PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

For what purpose does Senator Savickas arise?

SENATOR SAVICKAS:

Yes, Mr. President and members of the Senate, I would place four motions before you to discharge committees and

reassign bills. The first is to discharge the Committee on Revenue from further consideration of House Bill 424 and ask that the bill be rereferred to the Committee on Public Health. The sponsors have requested this. The second is to discharge the Committee on Revenue from further consideration of House Bill 1105 and ask that the bill be rereferred to the Committee on Elementary Education. The third, to move to discharge the Committee on Transportation from further consideration of House Bill 1224 and ask that the bill be rereferred to the Committee on Local Government. Those are the three.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

All right. Motion is that House Bills 424 be discharged from Revenue and rereferred to Public Health, 1105 be discharged from Revenue and rereferred to Elementary and Secondary, and House Bill 1224 be discharged from Transportation and rereferred to Local Government. You've heard the motion. Those in favor say Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have. The bills are discharged and rereferred, and Senator Savickas...Senator Savickas, did you also want to move that those bills...that the Six-day Posting Notice be waived so that they might be heard this week?

SENATOR SAVICKAS:

Mr. President, I thought that was already passed on that it's automatic.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

All right, since it wasn't posted by Friday, the motion would be to waive the Six-day Posting Notice as to House Bill 424, 1105, 1224 that they might be heard in committees to which they have been rereferred by Senator Savickas' motion. Discussion of that motion? Those in favor say Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it and the bills may be heard this week in committee. For what purpose Senator Berman arise?

SENATOR BERMAN:

Thank you, to place a motion as to House Bill 1157. That was assigned to Committee on Local Government too late to be posted. I'd ask to waive the appropriate rules so that House Bill 1157 can be heard in the Committee on Local Government tomorrow afternoon at two o'clock.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

All right, the motion is to suspend the Six-day Posting Notice so that House Bill 1157 might be heard in the Committee on Local Government tomorrow. On the motion, discussion? Those in favor say Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it and the bill...and the motion prevails. The bill may be heard. Senator D'Arco, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR D'ARCO:

I...I want to make the same motion as regards House Bill 1405, 1412, 1414 and 2003. I believe they were read into the record this morning.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

All right...and what committee would they be heard in, Senator?

SENATOR D'ARCO:

They...they would be heard in the Insurance Committee.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

All right. The motion is... (machine cutoff)...D'Arco, when is the Insurance Committee going to meet?

SENATOR D'ARCO:

These would be heard in committee on Wednesday.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

All right.

SENATOR D'ARCO:

We're going to meet today, but we would...we would hear these on Wednesday.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

All right. Senator Savickas and I will be meeting to assign bills, and so until they're assigned technically we

can't do it. If you'll just hold that motion until tomorrow, we'll be able to make the...I don't think there be any trouble, but they're technically not in your committee. Senator D'Arco.

SENATOR D'ARCO:

Two other matters, one is a sponsorship change from Senator Jones to myself on House Bill 637, and the other is a sponsorship change from Senator Egan to myself on House Bill 638.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

Motion is to change the sponsorship on House Bill 637 from Senator...Jones to Senator D'Arco, and to change the sponsorship on House Bill 638 from Senator Egan to Senator D'Arco. On the motion, those in favor say Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. Leave is granted. Senator Vadalabene.

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. House Bill 81 is in Elementary and Secondary Education and it was not set for a committee hearing today until the arrival of an amendment. I do have the amendment and I would like to waive the Six-day Posting Notice and have the...the bill heard today. It's been heard once and all we need is the amendment.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

All right, is there leave? Leave is granted. The bill...waive the Six-day Notice on House Bill 81 that it might be heard in committee today. Senator Zito.

SENATOR ZITO:

Thank you, Mr. President. I would move to suspend the...the posting rules so that House Bill 1164 could be heard in committee this week.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

What committee is that going to be in, Senator?

SENATOR ZITO:

I believe it'll be in Local Government, but we...we have to assign it first, don't we?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

All right...all right. We'll...we'll have to hold that motion until tomorrow until it's assigned and then we'll be able to...Senator Zito.

SENATOR ZITO:

I would move...ask leave of the Body to change the sponsorship of House Bill 1202 from Senator Joyce has the lead to Senator Zito in the lead, hyphenated Joyce. On House Bill 1202.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

You've heard the motion on...House Bill 1202. Is there leave? Leave is granted. Which...Joyce? Jerome?

SENATOR ZITO:

Jerome Joyce.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

It'll be Zito-Jerome Joyce. For what purpose does Senator Savickas arise? Senator Sangmeister.

SENATOR SANGMEISTER:

Thank you, since I posted last week for Judiciary II, the Committee on Assignment of Bills apparently has reassigned to my committee House Bill 321 and House Bill 539. So, the motion would be at this time that the posting rule be waived in order that they can be heard in Judiciary II tomorrow.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

All right, Senator, which...which bill numbers?

SENATOR SANGMEISTER:

321 and 539 have been reassigned to my committee since I have posted. So, all I have to ask that that posting rule be waived so they can be heard tomorrow.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

You've heard the motion on House Bill 321 and 539. Is there leave? Leave is granted. Senator Degnan.

