Now, if you're going 22. to rule that you can put anything in a resolution, I guess you 23. can so rule, but I would ask for a parliamentary ruling on that 24. point. 25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK) 26. I think the Chair will rule that the subject matter of 27. this resolution is in order. What the resolution clause of 28. the...of this resolution says is that we recognize, assuming its 29. adoption, we recognize that the private sector is now and will 30. continue to be the most viable source for delivering services to 31. the vast majority of multiply handicapped children and that. 32. adequate funding of such private programs demands the restoration 33. of private schools, special ed funds reduced by Executive veto, the 34.

1. position of the Governor and the IOE to the contrary notwithstanding. 2. So, we are recognizing that by this resolution that there should 3. be a restoration, you are correct in that, but I'm...I'm.withe Chair 4. will rule that the subject matter is proper. Senator Shapiro. 5. SENATOR SHAPIRO: 6. Mr. President, in voting for this resolution or in speaking ... 7. the motion actually, suspension of the rules, can we speak to the 8. substance of the resolution prior ... that's ... 9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK) 10. Well.... 11.' SENATOR SHAPIRO: 12. ... what I want to know. 13. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK) Well, technically if someone raises a point of order 14. 15. I would assume that you could not. Their...their point would be well taken. The only motion which has, frankly, not yet been 16. put would be to suspend the rules, but I think that you'll 17. 18. probably get two cracks at it, assuming one or another, but go 19. ahead. I would...unless a point is raised. 20. SENATOR SHAPIRO: Well, thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the 21. As far as the substance matter of the resolution is 22. Senate. concerned concerning the restoration of a reduction veto for 23. grants to private institutions for providing special education 24. facilities. You know, I particularly don't have any problem 25. with restoring that, but I'm wondering really if the resolution 26. is actually necessary and if you go into the depth of the resolution, 27. we may be committing ourselves to something that will return to 28. haunt us the rest of the history of the State of Illinois. And 29. I want to...you to listen very carefully as to what the resolution 30. says in the last paragraph, that we recognize the private sector 31. is now and will continue to be the most viable source for 32. delivering services to the vast majority of multiple handicapped . 33. That may or may not true...but...but by passing this 34. children.

1. resolution, we would certainly be committed to that and it 2. further goes...and it goes on further, as Senator Glass has з. pointed out, that we would in effect, be committing ourselves 4. to supporting the override. I'm sure that there are many 5. here that will support that restoration of funds, but I don't 6. think we need a resolution to commit the entire Body to, so I 7. would urge the members of this Senate and I certainly 8. don't want...hope it's not a partisan issue, to resist the 9. suspension of the rules and have this resolution referred to the 10. . proper committee.

And I would direct your attention to a notice that 11. was passed out to you yesterday because I think that as Senators 12. within the State, you ought to be aware that there presently are 13. three projects that are being developed and built in Illinois 14. using primarily Illinois coal and that the Commission has approved 15. monies for it and the total amount of these projects amounts 16. 5 to some six hundred and eighteen million dollars. This is also 17. 3 4 going to provide some approximately forty-two hundred new jobs in Illinois during the development of these pilot projects in 18. 19. these test facilities and at the same time, you might know that 20. it does cover three particular areas in our State, one in 21. New Athens, Illinois, which is the coal-con project, the second project which was just ... the State participation was just added 22. two days ago at the Commission amounting to 7.2 million and that 23. 24. is the Edison Power Sub-Station near Pekin, Illinois and of course, we 25. have the third project, which is the coal gasification group 26. and this is down in Perry County in southern Illinois and I would hope that you get a chance to ... to see this and maybe some of you 27. 28. that are concerned with it, might want to have some pictures 29. taken down there and some explanations of the projects so you might help to distribute...dissiminate this information throughout 30. the State. And on November the 30th, we will attempt to have the 31. briefing for any legislators or any Senators who...who would like 32. to attend a short meeting to learn about this project and what 33.

