3rd Reading. Now let's turn to Page 5, Senate Bills 3rd Reading. 3rd Reading appears Senate Bill 51. Senator Watson. Senator Watson, want to read the bill, 3rd Reading? SENATOR WATSON:

Yes. Thank you.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Madam Secretary, please read Senate Bill 51. This is 3rd Reading.

SECRETARY HAWKER:

Senate Bill 51.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Senator Watson.

SENATOR WATSON:

Yes. Thank you, Mr. President. This bill does exactly what the Calendar says. It amends various Acts to --PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Excuse me -- excuse me, Frank. Ladies and Gentlemen, we're on 3rd Reading. Would you give the Gentleman your attention, please? Thank you. Senator Watson.

SENATOR WATSON:

Thank you, Mr. President. This bill does exactly what the Calendar says. It amends various Acts to change the county superintendent of highways to county engineer. Right now, current law requires that these people be engineers, and they'd like to have that recognition in the Statutes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Any discussion? Senator Demuzio. SENATOR DEMUZIO:

Senator Watson, you're saying that this is a request from the superintendent of highways to change their title to county engineers because that is their training. Is that what you're indicating? And is there any other reason for this change? It appears to be a vehicle of some sort.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Senator Watson.

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SENATOR WATSON:

Well, it's just as you said. That's exactly what they want to do. They want to change their name and create the engineer title. That's what their -- the degree they're required to have. It has nothing to do with a vehicle. I've already talked to Chairman Daley, and this is not a vehicle and has no intention of being so. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Senator Demuzio.

SENATOR DEMUZIO:

I -- I was just curious because we're -- we're -- we're kind of -- we're having trouble in some counties getting highway superintendents, and I didn't want to compound the problem by changing this classification to make it more stringent. Because I know, at least, in the County of Greene, for example, they spent at least the last two or three months under a mandate from the Department of Transportation to hire a highway -- superintendent who had the qualifications. And if we're only just changing the title, I'm hoping that -- does this mean that perhaps that these people would be entitled to more money? It would be more difficult for a person to be a engineer versus a highway -- a -sorry -- a highway - whatever the title is now? Highway superintendent, yeah.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Senator Watson. SENATOR WATSON:

Well, I don't know if I can answer all -- all those questions.

I'm not even sure what all you said there. But anyway - yes, Senator, there is a problem out there right now in -- in counties complying with the law that currently is on the books requiring the engineer. Bond County was one of those counties that had it. But -- but this has nothing to do with this. And this doesn't make it more stringent. It just simply changes the name from

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county superintendent of highways to a -- to an engineer. And -and that's the degree that they're required to have. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Senator Demuzio.

SENATOR DEMUZIO:

So we're not really trying to solve their problem, we're just trying to change the job classification and give them a -- a title of engineer rather than a county superintendent, with no additional compensation being part of this legislation.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Senator Daley.

SENATOR DALEY:

Thank you, Mr. President. I would like to just restate what Senator Watson stated in committee. And he made a commitment to Local -- the Local Government members that this would not be a vehicle.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Any further discussion? Senator Watson, to close. SENATOR WATSON:

Yes. Thank you, Mr. President. Senator Daley is quite correct. I did make that statement, and this is not a vehicle. This has nothing to do with the salaries of the -- of the county engineers, as they will be called now. And would ask for a favorable vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

The question is, shall Senate Bill 51 pass. All in favor, vote Aye. All opposed, vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Please take the record. On this question, there are 54 Ayes, no Nays, none recorded as Present. This bill, having received the constitutional majority, is hereby declared passed. Senate Bill 120. Senator Vadalabene. Read the bill, Madam Secretary.

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SECRETARY HAWKER:

Senate Bill 120.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Senator Vadalabene.

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Yes. Thank you, Mr. President and Members of the Senate. The Illinois Library Association has indicated that this is a vehicle bill for the system grants that will be amended when more is known about the dollars which is available or needed. And I appreciate a favorable vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Any discussion? The question is, shall Senate Bill -- I'm sorry. Lady from DuPage, Senator Fawell. SENATOR FAWELL:

It's a question for the sponsor. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

He will not yield. Yeah, I'm sorry.