SENATOR DEGNAN:

Yes, thank you, I'd like to withdraw as a sponsor on House Bill 2109 and leave it in the hands of Senator Schuneman.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

All right, you've heard the motion on House Bill 2109 that Senator Degnan be replaced by Senator Schuneman as the lead sponsor. Is there leave? Leave is granted. Senator Savickas, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR SAVICKAS:

Yes, we have three more motions on reassignment of bills. The first is to discharge the Committee on Finance from consideration of House Bill 1367 and ask that the bill be rereferred to the Agricultural Committee. Also, House Bill 1368 to be discharged from Jud. I and rereferred to the Agricultural Committee, and House Bill 972 to be discharged from further consideration in Local Government and send to Agricultural Committee.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

You've heard the motion that House Bill 1369 be discharged from Finance...House Bill 1367 be discharged from Finance and rereferred to Ag. House Bill 1368 be...discharged from Judiciary I and...and rereferred to Agriculture and that House Bill 972...that the Committee on Local Government be discharged and it be...rereferred to Agriculture. Is there leave? Leave is granted, and Senator Savickas asks also that the Six-day Posting Notice be waived as to those three bills so that they might be heard in the Agriculture Committee at its next meeting. Is there leave? Leave is granted.

PRESIDENT::

Resolutions.

SECRETARY:

Senate Joint Resolution 52 offered by Senator D'Arco.

PRESIDENT:

Senator D'Arco.

SENATOR D'ARCO:

Yes, Mr. Chairman, I would move to waive the appropriate rules and have this resolution heard before the Body.

PRESIDENT:

You've heard the request. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. Senate Joint Resolution 52, Senator D'Arco.

SENATOR D'ARCO:

Thank you, Mr. Chairman...

PRESIDENT:

Hold it, Senator. All right, can we have a little order, please. Senator D'Arco.

SENATOR D'ARCO:

Thank you, Mr. President. What it does is recreate the Joint Condo Study Committee until June 30th, 1984, and I would ask for its immediate adoption.

PRESIDENT:

All right, Senator D'Arco has moved the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 52. Any discussion? Senator Keats.

SENATOR KEATS:

Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, I apologize, I must have missed this on the Calendar. Just so everyone knows, we're just extending another commission. I mean, I'm not going to argue one way or the other; but this is another commission where there's several people on the payroll of dubious value, although I appreciate the chairman has made an effort to do certain things and make recommendations at a time when we're alleging we don't have any money. Some of our more dubious commissions might be questioned. I would hope most Republicans and certainly most Democrats who are worried about the budget would vote No.

PRESIDENT:

All right, Senator D'Arco has moved the adoption of

Senate Joint Resolution 52. Any further discussion? Senator Welch. Senator D'Arco, do you wish to close? Roll call will be necessary.

SENATOR D'ARCO:

Thank...thank you, Mr. President. We go through this every year, Roger Keats gets up and tells us what a bad commission it is; but if he looks at the record and if he would ever attend a meeting, which he never has, he would find out what a tremendous job the commission is doing. In fact, all of the condo legislation that came out of this Session...this Session is the result of the byproduct of the work of the commission; and we are in the process of passing the Uniform Condominium Act, and the commission has done a tremendous effort...put in a tremendous effort in that direction. So, I would ask for a favorable vote.

PRESIDENT:

Question is, the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 52. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are 34, the Nays are 21, none voting Present. Senate Joint Resolution 52 is adopted. Senator Kelly, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR KELLY:

Mr. President, I'd like to request leave to have House Bill 610 heard in the Senate Education...Elementary and Secondary Education Committee today without posting, and also I've got a second request to have Senator Demuzio added as a hyphenated cosponsor on House Bill 1054.

PRESIDENT:

All right, Senator Kelly has asked leave to show Senator Demuzio as a cosponsor of House Bill 1054. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. The next...Senator Maitland.

SENATOR MAITLAND:

Well, I want to respond to that.

PRESIDENT:

To 610?

SENATOR MAITLAND:

Yes, sir.

PRESIDENT:

That's why I'm getting to it right now. Senator Kelly has asked leave to waive the Six-day Posting Notice and have House Bill 610 heard this afternoon in the Elementary and Secondary Committee. Senator Maitland.

SENATOR MAITLAND:

Well, thank you, very much, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Just simply to respond by saying that we have a...a policy in the Education Committee that we really act...we don't act on duplicate bills. The sequel to this bill is moving along nicely in the...in the House and it would seem to me that it's...with the number of bills we've got on the Calendar, that it would just be really unnecessary to...to move this bill today.

PRESIDENT:

All right. There is objection. Senator Kelly.

SENATOR KELLY:

Yes, Mr. President and Senator Maitland, I would just advise that the bill that has the similar concept that's in the House is...has been recently amended and that's what's...where the problem comes in. It's a different concept that's going to be coming back to us and that's why we'd like to move forward on this.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Maitland.

SENATOR MAITLAND:

Well, that happens frequently when bills move over there. We can just refuse to concur with the amendment. We can handle that when it comes back here, it seems to me.

