Senator Mulroe, who -- I'm sorry, where are the State's -- the State's Attorneys Association on this legislation?

She had been charged, I think about two hundred and fifty times, for -- for prostitution and she was forced to sell her body at the hands of some unscrupulous moron, and if she did not, the injuries she suffered for -- during the course of the -- this time, was a ruptured eardrum, which required surgery. She was burned with curling irons. She -- he broke her bones. Well, that's what we're talking about, someone who is forced to be a prostitute by someone who is using her to make money off her. And in that case, we want to afford that person the

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opportunity to prove that she was a victim of -- of that and she -- to be found not guilty as a result. That's my hope.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

State your announcement.

SENATOR JONES:

Over here on the Republican side, we have a great university, Chicago State, sitting in the gallery. They came down today to advocate for their lobby day on the proposed budget for fiscal year '16. Could you please give me a warm -- give them a warm Senate welcoming to the Illinois Senate?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Welcome to Springfield. Senate Bill 1589. Senator Mulroe. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 1589.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

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3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Mulroe, on your bill.

SENATOR MULROE:

Thank you, Mr. President, Members of the Senate. Senate Bill 1589 is an initiative of the Secretary of State in -- in response to an audit finding. The bill clarifies how the Secretary of State fees are distributed, including title and registration fees. The bill specifically requires that any fee distribution not specifically spelled out in the Vehicle Code must be disbursed according to certain percentages.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 1589 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there's 56 Ayes, no Nays, none voting Present. Senate Bill 1589, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. I would like to welcome a former colleague and the Treasurer of the State of Illinois, Mike Frerichs, to the Floor. Welcome. Senate Bill 1590. Senator Koehler. Mr. --Senator Koehler seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 1590 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. On the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 1590. Mr. Secretary, are there any amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 2, offered by Senator Koehler.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Koehler, on your amendment.

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SENATOR KOEHLER:

Thank you, Mr. President and Members of the Senate. Floor Amendment No. 2 just corrects a drafting error.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, all those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No other amendments reported.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

3rd Reading. Senate Bill 1591. Senator Collins. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 1591.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Collins, on your bill.

SENATOR COLLINS:

Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Senate Bill 1591, as amended, requires a charter school proposal to disclose any known civil or criminal investigation by a law enforcement agency into an -- into an organization submitting a charter proposal or into any member of the governing body of that organization. This is negotiated language and I would ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall

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Senate Bill 1591 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 56 Ayes, no Nays, none voting Present. Senate Bill 1591, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 1596. Senator Kotowski. Out of the record. Senate Bill 1603. Senator Anderson. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 1603.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Anderson, on your very first bill.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Bill 1603 provides that beginning in the registration year 2017, the application for renewal, and subsequent fees, of vehicle registration for a member of the Armed Forces of the United States returning from a combat mission shall not be required for that service member's next scheduled renewal. Provides that at the beginning of registration year 2017, the standard registration fee shall be waived for the year following the return of any Illinois vehicle owner who is an active duty member of the Armed Forces of the United States who can provide proof of serving a combat mission.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion on Senator Anderson's first bill? Senator McCarter, for what purpose do you rise? SENATOR McCARTER:

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Question of the sponsor.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Indicates he will yield.

SENATOR McCARTER:

Senator, I'm -- you know, we Republicans typically lean towards small government, but in that bill, it sounded like just a bunch of regulations and bureaucracy. Can you explain why you would do that to veterans?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Anderson.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

Senator, this bill couldn't be simpler and it is far from regulation. What we're doing is allowing any combat veteran that comes back, the least we can do for them, who are some of the most important members of our society, to grant them their first year's registration fee when they're coming back into civilian life.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator McCarter.

SENATOR McCARTER:

I -- I think we all appreciate veterans as much as you do, but how does this affect the budget?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Anderson.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

The effect on the budget will be minimal, coming from SOS. They are neutral on this. There's approximately three thousand veterans in Illinois that could be coming back in the next three to five years.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

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Is there further discussion on Senator Anderson's first bill? Senator Haine.

SENATOR HAINE:

Will the sponsor yield, Mr. President?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

I think he will.

SENATOR HAINE:

Can -- Senator, can you enlighten the Body on the -- the phrase "combat mission"?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Anderson.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

That's a very good question, Senator Haine. And the way combat is defined is by their discharge documentation, or DD 214. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Haine.

SENATOR HAINE:

Could you enlighten the Body on those last two terms, please? What are they?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Anderson.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

So, they're discharge documents; document everything that that soldier, Marine, or airman, was involved in during his mission overseas. If there -- there's a specific area that designates if they were in a combat zone.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Haine.

SENATOR HAINE:

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So you would exclude sailors?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Anderson.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

No, I would not exclude sailors.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Haine.

