SECRETARY HARRY:

Senate Resolution 21, offered by Senator Klemm. The Committee on Executive adopted Amendment No. 1. There are no Floor amendments, Mr. President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DUDYCZ)

Senator Klemm.

SENATOR KLEMM:

Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Resolution 21 creates the Election Reform Task Force Committee to study campaign financing in Illinois. As you know, we've had a great deal of concern with -- both in Washington and Springfield, about campaign reform and how campaign contributions and elections are being conducted. This task force would consist of five members appointed as follows: three Senators appointed by the President, two Senators appointed by the Senate Majority Leader -- or, excuse me, Minority Leader, and the Executor Director of the State Board of Elections would serve as a nonvoting ex-officio member. Amendment No. 1 to that resolution does create a -- the finding that the task force would report to the General Assembly on or before November 1st of this year, 1997, so that the General Assembly could be -- be in a position to take any action on the recommendations for campaign

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and election reform. I do ask for your support on this important legislation.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DUDYCZ)

Is there any discussion? Senator Welch. SENATOR WELCH:

Yes. I have a question of the sponsor. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DUDYCZ)

Sponsor indicates he will yield. Senator Welch.

SENATOR WELCH:

Senator, with this task force, does this mean that we're not going to pass any election reform legislation between now and the end -- and the end of May? With all...

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DUDYCZ)

Senator Klemm.

SENATOR KLEMM:

I -- no, this has no meaning of that, at all.
PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DUDYCZ)

Senator Welch.

SENATOR WELCH:

So bills coming over from the House would be picked up on 1st Reading and those will be heard in committee? PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DUDYCZ)

Senator Klemm.

SENATOR KLEMM:

Well, that's -- that's not my choice, obviously, as you know, but if bills are held up, this certainly would be -- I -- my -- I would envision that the task force would try to find areas of campaign reform that both sides of the Rotunda, and this Chamber, would be able to support, naturally. It serves no purpose to have a bill or a press release saying, "I'm for campaign reform; however, I just can't vote for this particular bill." It's happened before, as you know, when I've introduced legislation.

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So I think the better approach, or at least another approach, would be to at least have a bipartisan, if you will, committee looking at legislative matters that affect this, and if we wish to move it through this legislative process in the next month or so, that's fine, too. I have no problem with either approach. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DUDYCZ)

Senator Welch.

SENATOR WELCH:

Well, I'm not sure -- I'm not sure if that's a yes or a no to my question. I -- I guess it's a "We'll wait and see what the Rules Committee does." Is that basically what the answer is? All right. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DUDYCZ)

Is there any further discussion? If not, the... Mr. Secretary, have there been any amendments on this resolution? SECRETARY HARRY:

Senate Joint Resolution 4, offered by Senator Donahue. No committee or Floor amendments, Mr. President. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DUDYCZ)

Senator Donahue.

SENATOR DONAHUE:

Thank you very much, Mr. President. All this resolution does is to extend the Task Force on Global Climate 'till, I believe

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it's 1998. I'm not sure if it's April; I think it's in the Calendar. But we've had this task force operating for the last number of years. It's an important issue, needless to say, and I just ask for your support for extension. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DUDYCZ)

Is there any discussion? If not, Senator Donahue, moves the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 4. All those in favor, say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the resolution is adopted. Senate Joint Resolution 5. Senator Maitland. Mr. Secretary, read the resolution.

SECRETARY HARRY:

Senate Joint Resolution 5, offered by Senator Maitland. No committee or Floor amendments. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DUDYCZ)

Senator Maitland.

SENATOR MAITLAND:

Thank you very much, Mr. President. Members of the Senate, Senate Joint Resolution 117 {sic} (5), requests and petitions the Congress to propose for submission to the states for ratification an amendment to the U.S. Constitution restricting the ability of any -- of the U.S. Supreme Court, as well as any of its inferior courts, from mandating that any state or political subdivision of a state levy or increase taxes. There is a case in Illinois where this happened. And I believe this is a good resolution. We ought to move forward with it, and I would seek your support. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DUDYCZ)

Is there any discussion? If not, Senator Maitland moves the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 5. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. And the voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 52 Ayes, 1 Nay, none voting Present. And the resolution is adopted. Senate

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Joint Resolution No. 11. Senator Link. Mr. Secretary, read the resolution.

SECRETARY HARRY:

Senate Joint Resolution 11, offered by Senator Link. There are no committee or Floor amendments, Mr. President. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DUDYCZ)

Senator Link.

SENATOR LINK:

Thank you, Mr. President. This resolution -- this resolution is requiring that the University of Southern Illinois College of Agriculture report on the results of a study determining the potential use for zebra mussels be turned over to the State. This -- we would -- there is no objections to this. We would ask that this be passed. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DUDYCZ)

Is there any discussion? If not, Senator Link moves the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution No. 11. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. And the voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 56 Ayes, no Nays, none voting Present. And the resolution is adopted. Senate Joint Resolution 18. Senator Maitland. Mr. Secretary, read the resolution.

SECRETARY HARRY:

Senate Joint Resolution 18, offered by Senator Maitland. The Committee on Executive adopted Amendment No. 1. There are no Floor amendments.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DUDYCZ)

Senator Maitland.

SENATOR MAITLAND:

Thank you very much, Mr. President, Members of the Senate. Senate Joint Resolution is identical to a resolution we passed

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last Session, and it resolves that any electronic system of mortgage registration in Illinois shall be carried out in a fashion that will not impede current systems recording -- of recording documents affecting title to real estate property with the county clerk or recorder. This is that MERS issue that we faced last -- last year. Senator Myers is well -- familiar with it as well. She and I had long discussions when she was a county officer in her county. I know of no opposition. I would seek support of the Body, Mr. President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DUDYCZ)

Is there any discussion? If not, Senator Maitland moves the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 18. All those in favor, say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the resolution is adopted.