PRESIDENT:

All right, there is objection. Senator Bruce, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR BRUCE:

I just want to point out to the Body, whether there are duplicate bills or not in any committee, we've never denied anyone the right to have a hearing. Now, if the committee wants to take the position that this bill is duplicative and ought to remain in the Senate Committee, but for a chairman or a committee to say that a...a Senate sponsor of a House bill has no right to have a hearing is...is fairly highhanded. Now the Senator has ask leave to have the bill heard. If the committee decides to kill it, that's fine, I don't even know what the content was, but I can tell you that I...I am a little disturbed with an attitude that says because there's a duplicate bill in the House, or we've passed out a bill, that we're not going to avail House members a hearing on that bill. It may be amended. It may be changed in the Senate. It may be amended or changed in the...in the House and all the Senator, as I understand it, is asking for the right to have the bill to be heard. The committee, and I don't even know what committee he asked for, but it seems to me that we ought to avail him that privilege and then let the committee handle it. We've never denied a hearing of any bill.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Berman.

SENATOR BERMAN:

Thank you, Mr. President. Let me try to clarify. Earlier last week, the committee on Elementary and Secondary Education distributed notices to members...Senators who were sponsoring House bills that appeared to be duplicative of Senate bills that are already moving along in the House. In order to cut down our workload, we suggested to them that

this was a duplicate bill. If they want...if they wanted the bill to be posted, all they had to do was let us know, as did Senator Bruce on another bill, and the bill would be posted. Senate bill...House Bill 610 apparently got lost in the shuffle, and although a notice was given to Senator Kelly, no request was made to post that. However, I received a call Friday and I indicated that as far as I was concerned because there appeared to be a difference between the House bill and the Senate bill, if Senator Kelly asked for leave to have it heard today, I would support that motion. That's the scenario that we're at, and I think that as I might suggest, Senator Maitland, whether we hear forty-two bills or forty-one today, we'll be there late in the evening. So, I stand in support of Senator Kelly's request to hear that bill.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Maitland.

SENATOR MAITLAND:

Well, thank you, Mr. President. I...I'm disappointed that the committee chairman didn't advise me, because I was simply adhering to policy that we had in the committee. I was not advised, otherwise, Senator Bruce; I apologize for that and I was just doing what I thought was the right thing to do and the subject to agreement that we had had.

PRESIDENT:

All right, Senator Kelly has moved to waive the Six-day Posting requirement and ask that House Bill 610 be heard in the Elementary and Secondary Committee this afternoon. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. It's so ordered. Senator Welch, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR WELCH:

Thank you, Mr. President. I want to do something somewhat similar to what Senator Kelly just did, and that is ask that the six-day posting requirement on House Bill 615 be waived so that it can be heard in the Elementary and Second-

ary Education Committee this afternoon.

PRESIDENT:

All right. Similar request, Senator Welch asks leave to have the six-day posting requirement waived so that House Bill 610 can be heard in the Elementary and Secondary Committee this afternoon. Senator Berman.

SENATOR BERMAN:

I concur in the motion. If you've checked with the minority spokesman, Senator Maitland, I have no objection, but please extend to him that courtesy; and if that's all right with him, we'll have it heard this afternoon.

PRESIDENT:

All right, is leave granted? Leave is granted. It's so ordered. Senator Demuzio, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR DEMUZIO:

Yes, I'd like to join my distinguished colleague, Senator Lemke, on a great bill as a hyphenated cosponsor of Senate Bill 1410.

PRESIDENT:

House Bill 1410? All right, Senator Demuzio asks leave to be shown as a cosponsor of House Bill 1410. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. It's so ordered. Senator Welch, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR WELCH:

Thank you, Mr. President. I would...like to ask leave of the Body to add Senator Demuzio as a hyphenated cosponsor of House Bill 1108 and House Bill 1257.

PRESIDENT:

1108 and 1257, the Senator asks leave to show Senator Demuzio as cosponsor. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. It's so ordered. Turn to page 20 on the Calendar, in an attempt to try to clear the Calendar, we'll go to the Order of...been requested that we go the Order of Secretary's Desk Resolutions. May I ask the members to please take a look.

We'll try to run through these as rapidly as possible. Senator Geo-Karis on Senator Resolution 7. Secretary informs the Chair that there's an amendment.

SECRETARY:

Amendment No. 1 offered by Senator Geo-Karis.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Geo-Karis.

SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

Would you read the amendment, please?

SECRETARY:

(Secretary reads Amendment No. 1)

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right. Senator Geo-Karis.

SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, these...this amendment was done at the request of Senator Lechowicz and I move for its adoption.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Geo-Karis has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to Senate Resolution No. 7. Is there any discussion? All those in favor will signify by saying Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. The amendment is adopted. Any further amendments?

SECRETARY:

No further amendments.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Secretary's Desk. All right, Senator Geo-Karis, do you wish to proceed with the adoption of the resolution?

SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right. On the Order of Resolutions, Senate Resolution No. 7, Senator Geo-Karis.

SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, Senate Resolution 7 simply urges Congress to...to consider passing the security device tax credit bill which would give a tax credit to the private citizens who seek to protect their homes, and I move its adoption.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, Senator...Senator Geo-Karis moves for the immediate consideration and adoption of Senate Resolution No. 7. All those in favor will signify by saying Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. Resolution is adopted. Senate Resolution 24, Senator Bruce. Senator Bruce, Senate Resolution 24.

SENATOR BRUCE:

Hold.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Hold it. Senate Resolution 39, Senator Rock. Senator Rock.