SENATOR HAINE:

So, again, I want you to describe a combat mission based upon the analysis of those documents which you've told the Senate.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Anderson.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

I have a definition for you here, Senator. It is -- to hostile fire or explosion of a hostile mine; on duty in an area in close -- in close proximity to a hostile fire incident and the member is in danger of being exposed to the same dangers actually experienced by other service members subjected to hostile fire or explosion of hostile mines. It also includes killed, injured, or wounded by hostile fire, explosion of a hostile mine, or any other hostile action.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Haine.

SENATOR HAINE:

So, Senator, so that -- would that be broad enough to include a Member of this Chamber serving in Rickey Hendon's Senate district?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Anderson.

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SENATOR ANDERSON:

Who -- who's Rickey Hendon, sir?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Haine.

SENATOR HAINE:

I -- I'm stunned. I am absolutely stunned. I -- so these are -- these are going to be license plates -- by the way, Senator, are -- are any of my past four questions very good questions?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Anderson.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

They are all very good questions, Senator Haine.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Haine.

SENATOR HAINE:

Good, I -- 'cause I was very impressed that you said I had a very good question there some moments ago. I'm beginning to fade out as an old man. I still remember Rickey Hendon, however. Now, let's talk about the fact that this bill applies to return -- give -- gives a license plate, and you said this is the least we can do. Can you kind of flesh that statement out? Is this all we're doing? Is this the least we can do for returning veterans? I mean, is this all you're going to do as a citizen and taxpayer? Is this it? A license plate?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Anderson.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

Senator, as -- as veterans come home, it's very hard for them to adjust to civilian life, and part of that adjustment to civilian

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life is finding a job and transportation to and from interviews, what it might be to -- things of that nature. I think it is -- behoove us to grant this to our veterans that were in a combat zone coming home so that is one less thing they have to worry about.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Haine.

SENATOR HAINE:

So, in 1969, I recall coming back to the United States and I said to the guy next to me on the plane, "Man, I wish Illinois would give me a new license plate. I don't even want to come back unless I get this license plate." Is that what you're telling the Senate?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Anderson.

SENATOR HAINE:

Is that...

SENATOR ANDERSON:

Senator, if that's the conversation you had back in '69 -- in -- back in 1969, I'm -- I'm happy to finally do it for you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Haine.

SENATOR HAINE:

You -- you -- if you don't remember Rickey Hendon, you don't remember 1969. Is this the Chicago City Council, where you just cut off the mike? Is that the deal? So, I appreciate the Senator's patience with my remarks. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Duffy, for what purpose do you rise?

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SENATOR DUFFY:

Question of the sponsor, Mr. President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

He indicates he will yield.

SENATOR DUFFY:

Senator, can you walk me through this bill? I don't know if I quite understand it. Can you start from the beginning?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Anderson.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

No problem, Senator Duffy. So, what we're doing is, anybody returning from a combat zone that is a citizen of the State of Illinois will get their -- starting in FY '17, get their license plate, their first renewal for that year free, so that they can adjust to -- help them adjust to civilian life.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Duffy.

SENATOR DUFFY:

Now I'm looking at the bill. Does this -- this says it includes all foreign wars. Is that correct?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Anderson.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

That is correct.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Duffy.

SENATOR DUFFY:

Can you please tell me how many foreign wars there are and can you list them, please?

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Anderson.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

Senator Duffy, the exact number of foreign wars right now I'm not sure of, but I can get back to you on that.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Duffy.

SENATOR DUFFY:

Well, Senator, if you're not sure about how many foreign wars this is going to include, then can you at least please list for me the eleven great wars of the United States, starting with the American Revolution, going to the War of 1812, and proceed from there?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Anderson.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

Senator Duffy, I believe I can name some of those. You wanted me to start with the Revolutionary War?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Duffy.

SENATOR DUFFY:

Yes, Senator, with -- with the -- with the first war that started in the United States of America.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Anderson.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

Civil War, World War I, World War II, Vietnam, Afghanistan, Iraq, the Korean War. That's all I can think of right now, Senator. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

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Senator Duffy.

SENATOR DUFFY:

I'm sorry, when you said the Korean War, was that a question or a $\operatorname{\mathsf{--}}$ is that a war?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator -- Senator Anderson.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

No, that was a -- that was a war that my grandfather was in actually and I -- I feel bad for not listing that one.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Duffy.

SENATOR DUFFY:

What -- what about the Spanish-American War? Does this include that war?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Anderson.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

No, it would not include the Spanish-American War.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Duffy.

SENATOR DUFFY:

So this would include people or members of the Vietnam War, the Korean War, World War I, World War II? Would it include those members also?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Anderson.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

If those members are coming back in FY'17, then, yes, it would include them.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Duffy.

SENATOR DUFFY:

Would it include members -- family members of people that

were in foreign conflicts?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Anderson.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

No, it would not, Senator Duffy.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Duffy.