If the members will 10. turn to page six of their Calendar in the order of business 11. . under Item Reductions is found...Senate Bill 1744 and there 12. 13. is a Motion in Writing. Mr. Secretary, read the motion. 14. SECRETARY: I move that the item on page one, line ten of Senate Bill 15. 16. 1744 be restored, the Item Reduction of the Governor to the 17. contrary notwithstanding. Signed, Senator Don Moore. 18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK) 19. Senator Don Moore. 20. SENATOR MOORE: Thank you, Mr. President. I would like to...to make a 21. 22. parliamentary inquiry, Mr. President. There were six line item 23. reduction vetoes made by the Governor on Senate Bill 1744. Would... is it going to be our procedure to have one roll call on 24. all six or should they be taken individually? 25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK) 26. I think if...if...Gentlemen, may we have your attention? 27. 28. There are, I am informed by the Secretary, six motions with respect to Senate Bill 1744 relating to different lines of that legislation. 29. The question has been put to the Chair as to whether or not 30. all six motions should be handled on one roll call or whether 31. the individual motions should be handled individually. Yes, I 32. think the Chair will rule that under the provisions of Rule 72A 33.

under...under subsection C it says, the vote to restore an
 item which has been reduced shall be, by roll call vote, as to
 each item separately and shall be entered on the Journal.
 And the Chair will so rule. So we are concerned, Senator Moore,
 will you tell everybody again, the...the page and the line
 number with respect to the first motion?
 SENATOR MOORE:

8. The first motion is page one, line ten which was a 9. reduction of fifty-eight thousand four hundred dollars in the 10. Personal Service Line Item. I wonder if I could have leave, 11. Mr. President, to discuss generally the entire problem with the 12. total reduction of ninety-nine thousand seven hundred dollars 13. from the appropriation bill for the Legislative Advisory Committee on Public Aid and then revert back to each individual line 14. 15. item.

16.. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

17. The total of all six motions...

18. SENATOR MOORE:

I would like to discuss them generally, then...
 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

21. The total of all six is ninety-nine thousand?22. SENATOR MOORE:

Yes, ninety-nine thousand seven hundred.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

Okay. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. Proceed,
 Senator Moore.

27. SENATOR MOORE:

28. Thank you, Mr. President. The Legislative Advisory Committee
29. on Public Aid, we went in for an appropriation of approximately
30. two hundred and ninety thousand dollars. It was a increase of ...
31. from a one hundred and eighty-eight thousand from the preceding
32. fiscal year. This bill did pass both the House and the Senate
33. with the substantial majority and the Governor, in his wisdom,

1. saw fit to reduce in a very precarious way, various six line 2. items of this particular appropriation bill. The work that 3. the Legislative Advisory Committee on Public Aid has done in 4. the last year, I'm sure all members of the Body are aware of, 5. there was a time when the statement was made that there is no 6. massive fraud in the Medicaid System in Illinois. Through the 7. direct activities of this committee, we have proven that this 8. is not the case. Through the direct activities of this committee 9. in using the U.S. Attorney for the Northern District of Illinois 10. as a catalyst which was the recommendation of this committee, 11. where all law enforcement agencies would report into so that 12. the activities in medicaid fraud could be correlated and not having one investigative unit stumbling over the other, 13. 14. we have seen the indictments that came out here about three 15. weeks ago, some of which were through the direct work of the investigative unit of the Legislative Advisory Committee. I 16. can state without any question that for the expenditure of our 17. 18. hundred and eighty-four thousand dollars for the last fiscal 19. year, we can show directly, directly a savings to the taxpayers 20. of over one million three hundred thousand dollars in two fields. One, removing ineligibles and fraudulent cases from the welfare 21. rolls and two, with the direct activities in the medicaid field 22. with the optometrists, the clinical laboratories, doctors, nursing 23. homes, et cetera. I think some of the members of the committee 24. will recall some of the witnesses we had before the committee 25. in the past year. Where I think you read in the paper there was 26. 27. a seven hundred thousand dollar fine granted by the judge in the Federal court and four nursing homes. The work that this 28. 29. committee has done in cooperation with the U.S. Attorney, the State's Attorney, the Attorney General, the Department of 30. Public Aid, is probably the only agency of State government 31. that can show a direct savings to the taxpayers. With the 32. Governor's item reduction veto plus the Partee amendment that was 33.