SENATOR ROCK:

Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. This is a resolution that has been passed in a number of other states and, in fact, in our city council in the City of Chicago. It essentially decries the use of plastic and rubber bullets for riot control in Northern Ireland. It is at the request of the Irish Counselette from our county. It calls for copies of the preamble to be prepared and delivered to our Senate member...United States Senate members and the...Illinois Congressional Delegation. I know of no objection. I would move the adoption of Senate Resolution 39.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, Senator Rock has moved the adoption of Senate Resolution 39. Any discussion? Senator Keats.

SENATOR KEATS:

I would appreciate, Mr. President, I would ask where it says all Senators, that my name not be listed. Not that I

have strong feelings on Northern Ireland, but I don't really want to tell the police how to control people who are killing each other; and I would appreciate if people want to vote for it, I personally intend to vote against the resolution, but I would ask that my name not be listed as a sponsor of the resolution.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Is there leave to have Senator Keats removed as a...as a sponsor of Senate Resolution 39? Leave is granted. Senator Rock moves for the immediate consideration and adoption of Senate Resolution 39. All those in favor will signify by saying Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. Resolution is adopted. Senate Resolution 57, Senator Watson. All right, I understand it's to be amended.

SECRETARY:

Amendment No. 1 offered by Senator Watson.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Watson.

SENATOR WATSON:

Would read the amendment, please?

SECRETARY:

It...it carries your name, Senator.

(Secretary reads Amendment No. 1)

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Watson.

SENATOR WATSON:

All the amendment does is identify who we want to send the resolution to. I move for its adoption.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right. Senator...Senator Watson has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to Senate Resolution 57. All those in favor signify by saying Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it...resolution is adopted...the Amendment No. 1 is adopted to Senate Resolution 57. Now, Senator Watson, do you wish to

proceed on the adoption?

SENATOR WATSON:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, Senator Watson moves to...for the immediate consideration of adoption of Senate Resolution 57. All those in favor will signify by saying Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. Resolution is adopted. Senate Resolution 71, Senator Collins. Senator Collins.

SENATOR COLLINS:

Yes, thank you, Mr. President. Senate Joint Resolution 71 urges the U.S. Congress to enact emergency food relief programs now pending before Congress, and there are the adoption of U.S....Senate Bill 17, House report 1299 and House report 1300. It provides for emergency food assistance to low income and the unemployed and to improve the commodity distributions of...of Federal Government programs, and House Bill 1300 will provide eighty million dollars for emergency appropriations for...food distribution. It would most certainly enhance our food depositories in the State of Illinois, and I would move for its adoption.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, Senator Collins has moved...has moved the...for the immediate consideration of...and adoption of Senate Resolution 71. Is there any discussion? All those in favor signify by saying Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. Senate Resolution 71 is adopted. Senate Resolution 74, Senator Carroll. Top of page 21, Senate Resolution 74, Auditor General. Senator Carroll.

SENATOR CARROLL:

Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. This resolution was something we had decided upon and passed the appropriation for quite sometime ago, and that is to request of a...of the independant fifth arm, or what-

ever they are, of government, the Auditor General to be able to help us with the study we were talking about about job sharing, about employee sick time, and all the other accouterments of being an employee of State government to see where, if anywhere, we can effect our budget by putting us more consistent with the private sector and yet, at the same time save some significant dollars. We decided upon the Auditor General because of his ability to do performance type audits and, therefore, make recommendations to us and try and keep it a little bit out of the partisan politics that might otherwise get into it. I would, therefore, ask for a favorable vote on Senate Resolution 74. The appropriation bill has passed.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, Senate Resolution 74 will require a roll call because it deals with expenditure of money. Senator Carroll has moved the adoption of Senate Resolution 74. Is there any discussion? All those in favor will...will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are 55, the Nays are 1, none voting Present. Senate Resolution 74 having received the required constitutional majority is declared passed...is declared...is declared adopted. Senate Resolution 77 with leave to come back...leave...Senate Resolution 93, Senator Jerome Joyce. Senator Joyce.

SENATOR JEROME JOYCE:

Thank you, Mr. President. This urges Congress to repeal the Federal Mortgage Subsidy Bond Act of 1980 so that tax exempt bonds can once again be used for the purchases of homes. That is the...the Bond Act of 1980 would end in 12-31-83, at the end of this year, and Congress is trying to right now extend this and this resolution would urge that.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, Senator Joyce has moved the adoption of Senate Resolution 93. Is there any discussion? All right, all those in favor of...signify by saying Aye. Opposed Nay. Senate Resolution 93 is adopted. Senate Resolution 118, Senator Lechowicz. Senator Lechowicz on the Floor? Senate Resolution 140, Senator Watson. Middle of page 21. Senator Watson.

SENATOR WATSON:

Senate Resolution 140 urges U.S. Congress to seek an accounting for all military individuals missing in action and civilian personnel and ask that their remains be sent back to the United States. I move for its adoption.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZZIO)

All right, Senator Watson has moved for the immediate consideration and...adoption of Senate Resolution 140. Is there any discussion? All those in favor will signify by saying Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. Senate Resolution 140 is adopted. Senate Resolution 145, Senator Dawson. Senate Resolution 166, Senator Lenke. All right, Senate Resolution 175, Senator Vadalabene. Senator Vadalabene.