SENATOR DUFFY:

Why not?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Anderson.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

Senator Duffy, that's not what this bill does, but we can talk later about maybe having another bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Duffy.

SENATOR DUFFY:

Thank you, Senator, I'll look forward to working on that bill with you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Murphy, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR MURPHY:

Hopefully, to say something funny.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

We're hopeful too.

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SENATOR MURPHY:

Senator, this -- this bill kind of reeks of a pander. I mean, is -- you know, I don't recall Senator Jacobs pandering in this manner when he served in this seat. Is this -- is this what your people sent you here to do, to pander?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Anderson.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

No, Senator Murphy. I'm not here to pander to anybody. I'm only here to do what is right by my constituents and for all the veterans coming back from combat.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Murphy.

SENATOR MURPHY:

You're -- you're -- you're blushing a little bit. You're down right Nebraska Cornhusker red in the face a little bit. You're not -- we're not making you nervous out here, are you? You're proud to carry this bill, aren't you?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Anderson.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

I'm very proud to carry this bill and there's nothing on this Floor that could make me nervous. I run into burning buildings for a living, sir.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Murphy, I think.

SENATOR MURPHY:

Well, welcome to the Senate, Senator. We're glad to have you and congratulations on your first bill - a fine bill it is.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Hastings, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR HASTINGS:

Question of the sponsor, Mr. President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Indicates he will yield.

SENATOR HASTINGS:

So if I'm in the Navy and I travel through a combat zone, is that considered being in combat?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Anderson.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

That would depend, Senator Hastings, on your documentation.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Hastings.

SENATOR HASTINGS:

You know, you -- you talked about transitioning back from combat and trying to ease yourself back into civilian life. I came back from combat. How is a license plate supposed to help me ease back into civilian life?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Anderson.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

Well, for some transitioning into civilian life, money is a big issue and this is just one less monetary item that they would have to worry about.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Hastings.

SENATOR HASTINGS:

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So do we include, like, cooks, like -- that serve on a ship that travel through a combat zone? Is that considered combat? PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Anderson.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

That would not be considered combat, Senator Hastings.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Hastings.

SENATOR HASTINGS:

Cooks serve a very important role in the Navy and in the Army and I think we should include the cooks just as well as the grunts on the ground and to include all of us returning vets. I -- I want to say thanks for carrying the bill. I'm going to ask that I be a chief cosponsor. I think it's a great initiative on your part, and -- and I dare you to ask the cook who served in a combat zone or drove through one whether or not they're considered a combat veteran. And, Senator Anderson, welcome to the Senate.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Connelly, for what purpose do you rise? SENATOR CONNELLY:

Thank you, Mr. President. On behalf of my colleagues, the many people in the gallery, the people at home watching, I move to call the previous question.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

You did a great job. You were the last one. Senator Anderson, to close.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

Thank you for all the questioning. I appreciate being here in the Senate. I appreciate the -- the new guy initiation and I

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would appreciate an Aye vote. Thank you very much.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

The question is, shall Senate Bill 1603 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 58 Ayes, no Nays, none voting Present. Senate Bill 1603, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Luechtefeld, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR LUECHTEFELD:

Thank you, Mr. President, Members of the Senate. I -- point of personal privilege.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

State your point.

SENATOR LUECHTEFELD:

I have in the gallery some young ladies from SIU Carbondale at the Women's Civic -- Civic Institute, and -- and they have to be saying to themselves, what's going on and what are these people like? That -- that -- I'm -- I'm not real sure they -- they quite understand what just happened. But I would like to introduce them to you. These are participants from the Women's Civic Institute. They were chosen on the basis of applications and interviews and share an interest in becoming more aware, engaged citizens, in developing leadership skills to facilitate careers in public service. The -- they are -- their -- their director is -- is a lady by the name of Dr. Mythili (Rundblad). And I would hope that you would give them a warm welcome. And if they would please stand, I'd appreciate it. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

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Welcome to Springfield. Senator Muñoz, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR MUÑOZ:

Thank you, Mr. President. For a point of personal privilege. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

State your point.

SENATOR MUÑOZ:

Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, today we have here with us, in the President's Gallery, the Illinois State Ambulance Association. They're here with us today for their lobby day. If they can stand, I would like for you to welcome them, and also thank you for what you guys do throughout our entire State, for being first responders. They have an event tonight at Saputo's, starting at 5 o'clock. Whoever -- if you get a chance, please stop by and join 'em. Again, thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Welcome to Springfield and thank you. Senate Bill 1605. Leader Radogno. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill. SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 1605.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Leader Radogno.

