PRESIDENT:

The Senate will please come to order. Will the members be at their desks and will our guests in the gallery please rise. Prayer this afternoon by the Reverend Wendell B. O'Neal, Sr.; Temple of Christ, Chicago, Illinois. Reverend. REVEREND WENDELL B. O'NEAL:

May we bow our heads. Eternal God, Father of our spirit, enlighten us how to pray rightly unto Thee, we would waste no vain words but our hearts yearn and long for Thy knowledge and for Thy peace. In the fullness of Thy mercies grant us this prayer and fill our hearts with Thy love to overflowing so that we may not only love those who love us but those who do not even know what love is. We ask that You would today bless our Nation, our President, our state, our Governor, and on this Memorial Day Program, we ask that You bless the families of those lost aboard the USS Stark, bless this deliberative Assembly and as deliberations go forth, let us remain mindful of the fact that that which we do today will not just impact living generations but generations not yet born; therefore, let us deliberate with patience and with peace. Please hear our prayer and give ear to our supplication, this we ask in Your name and for Your sake and so it is. Amen.

PRESIDENT:

Reading of the Journal. Senator Vadalabene.

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Hello. Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. I move that reading and approval of the Journals of Tuesday, May 12th; Wednesday, May 13th; Thursday, May 14th; Monday, May 18th; Tuesday, May 19th; Wednesday, May 20th; Thursday, May 21st and Friday, May 22nd, in the year 1987, be postponed pending arrival of the printed Journals.

PRESIDENT:

You've heard the motion as placed by Senator Vadalabene.

Is there any discussion? If not, all in favor indicate by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The motion carries and it is so ordered. Resolutions.

SECRETARY:

Senate Resolution 297 offered by Senator Weaver. It is congratulatory.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Weaver, on Senate Resolution 297.

SENATOR WEAVER:

Thank you, Mr. President. Mr. President, the Governor has proclaimed today as Carle Health Care Day in Illinois and in the President's Gallery are Doctor Robert Sculley, chairman of the Carle Clinic Board; Doctor John Pollard, executive vice-chairman of Carle Clinic and Mr. Charles VanVooris, president of the Carle Foundation Hospital, along with their administrative staff. I would ask that they stand and be recognized by the Senate.

PRESIDENT:

Will our guests in the gallery from Carle please stand and be recognized. Welcome to Springfield. Senator Weaver.

SENATOR WEAVER:

Mr. President, I would ask for the suspension of the rules for the immediate consideration of Senate Resolution 297.

PRESIDENT:

All right, the gentleman has moved to suspend the rules for the immediate consideration and adoption of Senate Resolution 297. All in favor of the motion to suspend indicate by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The motion carries. Senator Weaver now moves the adoption of Senate Resolution 297. Further discussion? If not, all in favor indicate by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The resolution is adopted. Senator Savickas, for what purpose do you arise, sir?

SENATOR SAVICKAS:

I rise, Mr. President, for the purpose of submitting three motions for reassignment of bills. First is a motion to reassign House Bill 143. I would move that House Bill 143 be discharged from the Committee on Elections and Reapportionment and reassigned to the Committee on Higher Education. I discussed this with Senator Weaver. The second...should I go through the three of them?

PRESIDENT:

Yeah, why don't we get the three of them and we'll do them all.

SENATOR SAVICKAS:

The second is the motion to reassign House Bill 401 and discharge it from the Committee on Executive and reassign to the Committee on Energy and Environment at the request of Chairman Jerome Joyce. Also...House Bill 2406, discharge from the Committee on Executive and reassign to Local Government at the request of Senator Joyce. I've discussed the three of these with Senator Weaver and he agrees and I would move at this time to...that the motion do pass.

PRESIDENT:

All right, the gentleman has moved to discharge House Bill 143 from the Committee on Elections and ask that it be reassigned to the Committee on Higher Ed. Those in favor of the motion indicate by saying Aye. Opposed. The Ayes have it. Motion carries. It's so ordered. He further moves to discharge the Committee on Executive from further consideration of House Bill 401 and ask that it be reassigned to the Committee on Energy and Environment. All in favor of the motion indicate by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The motion carries and it is so ordered. The final motion is to discharge the Committee on Executive from further consideration of House Bill 2406 and he asks that that be reassigned to the Committee on Local Government. All in

favor of that motion indicate by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The motion carries and it is so ordered. Senator Sam, are we...are you ready, sir? Senator Vadalabene.

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Yes, we're...waiting the arrival of two Senators and they should be here shortly.

PRESIDENT:

Mrs. O'Neal, welcome to Springfield.

SENATOR BROOKINS:

And...Mr. President, and a further note that the O'Neal Junior is acting as Honorary Page with us today and he is in the Page's area.