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. Briefly, what Senate Resolution 175 does, it resolves that the Chamber and Mr. Brand be encouraged to speak positively on the Illinois economy in order to emphasize the benefits for a business in Illinois; and it resolves that the copies of this resolution be sent to the Chamber and Mr. Brand to serve notice of the Senate's disappointment of such activities, and I move for its adoption.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZZIO)

All right, Senator Vadalabene has moved the adoption of Senate Resolution 175. Is there any discussion? All those in favor will signify by saying Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. Senate Resolution 175 is adopted. Did you want a roll

call on that...no. Senate Resolution 193, Senator Kelly. Yes, let the record reflect that on Senate Resolution 175 there was some mumbled opposition from the other side of the aisle. All right, on the Order of Resolutions is Senate Resolution 193. Senator Kelly is recognized.

SENATOR KELLY:

Yes, Mr. President and members of the Senate, Senate Resolution 193 requests the Governor to proclaim the week in October to be Respect Life Week. While this resolution is...is basically Pro-life in character, it does permit all of those persons in Illinois, whether you're for or against abortion, to support such a resolution because it's just a respect for all...all human life.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZZIC)

All right, Senator Kelly has moved the adoption of Senate Resolution 193. Is there any discussion? All those in favor will signify by saying Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. Senate Resolution 193 is declared adopted. House Joint Resolution 8, Senator Vadalabene. Top of page 22. Veterans' Affairs.

SENATOR VADALABENE:

On page what?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZZIO)

Page 8...page 22. Page 22, House Joint Resolution 8.

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. House Joint Resolution 8 urges the Department of Veteran Affairs to publish and to make available to the veterans and their families at no charge a single publication which sets forth all the laws of the State pertaining to the veterans and their families, and I move for its adoption.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZZIO)

All right, Senator Vadalabene has moved the adoption of House Joint Resolution 8. Is there any discussion? Senator

DeAngelis.

SENATOR DeANGELIS:

Thank you, Mr. President. A question of the sponsor.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZZIO)

Indicates he will yield. Senator DeAngelis.

SENATOR DeANGELIS:

Senator Vadalabene, does there not exist right now a fairly thick document that says exactly that?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZZIO)

Senator Vadalabene.

SENATOR VADALABENE:

I understand that that came out...that same question was asked in committee, and I believe it was asked by you, Senator DeAngelis. This is a one-time shot, and if it's available then this resolution will not be necessary.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZZIO)

Senator...Senator...Senator Vadalabene has moved the adoption of House Joint Resolution 8. This will require a roll call because of the require...of State expenditure. Senator Vadalabene moves the adoption of House Joint Resolution 8. All those in favor will vote...will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are 48, the Nays are 2, none voting Present. House Joint Resolution 8 having received the required constitutional majority is declared adopted. House Joint Resolution 13, Senator Vadalabene. Senator Vadalabene.

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. HJR 13 is just what the...what the Calendar says. It urges the Congress of the United States to immediately take whatever public or forceful action is necessary to identify and release our prisoners of war and secure the fullest possible

accounting of those still missing as a result of the Vietnam War.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right. Senator Vadalabene, there's an amendment to be adopted. Mr. Secretary, read the amendment will you, please.

SECRETARY:

House Joint...amend House Joint Resolution 13.

(Secretary reads the amendment)

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, Senator Vadalabene has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Joint Resolution 13. All those in favor signify by saying Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. The amendment is adopted. Senator Vadalabene now moves the adoption...immediate consideration and adoption of...House Joint Resolution 13. All those in favor will signify by saying Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. House Joint Resolution is adopted...13 is adopted. All right, Senator Geo-Karis, House Joint Resolution 26. I'm sorry, Barkhausen. Senator Barkhausen is recognized.

SENATOR BARKHAUSEN:

Mr...Mr. President and members of the Senate, House Joint Resolution 26...cosponsored by Senator Geo-Karis and myself, had the bipartisan support in the House. The chief sponsors there were Representatives Matijevich and Pierce. It would postpone for a year any decision with regard to the moving of the office...the main office of the Illinois State Scholarship Commission which is now located in Deerfield, Illinois. The reason for the resolution is...is twofold. One is the...the most conservative estimate of the costs of moving the commission office is six hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and most people think that would be close to a million dollars, and I don't need to tell anybody about the State's financial problems. Secondly, if some of the office's

operations are to be moved to Chicago, the new State office building is not ready to accommodate them and, therefore, we are merely asking by this resolution to defer any decision as to the movement of the commission's main office for the period of one year.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, Senator Barkhausen has moved the adoption of House Joint Resolution 26. Is there any discussion? Senator D'Arco.

SENATOR D'ARCO:

Well, Mr. President, I don't understand why he opposes this move. I mean, the Governor has decided that the offices of the State Scholarship Commission should be moved; and for whatever reason, I'm sure that the Governor has made the right decision because the move is going to be made into Chicago, and...and I don't mean it's the right decision because it's going to be made into Chicago, but the economics of the situation dictates that the State Scholarship Commission be moved. Now, in fact, this resolution would prohibit that move. I mean it's a very serious resolution and I think we should think about it, especially people that are concerned about the State Scholarship Commission. So, I think we should hold the resolution until we get word from Governor about what his intent is as regards to State Scholarship Commission, and I would, therefore, oppose this resolution.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, any further discussion? Senator Schaffer.