SENATOR FAWELL:

Yes he does - all the time to me. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

All right. Senator Sam. He indicates he will.

SENATOR FAWELL:

Senator Vadalabene, if this is a vehicle, I was told originally that you were going to keep it on 2nd so that when the time came you could -- you could put in whatever the Library was asking for. Am I -- was I wrong?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Senator Vadalabene.

SENATOR VADALABENE:

No, Senator Fawell, you are not wrong. But I talked to Debbie

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Miller, the lobbyist for the Library Association, and indicated to her, what should I do with this bill. She said, "Move it over to the House and we'll see what happens over there." And that's what I'm doing. And I love you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

With that, are there any further questions? The question is, -- shall -- shall Senate Bill 120 pass. All in favor, vote Aye. All opposed, vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Please take the record. On this question, there are 56 Ayes, no Nays, none recorded as Present. This bill, having received the constitutional majority, is hereby declared passed. Senate Bill 153. Senator Jacobs. Read the bill, Madam Secretary.

SECRETARY HAWKER:

Senate Bill 153.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Senator Jacobs. SENATOR JACOBS:

Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. This bill does exactly what it says. It amends the Municipal Code relating to vacancies in -- in the office of trustee for village boards and in unincorporated -- or in -- in incorporated areas to coincide with what the council/mayor form of government is now - to where the village board trustee -- the village board president would appoint the -- the vacancy and then it would be occurred upon by the advice and consent of the entire board.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Any discussion? The question is, shall Senate Bill 153 pass. All in favor, vote Aye. All opposed, vote Nay. The voting is

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open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Please take the record. On this question, there are 56 Ayes, no Nays, none recorded as Present. This bill, having received the constitutional majority, is hereby declared passed. Page 6 on your Calendar appears Senate Bill 190. Senator Dunn. Read the bill, Madam Secretary.

SECRETARY HAWKER:

Senate Bill 190.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Senator Ralph Dunn. SENATOR R. DUNN:

Thank -- thank you, Mr. President. This bill will change the law we passed a few years ago, saying that the Kaskaskia Commons -- Commons Fund money will be used for the levee district. They have decided they want to change that, and they want to use some of the funds for educational purposes. It only affects Kaskaskia Island in my district. Has to do with some land grant money that was given by the King of France back in the 1800s. And I'd move the adoption of it. And be glad to answer any question. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Any discussion? The question is, shall Senate Bill 190 pass. All in favor, vote Aye. All opposed, vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Please take the record. On this question, there are 58 Ayes, no Nays, none recorded as Present. This bill, having received the constitutional majority, is hereby declared passed. Senate Bill 2-2-1. Senator Kelly. Read the bill, Madam Secretary. SECRETARY HAWKER:

Senate Bill 2-2-1.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

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3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Senator Kelly.

SENATOR KELLY:

Thank you, Mr. President and Members of the Senate. This legislation would transfer the authority for the appointment of a township attorney from the board to the supervisor, who would have the appointment authority, and it would provide for the advice and consent of the board. It is consistent with the appointment procedures at the State level, at the county level, and at the municipal level. And it was at the request of the Township Officials of Illinois. And I would appreciate your support. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Any discussion? Gentleman from Cook, Senator Keats. SENATOR KEATS:

Will the sponsor yield for a question? PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Indicates he will. SENATOR KEATS:

On these township attorneys - and for a moment this has nothing to do with my attorney situation, I'm just aware of some the complaints - in terms of who actually controls these of attorneys. We have had people complain that, frankly, the attorney ends up working strictly for the president or, you know, supervisor, and then ignores the board. And that -- we've had some real internal fights that have been brought to my attention. What I'm wondering is, could this in reality be in response to the fact that the boards are complaining that -- that they aren't able to control these attorneys? What's going on? Because we don't want to end up having the board having one attorney and the supervisor having another.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

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Senator Kelly.