1. placed on the bill, it virtually crippled the investigative 2. unit and the staff of the Legislative Advisory Committee for the 3. past five months. I think that we can proceed. I think that 4. the fact that a new Governor is coming in should not in any 5. way curtail the activities of this committee and the first 6. motion that is filed would be the restoration of the sum of 7. fifty-eight thousand four hundred dollars to the Personal 8. Services Line Item. I'd be happy to answer any questions, 9. Mr. President or I will make the appropriate motion. 10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK) 11. Is there any discussion? Senator Egan. 12. SENATOR EGAN: 13. Yes, Senator Moore, your appropriation was also on the 14. omnibus bill. How...how does this ... 15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK) 16. Senator...Senator indicates he will yield. Senator 17. Moore. 18. SENATOR MOORE: 19. It was taken out of the omnibus bill and left in as 20. a separate bill that did go through both the House Appropriations 21. Committee and the Senate Appropriations Committee, Senator. 22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK) 23. Any further discussion? All right. Senator Smith. 24. SENATOR SMITH: 25. Mr. President and members of the Senate. Don't start, Chew. Mr. President and members of the Senate. I'm going to make 26. 27. bold enough to state that in my humble opinion, it was either 28. an oversight or perhaps a matter of bad advise that was given to his 29. Excellency and that...and I'm further advised that his Excellency 30. himself has suffered a change of heart with regards to the veto 31. of this particular bill. It's Senate Bill, I think, 1744, am 32. I correct Senator? Yes. As I...I...you allowed my friend to 33. speak to the bill generally, and may I do so briefly?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)
 Leave is granted. Briefly.
 SENATOR SMITH:

4. I...I think it is common knowledge to everyone, even to the 5. so-called man on the streets that many, many millions of dollars 6. have been squandered in the medicaid and medicare fields here in the State of Illinois. And but for the work of this particular 7. 8. commission, it's altogether reasonable, I think, to assume 9. that many additional millions of dollars would perhaps have 10. found their way into the coffers, the bank accounts, or perhaps 11. the pockets of other designing men. I think that members should bear in mind that the total appropriation to which Senator 12. Egan thought that this bill had been combined, has grown to 13. 14. staggering proportions and having done so, it's not enough, Mr. President, for us to sit here idly and do as so many often 15. 16. times do, simply complain. The time has come for active, 17. aggressive sensible action on the part of this Body in an attempt 18. to protect the monies that are appropriated for this particular: 19. department of which...to which the bill is merely a subsidiary. 20. As late as yesterday, the present United States Attorney 21. was in Washington and I take it some of you perhaps notice in the morning paper that he was there and he was asking for additional 22. investigators and I'm...just let me digress and I'm not going 23. : 24. to get on one of my long tirades so that you, too, will have to imitate 25. Senator Donnewald in telling me when I will have talked two minutes that the time has expired. This bill in totality is needful. 26. It's necessary. When we started out trying to investigate the set 27. 28. up and the unfair expenditures and squandering of funds in the total bill, we had but two investigators and they were learned, 29. competent men that had been loaned to us by the present mayor 30. of the City of Chicago. Now, we have a multiplicity. We are not, 31. I don't mean, in the hundreds, but as of yesterday in Washington, 32. the information having been conveyed to us through the morning 33. press we only have for the entire midwestern region, two investigators, 34.

1. Federal investigators. And I'm going to say to you Gentlemen, 2. that the great investigators, what were their names, Sherlock 3. Holmes, that Sherlock Holmes and his partner, whatever his name 4. was, there were two of them. Sherlock Holmes and who else? 5. Watson, working full time with no way under high Heaven for them 6. to have done a proper job. We have in recent months gone into 7. all facets of this and as the Chairman of the Commission says, 8. we've saved millions of dollars. Now here's something that 9. perhaps you men that don't pay much attention to the actions of 10. some of your committees don't know, as we sit here and prior to 11. our having been called here, the head of the Department of Public 12. Aid has made or sought to make arrangements with HEW, Health 13. Education and Welfare in Washington, for the addition of many, 14. many, millions past the hundred millions of dollars toward 15. that field. A portion of the monies that we are asking for here 16. in this resolution, will be used for travel. I think about two 17. or three thousand dollars. We should contact HEW, I have 18. argued, now. And again, when there's a change of administration, 19. and ask and plead with them not to let those matters go through 20. until we have a chance, the advisory committee, to consider them. 21. It was brought out in September when we were here, I asked the 22. question myself of the director, these new arrangements that you 23. are seeking to make with HEW, have you ever submitted them to us 24. for our consideration and approval and the answer was frankly, What does that ... what does this mean, when you did that? 25. no. Did I have two minutes, or...oh,...oh, all right. All right. 26. But, if ever an appropriation was needful and necessary, this 27. 28. particular appropriation is. Now, you...there was a suggestion that someone wanted the different parts of this bill called 29. 30. separately. The entire amount is needed. It's suggested here in 31. this bill and I hope that a ... how many members are necessary 32. to override, thirty?

