PRESIDENT:

29 Senator Glass asks leave to discharge the Committee on Education  
30 from further consideration of House Bill 1669. Is there leave? Leave  
31 is granted. Senator Glass now moves that House Bill 1669 be Tabled.  
32 Those in favor will say Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. 1669  
33 House Bill is Tabled. Senator Daley.

34 SENATOR DALEY:

1. Mr. President...Mr. President and fellow Senators. House Bill  
2. 768 on June 4th was reported erroneously as a Do Not Pass. It should  
3. have been...

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Just...just a minute, Senator. Would the Senators be in their  
6. seats. And could we have some order. Senator Daley.

7. SENATOR DALEY:

8. ...it should have been reported as a Do Pass with eleven Ayes and  
9. no Nays. Representative Hirschfield was the House sponsor and Senator  
10. Weaver was the Senate sponsor. I ask leave to take it from the Table  
11. and place it on 2nd reading, House Bill 768.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Is there leave? Leave is granted. Senator Demuzio.

14. SENATOR DEMUZIO:

15. Yes, Mr. Chairman, there will be a meeting of the Senate Finance  
16. and Credit Regulations Committee, Room 400, immediately after adjournment.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Senator Johns.

19. SENATOR JOHNS:

20. Mr. President, Chairman of Executive, I'd like to start Executive  
21. Committee at about twelve fifteen. Now, are there objections? Well,  
22. that's exactly why I'm rising here. I want to try to work this Committee  
23. out and get you home. But, if there is going to be a lot of hassle  
24. over it, I can stay as long as anyone.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Senator Harris.

27. SENATOR HARRIS:

28. Well, Mr. President, we do have insurance and there are a good  
29. many bills scheduled there, and I just don't think...

30. SENATOR JOHNS:

31. Alright, you got an idea, Senator Harris, what kind of time we  
32. ought to allot, because I'd like to work this to the benefit of all  
33. the committee members.

1 SENATOR HARRIS:

2 Well, I know we'd all rather meet earlier than two thirty if we  
3 can.

4 SENATOR JOHNS:

5 Right.

6 SENATOR HARRIS:

7 It seems to me like...I'd just defer to the Chairman of Insurance.  
8 I think we're going to be there at least an hour and a half. If we  
9 would say one thirty I think that would be the safest. That would be  
10 my suggestion.

11 SENATOR JOHNS:

12 Alright, now, that's what I...exactly what I want to know is what's  
13 the pleasure of the committee?

14 PRESIDENT:

15 Let's...let's hear from Senator Romano.

16 SENATOR ROMANO:

17 The Insurance Committee will meet immediately after adjournment,  
18 and I don't think we'll be in there too long. There will be some of  
19 these bills that are going into a subcommittee bill. I...I think  
20 we'll be there maybe an hour at the most. And in Room 212.

21 PRESIDENT:

22 Senator Johns.

23 SENATOR JOHNS:

24 Okay. Now, I've had the figure one thirty shot at me three or  
25 four times. Is that reasonable? Okay. One thirty. Now, let's be  
26 there and let's get rolling.

27 PRESIDENT:

28 Senator Daley.

29 SENATOR DALEY:

30 Mr. President and fellow Senators. The Judiciary Committee will  
31 meet instead of...supposed to meet in Room 400 at two thirty p.m. We'll  
32 meet on the Senate Floor at one p.m. The Senate Floor at one p.m.

33 PRESIDENT:

34 Now, Senator Knuppel has just made an announcement. Senator

1. Knuppel, could I divert you a moment. You made an announcement that  
2. your Committee was meeting on the Floor. What time is it?  
3. SENATOR KNUPPEL:  
4. Right now.  
5. PRESIDENT:  
6. And you'll be out by one thirty?  
7. SENATOR KNUPPEL:  
8. Oh, yes.  
9. PRESIDENT:  
10. Very good.  
11. SENATOR KNUPPEL:  
12. We'll only take twenty minutes.  
13. PRESIDENT:  
14. Very good. Now, your meeting is what time, Senator Daley?  
15. SENATOR DALEY:  
16. One o'clock...  
17. PRESIDENT:  
18. One o'clock...  
19. SENATOR DALEY:  
20. ...on the Senate Floor in Judiciary Committee.  
21. PRESIDENT:  
22. ...On the Senate Floor. Senator Netsch.  
23. SENATOR NETSCH:  
24. In that connection there are some of us who are on Finance which  
25. is meeting and has a fairly heavy agenda. Could we have a reading from  
26. the Chairman of Finance as to whether or not we'll be finished by one  
27. o'clock.  
28. PRESIDENT:  
29. Senator...Senator McCarthy is the Chairman. He is not here. Sen-  
30. ator Demuzio, did you hear the question? Would you repeat the question.  
31. SENATOR NETSCH:  
32. Senator Daley has just called Judiciary for one o'clock. There  
33. are some of us who are also on Finance which is meeting now. Is there



1. any prospect that we're going to be finished by one o'clock on Finance?

2. SENATOR DEMUZIO:

3. I have no idea. I have no idea. There...I can't answer that  
4. question. I guess if you don't ask a lot of questions we'll get out  
5. of there as quickly as we can.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. We may not get out of here. Senator Schaffer.

8. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

9. Mr. President, I spoke to you earlier about a matter on 3rd  
10. reading...

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Yes, you did. Hold on just a moment. Now, would the members be  
13. in their seats. Would we first...could we clear out this aisle. Save  
14. the photographer. Would the members be in their seats. Senator  
15. Schaffer asked for a particular bill that has moment time wise for  
16. this Sunday. What is the number, Senator?

17. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

18. House Bill 1324, which relates...

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Alright. I just wanted to know the number at the moment. Is  
21. there leave to go to the order of House Bills on 3rd reading for the

24. planation. We'll read it after you shall have finished.

25. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

26. Well, Mr. President and members of the Senate. This weekend, I  
27. think most of you know, in Crystal Lake we're having the first mid-west  
28. balloon meet, and as luck would have it when they drafted the Aeronautics  
29. act in 1945, no one envisioned that a large number of citizens of Illinois  
30. would choose to fly over the State of Illinois in lighter than air  
31. hot air balloons, and House Bill 1324, which was drafted by the Illinois  
32. Aeronautics Department and is supported by the Balloon Associations in  
33. the State, provides for the statutory authority for that type of aeronautic

1. activity and establishes legal responsibility for that type of  
2. aeronautics activity. I know of no opposition. I personally, if  
3. the Judiciary Committee will let me get out of here as quickly as  
4. possible, plan to lift off at 5:30 or so myself, and plan to hope-  
5. fully do it several times this weekend. We have eighty-six balloons  
6. flying from all over the country. We expect a crowd of about thirty-  
7. thousand people.