PRESIDENT:

Welcome. Senator Madigan, for what purpose do you arise, sir?

SENATOR MADIGAN:

A point of personal privilege, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT:

State your point, sir.

SENATOR MADIGAN:

Spending the week with me this week from Lincoln High School are Mr. Todd Thompson and Robert Lubin, two students in the social studies program.

PRESIDENT:

Welcome, young men. Welcome to Springfield. The Chair would just observe we are awaiting the members of the Revenue Committee who are still meeting, unfortunately, and I have just asked them to abruptly adjourn their meeting and get here. Senator Mahar, for what purpose do you arise, sir?

SENATOR MAHAR:

Thank you, Mr. President. I would seek leave of the Body to be added as a hyphenated cosponsor to House Bill 300. I have...

PRESIDENT:

Gentleman seeks leave to be added as the hyphenated cosponsor on House Bill 300. Without objection, leave is granted. Senator Luft, for what purpose do you arise, sir?

SENATOR LUFT:

Thank you, Mr. President. For a purpose of an introduction.

PRESIDENT:

Yes, state your...

SENATOR LUFT:

I'd like to introduce to the Senate the Illini Bluffs Middle School from my district, sitting behind me in the gallery.

PRESIDENT:

Will our guests in the gallery please rise and be recognized. Welcome to Springfield. All right, will the members please be seated and we'd ask our guests in the galleries to please be seated. Going to ask the doorkeepers to keep an eye on the doors. Close them, please, and as members of the Senate arrive...some are arriving from out of town, they will

certainly be admitted, but I would ask that the doors remain closed. We will call to order the Annual Memorial Day Observance and the Chair will yield to Senator Sam Vadalabene.

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Thank you, Mr. President. Members of the Senate, guests in the gallery, we are proud to assemble today for our Annual Memorial Day Program. It is a day when we honor our departed servicemen and servicewomen. It is a day we also honor our living servicemen and women. Please join together in this program of reverence and respect for both the living and the dead. And I would also like to introduce at this time our special guests that are in the President's Gallery. Would they please stand and be recognized. I also now would also like to introduce our special guests, Brigadier General Joseph L. Ecoppi, States Fourth Army, Fort Sheridan; Major General Harold E. Holesinger, the Adjutant General; Major General Harold B. Patton, Major General John R. Phipps, Brigadier General Richard M. Eslinger, Brigadier General William E. Doris,...Brigadier General...General John W. Johnston, Brigadier General Louis L. Myers, Jr.; Captain John F. Ferguson, Captain William D. Forsyth, Colonel Richard E. Northern, Mr. James D. Rosas, Mr. David Knox, Mr...Mr. Al Keller, Jr. We will now open our program with the Presentation of the Colors, the Pledge of Allegiance and an opening prayer, so please stand. Hand salute.

I now recognize Senator Howard B. Brookins...I'm sorry, Senator Brookins just finished leading us in the Pledge of Allegiance. I recognize Senator Kenneth Hall, who will give the opening prayer. Senator Hall.

SENATOR HALL:

(Prayer given by Senator Hall)

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Please be seated. General John A. Logan, a native of Murphysboro, Jackson County, Illinois, was a Major General in the Civil War. He was three times Commander-in-Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic...Republic as well as a United States Senator and a member of the House of Representatives from Illinois. Senator Robert M. Raica will now read General Logan's Order for the First Memorial Day, issued in May 5th of...1868. Senator Raica.

SENATOR RAICA:

(Senator Raica reads General Logan's Order for the First Memorial Day)

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Senator O'Daniel will now read "A Star in God's Window," which was written by Reverend Eugene M. Denner, Aumonier National, Forty and Eight. Senator O'Daniel.

SENATOR O'DANIEL:

(Senator O'Daniel reads "A Star in God's Window")

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Senator del Valle...del Valle will read "Why Memorial Day." Senator del Valle.

SENATOR del VALLE:

(Senator del Valle reads "Why Memorial Day")

SENATOR VADALABENE:

We will now have a special presentation by bugler Steve Hall and drummer Joseph Richiusa of the 114th Regiment, the Illinois Volunteer Infantry, "The Battle Hymn of the Republic."

STEVE HALL AND JOESPH RICHIUSA:

(Steve Hall and Joseph Richiusa play "The Battle Hymn of the Republic")

SENATOR VADALABENE:

William J. Acker was born and raised on a farm in

Waterloo, Illinois. Acker saw service in the Army, first in the Quartermaster Corps in Texas, in the Border Patrol under General John J. Pershing in 1916 and 17, and later in World War I as a warrant officer in France. And while a patient at the Geriatric Administration Medical Center in Los Angeles, the nurses discovered his talent after he dedicated a poem to them. When he was asked by the Veterans' Administration to write a commemorative poem for the veterans everywhere on Memorial Day, Acker said he had just the thing. And after flipping through a well-thumbed black scrapbook on...on his poetry, he retrieved and updated a poem he had written in 1941, called "Memorial Day." This poem, composed by a native son of Illinois, William J. Acker, will be presented by Senator Carl L. Hawkinson. Senator Hawkinson.