SENATOR KELLY:

Thank you, Mr. President. This is the request of the Township Officials. They represent not only the supervisor but the trustees, as well. And this is consistent with other forms of government. And, you know, you might say there are special interests going on at the State or municipal or county level right now, but I -- it's -- it's what they want, and I think it's something that we should confirm.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Any further discussion? Gentleman from LaSalle, Senator Welch.

SENATOR WELCH:

I don't really have a question, I guess, I -- I Thank you. just don't understand why we're taking authority away from -usually the township board has five members, so we're going to make our five township board -- board members mad at us and make the supervisor happy, I guess, Senator Kelly. It doesn't make -it doesn't make sense to me to give all of the authority to the supervisor, because the attorney also serves the assessor, as well as the board, as well as the supervisor. So I'm not sure why we're giving all the authority to the supervisor. Of course, the board may be of a different party than the supervisor, as well. So downstate we certainly have those problems. You probably have 'em up there too, Senator. But I -- I don't see any real reason to do this. And frankly, it doesn't sound like the Township Officials gave you much of a reason for doing it either, Senator Kelly. Maybe at the meeting they voted on this there were more supervisors present than board members. That's about the only rationale I -- I see here. So I -- I don't see any reason to change the law myself, so I'm voting No. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

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Lady from DuPage, Senator Fawell. Fawell, please. SENATOR FAWELL:

Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. I think maybe I can put a little light on this. Under the old law, the township supervisors and the township board were the ones who, in effect, appointed the -- the township attorney. In reality, it was usually the township supervisor who went out and found the attorney, and -- and the rest of the township board went basically along with it. Township boards still have something to say about it. Number one, they've got to -- it goes with the advice and consent of the township board. In the second place, they're the ones that have the power of saying whether the guy's going to get paid or not. So it seems to me that this is a logical way to go. If the township -township officials want the bill, I don't understand why there should be any problems with it. They have spoken to me, as Minority Spokesman of Local Government. They seem to all agree that this was the way to go. Assessors and road commissioners never have had anything to say about who they should hire as an attorney to advise the township board. I think it's a good bill, and I think we ought to support it. And I suggest that my colleagues, anyway, vote Aye.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Lady from Cook, Senator Macdonald. SENATOR MACDONALD:

Thank you, Mr. President. I, too, stand in support of this piece of legislation. It just brings into conformity what other units of government -- villages and -- at other levels - how they choose their attorneys. The township supervisor is the head of the township government. And while the assessor and road commissioner and other elected officials certainly are also important, with the advice and consent of the trustees, I think that this brings into conformity the process for townships that

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other bodies of governments enjoy. And I -- I would strongly urge your support of this bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Gentleman from St. Clair, Senator Hall. SENATOR HALL:

Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. This poses a great problem for many of us. I would ask Senator Kelly -- we haven't had a chance to check with that because -- I've got a problem down there. My township supervisor -- that he and the board are after it, and just -- all that I would say is that I wish we -- could see -- if you might take it out of the record and give us an opportunity, and call it back at the first of the week. Could you do that, Senator Kelly? PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Senator Kelly.

SENATOR KELLY:

Senator, I don't mind you polling your constituency. I just think you've got a busy agenda right now, and you're going to have about as tough time as I am. I had -- I haven't even made a poll or -- of my -- all the trustees in my area. But I've talked to some of them and I've talked to the Township Officials to advise them that this bill wasn't going to go very far if it was opposed by the trustees. And they advised me that there wasn't any problem, the trustees would be in support of this. I don't know. I -- I'd just as leave go, but it's -- if I have a number of people that would like to hold it, but I don't think we got enough time to hold it.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Senator Karpiel.