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

1. Thirty votes. 2. SENATOR SMITH: 3. Thirty votes and I hope that the thirty votes will be 4. forthcoming, Mr. Chairman. 5. PRESIDING: OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK) 6. Senator Buzbee. 7. SENATOR BUZBEE: 8. ... question of the sponsor, Mr. President. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK) 9. 10. Sponsor indicates he will yield. Senator Buzbee. 11. 🕾 SENATOR BUZBEE: 12. How much...are there any public members on the Legislative 13. Advisory Commission ... pardon me, the Public Aid Advisory Commission? 14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK) 15. . Senator Don Moore. 16. SENATOR MOORE: 17. 👘 No, there are not, Senator. There are six Senators, 18. three Republican, three Democrat, six House members, three Republican, three Democrat. There are no public members. 19. 20. It's totally a bi-partisan legislative commission. 21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK) 22. Senator Buzbee. 23. SENATOR BUZBEE: 24. Thank you. 25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK) 26. Further discussion? Senator Ozinga. 27. SENATOR OZINGA: 28. Mr. President, members of the Senate. Confining myself to this 29. motion, to this particular reduction, the only thing I would call 30. to your attention is this reduction positively curtails the 31. investigative unit of the council. 25	me, but there was some language in it which disturbs me a little bit

27	schools who have not made preparation for them. I think that assumes
28	something not in evidence. It just bothers me to be on a resolution
29	that has in it what purports to be a fact which may not be a
30	fact. Now, it may be a fact, but I'm not sure that it is and I'm
31	I just want to be careful that I do not, by an affirmative vote,
32	say that a situation exists which does not exist and I'dI'd just like
33	to hear that part of it again, if I may.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

Senator Newhouse.

3. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

4. Thank you, Mr. President and thank you for pointing that out. But the language reads thusly, that public schools should not be 5. 6. asked to take the children in question until such time as they develop adequate programs for them which they do not now have 7. in most all cases throughout Illinois. Now, we're talking about 8. multiply handicapped children, Senator, we're not talking about 9. children with a single handicap or children with minor kind of 10. disturbances. We're talking about multiply handicapped children 11. and I think you will agree that it is fact that in most school 12. districts, they do not have the facilities for handling children 13. with these severe kinds of handicaps. 14.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

16. Senator Graham.

17. SENATOR GRAHAM:

Mr. President and members of the Senate. I'm not questioning 18. certainly, the good intentions of the sponsors of this amendment 19. but I am questioning the fact that we, if we allow this to pass, 20. without going to an appropriate committee, are establishing 21. by our actions, a very dangerous precedent. No matter how you slice this 22. we can't and should not ever accomplish the kind of things 23. hoped to be accomplished as contained in this resolution by a 24. resolution without any committee consideration which...dangerous 25. Ladies and Gentlemen. We should not do it and I would hope that the 26. Chair would finally use his usual fine judgement and send it 27. into Committee on Executive. 28.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

Further discussion? Senator Shapiro.
 SENATOR SHAPIRO:

Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, with 4. all due respect to the sponsor, I have to reiterate what previous 5. speakers have said on this. I raised what I considered to be two 6. major points which had been deleted but what has not been 7. deleted and I'm sorry it ... that I didn't raise them because of 8. the time limitations previously. This resolution makes assumptions 9. which I don't know whether they are valid or not and by giving 10. an affirmative vote, we would be concurring in the fact that : 11. mainstreaming is not a proven educational tool. I don't know 12. that. I don't think anybody in this Body really knows whether 13. it is or not. There are words in here such as misconceptions, 14. inaccurate...assumption, misguided support that I honestly think 15. this resolution needs a committee hearing of some type. I don't 16. think that we can pass a resolution of this type on the Floor 17. of the Senate without a thorough discussion and witnessescof 18. the...the whole concept, and I would still ask my colleagues in 19. the Senate to resist suspension of the rules for the immediate 20. consideration. 21.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

Any further discussion? Senator Harris.

24. SENATOR HARRIS:

Thank you, Mr. President. I have to concur in remarks that 25. have been made here. I think for us to take action on this without 26. the witnesses that ought to be heard to respond to many of the 27. very definite conclusions that are called for in several of the 28. whereases just would be irresponsible. I think... I think this 29. has to be, if it's... if it's going to be carefully responded to, 30. has to go to committee and provide the benefit of that Body the 31. opportunity to have some important conclusions, either affirmed 32. and ventilated, and I just ... I just don't see how we or...aired 33.

3.	Senator Newhouse, for what purpose do you arise?
4.	SENATOR NEWHOUSE:
