All counties, other than Cook, have an annual filing deadline of July 1st. Senate Bill 35 allows an applicant who fails to file due to mental or physical condition that is verified by a doctor, signed by an affidavit by the doctor that they were unable to meet that deadline for health reasons, would be and

could be - permissive - an extension of thirty days after the applicant becomes eligible to file those applications in order to qualify. It is a very narrow extension, but it takes care of those people who were incapacitated because of health reasons to at least get their just credit for their application. I have no known opposition.