SENATOR SCHAFFER:

Senator D'Arco, I think you may have missed the point of the resolution. What we have in front of us right now is a piece of bureaucratic insanity inspired regrettably by action of this General Assembly. If you might hear me out, what we're doing right now is we're moving the Scholarship Commission from Deerfield to rental space in...on Canal Street for

three quarters of a million to a million dollars to move all the computer hookups and all the garbage, and then nine months later we're going to move it into the new State of Illinois Building for another three quarters of a million dollars. I mean that's insanity. Better we should set up an altar in front of the dais here and burn a million dollars where the taxpayers can see it. I mean, no one...what I'm saying and the purpose of this resolution is let's just...let's not double move within the course of a year. I mean, the people already have a good reason to think were completely nuts down here, why absolutely confirm it?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, any further discussion? Senator DeAngelis.

SENATOR DeANGELIS:

I was just going to say exactly what Senator Schaffer said, probably a lot worse though.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right. Any further discussion? Senator Geo-Karis.

SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, it's just exactly as Senator DeAngelis concurred with Senator Schaffer. This...the purpose of this resolution is to save money till we can get the adequate facilities of the State of Illinois Building available for the Scholarship Commission which should be in another year. This is to save the taxpayers money.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, Senator Barkhausen has moved the adoption of House Joint Resolution 26. Do you wish to close? All right. Senator Barkhausen has moved the adoption of House Joint Resolution 26. All those in favor will signify by saying Aye. Opposed Nay. Ayes have it. Resolution is adopted. House Joint Resolution 35, Senator Vadalabene. Senator, we have an amendment. Mr. Secretary.

SECRETARY:

Amendment No. 1 offered by Senator Vadalabene.

(Secretary reads the amendment)

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, Senator Vadalabene has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to...House Joint Resolution 35. Is there any discussion? All those in favor signify by saying Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. The amendment is adopted. House Joint Resolution 35, Senator Vadalabene.

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Yes, House Resolution...House Joint Resolution 35. What the amendment did, the per diem increases proposed in the U.S. House Resolution 103 have been amended now into House Resolution 2920, and I move for the adoption of...Senate...House Joint Resolution 35 as amended.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, Senator Vadalabene has moved the adoption of House Joint Resolution 35. All those in favor will signify by saying Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. House Joint Resolution 35 is adopted. House...Senate Joint Resolution 8, Senator Watson. Middle of page 22, Senator Watson.

SENATOR WATSON:

Thank you, Mr. President. Resolution 8 urges leadership of Senate and House and the support of agencies of the Legislature to initiate a comprehensive wastepaper recovery and recycling program. I move for its adoption.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right. Senator...Watson has moved the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 8. Any discussion? All those in favor will signify by saying Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. Senate Joint Resolution 8 is adopted. Senate Joint Resolution 9, Senator Luft. Senator Luft.

SENATOR LUFT:

Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Joint Resolution 9 urges

the United States Congress to repeal a provision of the Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibility Act of 1982 calling for withholding of interest and dividends at the source. I think Congress has got the message, but just in case they haven't, we should pass this, and I would move for its adoption.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, Senator Luft has moved the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 9. Any discussion? All those in favor signify by saying Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. Senate Joint Resolution 9 is adopted. Senate Joint Resolution 13, Senator Lemke. Senate Joint Resolution 16, Senator Friedland. Senator Friedland.

SENATOR FRIEDLAND:

Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Senate Joint Resolution 16 would request that the eleven Division I universities in Illinois conduct a holiday basketball tournament. You'll recall last year when Northwestern played DePaul in the NIT, the Rosemont was sold out in two days even though there was...area T.V. coverage. So, appreciate your favorable consideration.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, Senator Friedland has moved the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 16. Is there any discussion? All those in favor will signify by saying Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. Senate Joint Resolution 16 is adopted. Senate Joint Resolution 24, Senator Buzbee. Senator Buzbee on the Floor? Senate Joint Resolution 28, Senator Schaffer. Senator Schaffer.

SENATOR SCHAFFER:

Mr. President, this is the Senate version of HJR 26, the Deerfield thing we spoke of just moments ago.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, Senator Schaffer has moved the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 28. Is there any discussion? All

those in favor will signify by saying Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. Senate Joint Resolution 28 is adopted. Senate Joint Resolution 29, Senator Vadalabene. Senator Vadalabene.

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. Senate Joint Resolution 29 urges Congress to support House Resolution 1646, the Railroad Retirement Solvency Act of 1983. I move for its adoption.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Vadalabene has moved the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 29. Is there any discussion? All those in favor will signify by saying Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. Senate Joint Resolution 29 is declared adopted. Senate Joint Resolution 34, Senator Buzbee. Senate Joint Resolution 35, Senator Luft. Senator Luft.

SENATOR LUFT:

Thank you, Mr. President. SJR 35 requests the Illinois Commission on Intergovernmental Cooperation to plan an interstate conference on agriculture marketing. In fact, it's my understanding that the program has already been initiated and the program could take effect as early as July, but I would ask for the adoption of this.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, Senator Luft has moved the adoption of...of Senate Joint Resolution 35. Any discussion? All those in favor will signify by saying...all right, wait a minute...Senate Joint Resolution 35 will require the expenditure of State monies. So, on the adoption of Senate...a roll call will be required. Senate...Senator Luft has moved the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 35. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Leroy. Have all voted who wish? Sam. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are 48, the Nays are none, none voting

Present. Senate Joint Resolution 35 having received the required constitutional majority is declared adopted. Senate Joint Resolution 36, Senator Philip and Senator Rock. Top of page 23. Senator Philip.