SENATOR KARPIEL:

Well, thank you, Mr. President. I don't know why we're spending such a great deal of time on this bill. It's still with

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the advice and consent of the township board. The supervisor is the person, who in most cases - as an ex-supervisor, I -- I know that is the one that is there in the office doing all the -- the administrative things. The township board shows up perhaps once a month at a meeting. If there is a disagreement - the township board does not like who the supervisor is choosing - they don't have to agree with it at -- at the township meeting. They don't have to agree to the salary. They don't have to pay 'em, as Senator Fawell said. It's a -- it's a very clear-cut bill to ease the administrative burden on a township supervisor. And I stand in strong support of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Senator Kelly, to close. SENATOR KELLY:

I would appreciate your favorable support. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Question is, shall Senate Bill 2-2-1 pass. All in favor, vote Aye. All opposed, vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? According to Adeline, you got it, Dick. Please, take the record. On this question, there are 53 Ayes, 3 Nays, 2 recorded as Present. This bill, having received the constitutional majority, is hereby declared passed. Also on your Calendar, on Page 6, appears House Bill 105, 3rd Reading. Senator Joyce. Read the bill, Madam Secretary. SECRETARY HAWKER:

House Bill 105.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Senator Joyce.

SENATOR J.J. JOYCE:

Thank you, Mr. President. House Bill 105 expands the -- well,

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this deals with the Rural Bond Bank. And it expands the definition of "governmental unit" to be all-inclusive of local governments and their entities. It further expands the definition, in certain circumstances, to include units that are partially located outside of a rural county. It also permits the bank to transfer to GRF in any amount to -- the commissioners deem in excess revenues back to the General Revenue Fund. I'd be happy to answer any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Any discussion? Senator Keats.

SENATOR KEATS:

Question to the sponsor. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Indicates he'll yield.

SENATOR KEATS:

Does this expand -- and I apologize, we just don't have the analysis. This does not expand the power of the Rural Bond Bank? Give them any new powers they don't presently have, other than the geographical issue you're raising?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Senator Joyce.

SENATOR J.J. JOYCE:

Yeah. Thank you, Mr. President. Yes. No. It -- it -- it clarifies the definition of "local government." And -- and the problem is now - and I'll just tell you what it is - that -- that in a county that's a rural county, if a little piece of a town, maybe fifteen or twenty people happen to be in an urban county, it would say that this, you know, they are still part of that rural county. And it also lets them -- any excess monies the commissioners deem that they have, put it back in the General Revenue Fund.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

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Any further discussion? Senator Joyce, to close. I'm sorry. Senator Keats. One more.

SENATOR KEATS:

The second question is, since the board has not demonstrated real good common sense a couple times so far, this doesn't give them more bonding authority either.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Senator Joyce.

SENATOR J.J. JOYCE:

No.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Any further discussion? Senator Joyce, to close. Question is, shall House Bill 105 pass. All in favor, vote Aye. A11 opposed, vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Please take the record. On this question, there are 57 Ayes, no Nays, none recorded as Present. This bill, having received the constitutional majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bills 2nd Reading -- before we get to that order, Ladies and Gentlemen, let's give a warm welcome to a former Member of this Body, now Judge Clarence Darrow. Clarence, good to have you here today. Good to see you. Appears House Bill 2-7-7. Senator Luft, you want to read the bill -- have the bill read? 2nd Reading? Okay. Madam Secretary, let's go to House Bills 1st Reading. None. Okay. Secretary's Desk, Resolutions. Senate Joint Resolution 12. Senator Joyce. It's on Page 7 of the Calendar. Read the resolution.

SECRETARY HAWKER:

Senate Joint Resolution No. 12 offered by Senator Joyce. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Ladies and Gentlemen, this is on behalf of a former member. Senator Joyce. SENATOR J.J. JOYCE:

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Yes. Thank you, Mr. President. This names the Washington Avenue Bridge over the Kankakee River in Kankakee after Ed McBroom, a former colleague of ours.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Any discussion? The question is, shall Senate Joint Resolution pass -- 12 pass. All in favor, vote Aye. All opposed, vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Please take the record. On this question, there are 58 Ayes, no Nays, none recorded as Present. And the -resolution is adopted. Also appearing is -- on the Calendar, Page 7, Senate Conference Committee Reports, Senate Joint Resolution 1. Senator Berman. Maitland, I'm sorry. Senator Maitland. You want to read the -- want to read it? Madam Secretary, Conference Committee Report No. 1.

SECRETARY HAWKER:

The First Conference Committee Report on Senate Joint Resolution No. 1.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Senator Maitland.