SENATOR HAWKINSON:

(Senator Hawkinson reads "Memorial Day")

SENATOR VADALABENE:

It is traditional that the poem "In Flanders Field" be recited on Memorial Day. Senator Robert A. Madigan will present the poem, "In Flanders Field." Senator Madigan.

SENATOR MADIGAN:

(Senator Madigan reads "In Flanders Field")

SENATOR VADALABENE:

We will now have a musical presentation by bugler Steve Hall and drummer Joseph Richiusa, "When Johnny Comes Marching Home."

STEVE HALL AND JOSEPH RICHIUSA:

(Steve Hall and Joseph Richiusa plays "When Johnny Comes Marching Home")

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Senator John Davidson will present a tribute to the thirty-seven sailors who lost their lives while serving in the U.S.S. Stark. Senator Davidson.

SENATOR DAVIDSON:

As we gather here today to honor Memorial Day and those who have given the last full measure, it's appropos that we pay tribute to those who in the last few days have walked that last mile.

(Senator Davidson reads the names of the sailors of the U.S.S. Stark)

And as we stand all present for a silent prayer of thanksgiving for these individuals, I would like to say to them and of those still in service, our Navy special hymn...or special thought, keep out of harm's way. If we may, a moment of silent prayer. Thank you.

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Senator...Adeline Geo-Karis, a Lieutenant Commander during World War II, will now offer a prayer, "Eternal Father, Strong to Save." Senator Geo-Karis.

SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

Thank you, Senator Vadalabene. Being a Navy Veteran, I'm particularly sad for the men who lost their lives in the U.S.S. Stark and for all veterans who've lost their lives and limbs in the cause of our country.

(Senator Geo-Karis offers prayer "Eternal Father, Strong to Save")

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Senator Roger Keats, a Major in the U. S. Army Reserve, will now introduce our guest speaker. Senator Keats. In the absence of Senator Keats, Senator Adeline Geo-Karis.

SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

Mr. Chairman...Mr...rather, Senator Vadalabene, chairman of this lovely ceremony. It's my pleasure to introduce a gentleman who lives in my county. He is Brigadier General Joseph L. Ecoppi who was born in Freeman Spur, Illinois. Upon completion of the Reserve Officers Training Corps curriculum and the educational course of study at the University of Illinois in 1954, he was commissioned the Second

Lieutenant and awarded a Bachelor of Science Degree in physical education. He also holds a Master of Science Degree in public administration from Shippensburg State College. His...military education includes completion of a field...artillery officer advanced course, the United States Army Command and General Staff College in the Army War College. He has held a wide variety of important command and staff positions culminating in his current assignment as Chief of Staff of the Fourth United States Army. Other key assignments held recently include duty as Division...Artillery Commander and Assistant Division Commander Support for the Fifth Infantry Division mechanized at Fort Polk, Louisiana. Immediately preceding his current assignment, he was Deputy Director of the United States Army Concepts Analysis Agency, Bethesda, Maryland. General Ecoppi served in a variety of important career building assignments preparatory to his most recent duties. He was a Personnel Staff Officer in the Equal Opportunity Branch, later an Assistant Executive Officer in the Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Personnel, Washington D. C.. Reassigned to Korea, he commanded the First Battalion, 31st Artillery and the Sixth Battalion, 37th Artillery in the Second Infantry Division. Following return to the United States and completion of the War College curriculum, General Ecoppi was again assigned to Washington as Chief of Nuclear Surety Inspections Team in the Office of the Inspector General. Awards and decorations which General Ecoppi has received include the Bronze Star Medal, the Meritorious Service Medal with two oak leaf...clusters, two air medals, the Army Commendation Medal and the Purple Heart. It is my pleasure to introduce to the assembly, Brigadier General Joseph L. Ecoppi.

BRIGADIER GENERAL JOSEPH L. ECOPPI:

(Remarks made by Brigadier General Joseph L. Ecoppi)

SENATOR VADALABENE:

I would like at this time to introduce the wives of our special guests, Mrs. Janet Ecoppi, Mrs. Orthlene Patton and Mrs. Polly Myers who are seated in the rear of the Chamber. Thank you, very much, General Ecoppi, for your inspiring talk and the special inspiration that you gave to our young students in our galleries. I'm sure they will remember this day for a long time to come. Will you please now stand for the closing prayer. It will be given by Senator Philip Rock, the President of the Senate.