SENATOR PHILIP:

Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. This is the resolution that we pass every year. As you know, we're continually buying property land and buildings, and what this does is allow us to negotiate those prices...those prices of land in a closed meeting. If there are any question, I'll be happy to answer it. We've done this traditionally for the last, oh, six or eight years and it's nothing unusual. I ask for your favorable consideration.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right. Is there any discussion? Senator Rock.

SENATOR ROCK:

Thank you, Mr. President. I, too, rise in support of Senate Joint Resolution 36. As the Senator indicated, it is an annual exercise that we go through pursuant to Statute to afford the Space Needs Commission the opportunity to discuss the enlargement of the Capitol Complex in a closed meeting. I know of no opposition. I would urge an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right. Senate Joint Resolution 36 will require a roll call and will require thirty-six affirmative votes. Senator Philip has moved the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 36. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? (Machine cutoff)...voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are 51, the Nays are none, none voting Present. Senate Joint Resolution 36 having received the required constitutional two-thirds majority is declared adopted. Senate Joint Resolution 40, Senator

Weaver. Senator Weaver.

SENATOR WEAVER:

Thank you, Mr. President. This resolution requests that the commissioner of banks determine the percent of Illinois' banks assets that are invested outside the State of Illinois, and I'd move its adoption.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, Senator...Weaver has moved the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 40. Is there any discussion? All those in favor will...all right, this one also will require a roll call because it involves expenditure of State funds. Senator Weaver has moved the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 40. All those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are 50, the Nays are 2, none voting Present. Senate Joint Resolution 40 having...received the required constitutional majority is declared adopted. All right, Senator...

PRESIDENT:

On the Order of Secretary's Desk Resolutions, the top of page 21, is Senate Resolution 77. The Secretary informs the Chair there is an amendment. Mr. Secretary.

SECRETARY:

Amendment No. 1 offered by Senator Demuzio.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Demuzio.

SENATOR DEMUZIO:

Yes, thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. This is at the request of Senator DeAngelis. There were some...some references made to the Reagan administration that he objected to and, therefore, we have decided to take it out. I move for the adoption of the...of the amendment.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Demuzio has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to Senate Joint Resolution 77. Any discussion? If not, all in favor signify by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The resolution is adopted. All right, on the main question...the question is the adoption of Senate Resolution 77, Senator Demuzio.

SENATOR DEMUZIO:

Well, it does just exactly as the Calendar indicates. It urges the Congress to support House...House Resolution 2154, the National Gas Consumer Relief Act, and I would move its adoption.

PRESIDENT:

All right, Senator Demuzio has moved the adoption of Senate Resolution 77 as amended. Any discussion? If not, all in favor signify by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The resolution is adopted. Senator Nedza, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR NEDZA:

Thank you, Mr. President. Like to have leave of the Body to change the lead sponsorship of House Bill 1549 to delete my name as the lead sponsor and insert Senator Chew's name as the lead sponsor of the bill.

PRESIDENT:

House Bill 1549, Senator Nedza seeks leave of the Body to show Senator Chew as the chief sponsor. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. Senator Hudson, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR HUDSON:

Thank you, Mr. President. I note that House Bill 1497 is not set, and I suppose I should request leave to waive the appropriate rules so that that bill could be heard in Public Health Committee this week.

PRESIDENT:

All right, you've heard the request. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. It's so ordered. Before they leave, I'd like the Senate to recognize a group of youngsters from St. Giles Parish in the Village of Oak Park. They've been camping in New Salem and had the opportunity to visit. Will our guests please stand and be recognized. Welcome. Senator Kelly, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR KELLY:

Yes, Mr. President and members of the Senate, I make a similar request to waive the six-day posting requirement to have House Bill 1579 heard in the Revenue Committee.

PRESIDENT:

1579. You've heard the request. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. Senator Fawell.

SENATOR FAWELL:

Thank you, Mr. President. I would like leave to remove my name of House Bill 2147 as prime sponsor and assign it to Senator Hudson.

PRESIDENT:

All right, you've heard the request. House Bill 2147 to be shown with Senator Hudson as the lead sponsor. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. It's so ordered. Senator Maitland.

SENATOR MAITLAND:

Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I am the hyphenated cosponsor of House Bill 1189. I'd like to ask leave of the Body to have my name removed and in its place the name of Senator Kustra.

PRESIDENT:

All right, show Senator...Senator Maitland asks leave to show Senator Kustra as the hyphenated cosponsor of House Bill 1179 in lieu of Senator Maitland. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. 1189, I beg your pardon. Senator Leske, for what purpose do you arise? We have a very intricate system

here all you have to do is press your button.

SENATOR LEMKE:

...I'd like to have...oh, I'm sorry...I would like to waive the...have a bill rereferred to Judiciary I from Insurance and waive the six-day requirement. I don't know if we have to waive it or not. That bill was...I talked to Senator Savickas and Senator D'Arco and Senator Bruce, and apparently by mistake it could...it went from Judiciary to Insurance when they were rereferring a bunch of bills, and this bill should be in Judiciary since it deals with court liens and so forth.