SENATOR RADOGNO:

Thank you, Mr. President. The amendment becomes the bill. Senate Bill 1605, as amended, allows Lemont Township High School to access funds that it can't currently access by allowing the district to make a one-time declaration of the interest earnings

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it had not previously declared and therefore make those funds available for transfer. Be happy to try to answer any questions. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 1605 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 55 Ayes, no Nays, none voting Present. Senate Bill 1605, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 1612. Senator Althoff. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 1612.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Althoff, on your bill.

SENATOR ALTHOFF:

Thank you very much, Mr. President. Senate Bill 1612 is actually another iteration of a bill that passed out of this committee {sic} last Session unanimously but got held up in the House. It's an amendment to the Property Tax Code and I call it my property tax board of appeals customer-friendly legislation. It just requires the board of review to provide specific types of customer-friendly services to taxpayers who are appealing their taxes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 1612 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed,

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Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 56 Ayes, no Nays, none voting Present. Senate Bill 1612, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Noland, for what purpose do you rise? SENATOR NOLAND:

Thank you, Mr. President. A point of great personal privilege, if I may.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

State your point.

SENATOR NOLAND:

Thank you. With me on the Democrat side, just above me here, we have classmates of my son, Lucien, from Channing (Memorial) Elementary School in Elgin, Illinois. We have fifth graders. He's in fourth grade. These are all fifth graders from Mrs. Doyle, Mrs. Seyller, and Mrs. Kozak's fifth-grade classes from Channing Elementary School in Elgin, Illinois. Please give them a warm Senate welcome.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Welcome to Springfield. Senate Bill 1620. Senator McGuire. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 1620.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator McGuire, on your bill.

SENATOR McGUIRE:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.

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Senate Bill 1620 extends the life of the Illinois Motor Vehicle Theft Prevention Act for four years by extending the sunset date from January 1st, 2016, to January 1st, 2020. I know of no opposition. I'll be happy to answer any questions. I ask for a Yes vote, please.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 1620 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 55 Ayes, no Nays, none voting Present. Senate Bill 1620, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. With leave of the Body, we'll skip over 1622. Senate Bill 1625. Senator Harmon. Senator Harmon. Senate Bill 1641. Senator Jones. Senator Jones. Senate Bill 1645. Senator Stadelman. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 1645.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LINK)

Senator Stadelman.

SENATOR STADELMAN:

Thank you, Mr. President and Members of the Senate. Senate Bill 1645 waives initial utility deposit requirements for sixty days for victims of domestic violence. Victims still have to pay these deposits. This bill just allows victims extra time to meet deposit requirements on utility bills when trying to move into a new place. As many of us know, financial reasons are often a big

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obstacle that keeps domestic violence -- violence victims from leaving a bad situation. This will give victims more time to get their finances in order while moving out of shelters and on their own. I'm not aware of any opposition.

It moves the Interagency Committee on Employees with Disabilities from the Illinois Personnel Code to the Illinois Human Rights Act so that it can also include constitutional officers. It also expands the number of members on the -- on the Committee of -- on -- on Employees with Disabilities from nine to eighteen to represent the interests of the various constitutional officers. I don't know of any opposition to the bill. Thanks.

SENATOR ALTHOFF:

Senate Bill 1734 amends the Counties Code and Code of Civil Procedures {sic} (Procedure) to allow State's Attorneys to use their employee investigators for service of process and assess and collect the same fee for services of processing as the sheriff's department does. It just allows the State's Attorney to have the same privileges and permit payment when they use their own investigators as opposed to the sheriff's police -- sheriff deputies.

This Body creates policy. This does not affect safety regulations at the nuclear power plants. That program they will continue to operate. Be happy to answer any questions.

Thank you, Mr. President. You caught me just as I was signing a congratulary {sic} note here for Senator Anderson on his first bill. I would like to remind everybody that this is not my first bill. So this is not my first bill. Mr. President, Senate Bill 1582 amends the Illinois Vehicle Code to provide that a driver who willfully violates regulations pertaining to motor vehicle carrier drivers' hours of service shall be guilty of a Class 3 felony when the violation was a proximate cause of great bodily harm or death to another person. It further provides that any person other than the driver - and that could be the employer - who willfully violates regulations pertaining to motor carrier drivers' hours of service shall be quilty of a Class 2 felony when the violation was a proximate cause of great bodily harm or death to another person. So, this is an initiative, Mr. President -- or Mr. President, of our DuPage County State's Attorney, Bob Berlin. This is in connection with two very serious accidents that took place within the last year and our State's Attorney felt that he could not sentence -- charge and sentence the individuals involved with the appropriate penalty. So what he's seeking is an enhancement to a level that's commensurate with the crime. And I think it's important to note that we're not just punishing the drivers in this situation, but we're actually going to punish more severely the employers who are, in a lot of situations, pushing these

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drivers to drive more than they're supposed to. So, I would ask for your support and I'm -- happy to answer any questions that might be out there.