Thank you, Mr. -- Mr. President and Members of the Senate. Senate joint resolution re-creates House Joint Resolution 18, that we passed a year ago, that created the Task Force on School Finance. It did make some minor changes. It enlarged the Task Force to include additional legislators and additional public members, as well. I would be happy to respond to any of your questions, otherwise would seek your support of this First Conference Committee Report.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Any discussion? The question is, shall the Senate adopt the Conference Committee Report on Senate -- Senate Joint Resolution 1. Those in favor, vote Aye. Those opposed, vote Nay. The

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voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Please take the record. On that question, there are 58 Ayes, no Nays, none recorded as Present. And the Senate does adopt the Conference Committee Report on Senate Joint Resolution 1. And the bill, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. That concludes the agenda for today. Senator Rock. Senator Rock. SENATOR ROCK:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I would just call your attention to the fact that the Committee on Executive Appointments is scheduled to meet tomorrow morning at the hour of 8:00 a.m. The Senate will come into Session at nine. And we will attempt to handle any business with dispatch, so that Members can get on the road and get back to their district. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Senator Demuzio. SENATOR DEMUZIO:

Thank you, Mr. President. There are a number of bills that have been requested to be reassigned. I think the Committee -the Clerk has them -- the Secretary has the list on her desk. There are a number of bills on this list. I would simply move to discharge the following bills from their prescribed committees that are on this list, and have them re-referred to the committee that it's now being -- it's being reassigned to. It's my understanding that the list has been checked and cleared with the Republican side. And if -- if it's not necessary to read all of these into the record, simply to use the list that's on the Secretary's Desk, I would so move that we, in fact, reassign the following bills and discharge the appropriate committees and have them reassigned to the committees that are on the list. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Any objection to that? Hearing none, it's so -- so -- so

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moved. The Clerk has about a few resolutions to attend to. You want to read in the resolutions? SECRETARY HAWKER:

Senate Resolution 211 offered by Senator Jerome Joyce. Senate Resolution 212 offered by Senator Dudycz. Senate Resolution 213 offered by Senator Dudycz. Senate Resolution 214 offered by Senator Jacobs. Senate Resolution 215 offered by Senator Topinka. Senate Resolution 216 offered by Senator Etheredge. Senate Resolution 217 offered by Senator Hawkinson.

Senate Resolution 218 offered by Senators Vadalabene and Hudson.

And Senate Joint Resolution 35 offered by Senators Woodyard, Dudycz, Madigan, Hawkinson, Davidson, Rea and Schuneman. They're all congratulatory.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Consent Calendar.

SECRETARY HAWKER:

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And Senate Joint Resolution 36 offered by Senator del Valle. It is substantive.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Executive Committee. Gentleman -- Senator Demuzio --SENATOR DEMUZIO:

Thank you, Mr. President. I'd like the record also to reflect, today, that Senator Newhouse is absent due to illness. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

So -- the record will so reflect. Senator Philip, do you have anyone that's absent? Pate. Is there anyone absent that you want to have excused? Senator Philip. SENATOR PHILIP:

We're all here. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

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Good. Senator Davidson, what purpose you seek recognition? SENATOR DAVIDSON:

Purpose of an announcement. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Proceed.

SENATOR DAVIDSON:

Just want to remind all the Members of the Senate who weren't present yesterday that the Governor's Prayer Breakfast is on Thursday morning, May the 9th. Senator Joyce.

SENATOR J.J. JOYCE:

Thank you, Mr. President. I would move to discharge Senate Bill 1362 from the Revenue Committee for the purposes of Tabling. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LECHOWICZ)

Any objection? Senate Bill 1362. All in favor, signify by saying Aye. Opposed. Ayes have it. Senate 1362 is discharged from the Executive Committee. And the Gentleman now would like to have leave of the Body to Table Senate Bill 1362. Hearing no objection, Senate Bill 1362 is Tabled. Senator Marovitz, what purpose you seek recognition? SENATOR MAROVITZ:

Thank you very much, Mr. President. The Executive Committee will meet at two o'clock this afternoon in Room 212. We'd like to start right at two o'clock with our first bill. Also, I move that

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we waive the -- posting requirements so that those bills can be heard in Executive today.