PRESIDENT:

The number is what?

SENATOR LEMKE:

House Bill 1090.

PRESIDENT:

House Bill 1090. The Senator asks leave to rerefer that to the Committee on Judiciary I. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. It's so ordered. Senator Lechowicz, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR LECHOWICZ:

Thank you, Mr. President. If Senator Lemke has completed, I'd like to have leave of the Body to go back to Senate Resolution 118. I heard it was called while I was off the Floor.

PRESIDENT:

All right. You've heard the request. Is leave granted? Senator Lemke.

SENATOR LEMKE:

...House Bill 1090.

PRESIDENT:

All right. Senator Lemke also seeks leave to waive the

six-day posting requirement so that House Bill 1090 can be heard in Judiciary I. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. On the Order of Secretary's Desk Resolutions, the middle of page 21, is Senate Resolution 118. Senator Lechowicz.

SENATOR LECHOWICZ:

Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Senate Resolution 118 was at the request of two people who came to my office, Mr. and Mrs. Sonneberg, who really went through every channel that they had at their command in requesting what...what transpired upon the death of their daughter. Unfortunately, her daughter...their daughter was ward of the State and was placed in a nursing home and it was...and she passed away and died from bedsores, and at every request that these people went to, they came to a stone wall. I requested that the Department of Registration and Education contact the family; they called, the family was not satisfied with the response they received and for that reason, I introduce Senate Resolution 118. Since this resolution...has been introduced, there has been a total different type of cooperation from the respective State agencies, and to insure that the...the type of treatment that the Sonnebergs are receiving now will continue, I move for the adoption of 118. 118, all it requests is that the Investigating Commission thoroughly investigate and come up with a proper type of response to the Sonnebergs of what caused and who, what and where caused the death of their daughter and who is responsible or lack of responsibility at the respective care facility. For this reason, I ask that the Senate do concur with the adoption of Senate Resolution 118.

PRESIDENT:

All right, Senator Lechowicz has moved the adoption of Senate Resolution of 118. A roll call is required. Those in favor of...if there's no discussion, those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have

all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are 47, the Nays are none, none voting Present. Senate Resolution 118 is adopted. Resolutions.

SECRETARY:

Senate Resolution 219 offered by Senator Smith. It's congratulatory.

Senate Resolution 220 offered by Senator Kelly, and it's congratulatory.

PRESIDENT:

Consent Calendar. Any further business to come before the Senate? Committee schedule is a full one. Senator Dawson, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR DAWSON:

Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, the Labor Law Advisory Commission will meet in Room 118. It was previously scheduled in Room 400, and that'll be at four-thirty. And also like to post House Bill 424 to be heard Thursday in the Public Health and Welfare Committee, that's Senator Netsch's bill has been transferred there.

PRESIDENT:

All right, Senator Dawson has requested a waiver of the six-day posting require to hear House Bill...what's the number, Senator? 424 in the Committee on Public Health this week. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. It's so ordered. Further business? Further announcements? Senator Carroll.

SENATOR CARROLL:

Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Inasmuch as we are completing Floor Session a little early, I would like to move up the Appropriations I Committee to about twenty minutes from now...fifteen minutes from now. We'll start about one-thirty...twenty minutes to two, if we can ask all members to be there a little bit early. We have a couple bills we do have to move that are substantive bills.

The others will be hearings. There are a significant number of constitutional officers and departments to be heard, so it will take us quite sometime; therefore, if we could get started about one-thirty...quarter to two that would help. Thank you.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Berman.

SENATOR BERMAN:

Just want to remind everyone that the Elementary and Secondary Education Committee will commence 2:00 p.m. sharp, and I hope we adjourn before 2:00 a.m. sharp. Room 400.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Collins.

SENATOR COLLINS:

Yes, thank you, Mr. President. I have been receiving inquiries about the...the Calendar omission of the Labor and Commerce Committee for Wednesday at ten. It is not on the Calendar but it is posted for Wednesday at 10:00 a.m. in A-1 at the Stratton Building.

PRESIDENT:

All right, the Labor Committee will meet at Wednesday at ten as scheduled. Senator Netsch.

SENATOR NETSCH:

Thank you. With leave of the Body, I would like to add Senator Smith as a hyphenated cosponsor on House Bill 424.

PRESIDENT:

House Bill 424, Senator requests leave to show Senator Smith as a cosponsor. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. Senator Bruce, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR BRUCE:

For the purpose of an announcement, Mr. President and Senator DeAngelis has been asking about the task force on public sector...or public employee collective bargaining, the education sector. We will have our meeting tomorrow

night...Tuesday night, 7:00 p.m., Room A-1. We will run as long as we have witnesses. We will have several people, I think, that want to make a statement about that, and we will probably meet again next week after the bill is out of the committee to have further statements and testimony; but we will meet Tuesday night, A-1, seven o'clock.

PRESIDENT:

All right. We'll request that the Secretary show that one on the Calendar too. Seven o'clock tomorrow night. Further business? Further announcements? If not, Senator Demuzio moves that the Senate stand adjourned until Tuesday, June 7, at the hour of noon. Noon tomorrow. Senate stands adjourned.
